We have come a long way since the infamous "shoot-out" on South 23rd and Ash. Good Weather Ahead!

The weather man is predicting more nice sunny days ahead. That means more people will be outside enjoying the sunshine and fresh air. We all need to be concerned with keeping our streets safe and making our neighborhood a better place to live and play in. It is everyone's responsibility to work together to make this become a reality for our neighborhood. Here's a few ideas to start you thinking about what you can do to make a difference here.

Good weather brings young and old alike outdoors. You will need to **drive slower** so that you can be alert for the children chasing that fly ball that got away. This includes driving slower in the alleys. The alleys are used as access to our homes in some instances and for our garbage collection. You never know when someone may be stepping out of their yard. Slower speeds also keep the alley rock dust to a minimum.

Be respectful to your neighbors! What does that mean? You may enjoy your stereo blasting while you are in the backyard, but maybe your neighbor doesn't. Maintain your yard. That includes keeping your grass cut and the garbage picked up around your home. Take that extra minute to insure that your garbage gets in the dumpster, not next to it and close the lid! You might even offer to assist your elderly neighbor in seeing that their yard gets mowed. Why not lend a helping hand. Let's return to the good neighbor routine.

Be alert to suspicious activity. Just remember that while you are out back enjoying the sun, someone may be entering the front of your home. Keep doors locked and windows only opened a crack. Trimmed trees and shrubbery will not provide cover for a burglar while they are breaking into your home. Also, watch out for your neighbors home. Call 911 if a break-in is occurring at present or to report any other emergency, or use

the Tacoma Police Department Suspicious Activity line (591-2030) to report ongoing activities that may need attention. Use your phone tree to call neighbors to keep them informed about neighborhood happenings.

Get to know your neighbors! Alert your neighbor that you are going out of town for the weekend so that they can watch your property. Have them also pick up your mail and newspaper while you are gone. Why not return that favor to them? Kind deeds beget the same!

Pet owners please keep your pets under control. Keep them in your fenced yard or on a chain. Barking dogs can be annoying but when your neighbors dog is barking, take a look out your window. They may be barking for a reason - to alert you to prowlers.

Parents, be alert to your children and keep a watchful eye on their whereabouts. Insure that your children are dressed appropriately for the weather. This includes wearing shoes, and using sunblock. Keep poisonous weed control chemicals out of the reach of children. Train your children about summer safety techniques such as staying out of the street, water safety, bicycle courtesy and safe riding skills.

Have fun in the sun but let's keep it safe and happy!

Schools In, Schools Out

With the recent teachers strike being lifted, a number of concerns have surfaced for parents. Day Care, summer school and vacations, idle young minds and hands; all these concerns and more have state parents questioning the validity of the reasons why teachers are striking (what seems like) every year. It's becoming a sore subject. Families are split as to loyalties when it comes to who is at fault; the teachers, the legislature, the parents. We are all to blame to some extent. We should be looking at ways to prevent this sort of thing from happening again, and what we, as parents, can do in the event this should happen again.

On of the major things we can do is take more of an active role in our children's study habits. If our children are coming home routinely without homework, we should contact the school to find if there has been any homework assigned. If there hasn't, then we as parents, have a right and obligation to question the school as to the reason for not issuing homework.

If the child just isn't bringing his or her homework home, then we should question our child as to why they are not interested in school. This is where an active involvement in your child's study habits can help: if the school your child is attending is not offering the classes they want, you can look into after school activities offered by the Parks Department, library, or a number of other resources. This may give your child the motivation they need to come home, study, and then attend a special activity that they choose.

Another thing your active involvement with your child's learning can produce is a lot more shared time. This, in turn, may just be the thing

that gets our children to start talking about (rather than acting out) their problems. Plus, it bring the family closer together. Also, if children are involved in constructive activities there is less chance that they will end up in the streets looking for "something to do."

If we, the family, begin to work on the areas that we can effect, then certain issues that the schools and legislature have to currently deal with (absenteeism, gang affiliation, and dysfunctional family situations) can be addressed in the home. This will in turn provide a more motivated student body, and stimulate teachers to focus more on education and less on legalities. This might just give the state legislature the breathing room to begin formulating long term solutions to teacher/ student issues. In the event of another strike, if we have already implemented alternative activities for our children, then chances are we will all be able to weather the storm and come out O.K. Your block leaders and area representatives are trained by Safe Streets to know how to effectively work together to use the available resources. Block leaders organize your block for a House watch, including names and telephone numbers of your neighbors. These telephone trees serve as reference to contact neighbors in case of emergency for help, and it can also be used as an important information source to share activites within the neighborhood.
