EDITORIAL

It has been almost two years since I moved back to Hilltop. I have lived all but seven years of my life in this area. The time spent away from Hilltop was very enlightening. I was able to see how others people lived and how they viewed issues such as public assistance, the poor, the disabled, Vietnam veterans and minorities. Being a minority, I began to see the "color" issues in a new light. I began to see that black and white has now come to mean economic status. If a person is well-to-do, generally he is considered "white" economically, regardless of his race. By the same token, if a person is, say, below middle class, he is generally considered "black" economically.

I began to think about all the issues involving black and white. I remembered the old cowboy movies. Who was always the good guy? The man dresses in white. Who was always the villain? The man dressed in black. Whenever there was a major catastrophe, how was it named? Remember "Black Tuesday", or "Black Friday"? How is Jesus portrayed? White in a white robe. If I am not mistaken, Bethleham is located in the Middle East. Most people in that area are generally of a darker complexion.

These and other thoughts have weighed heavy on my mind. Considering that many people, both black and white, have called for an end to racial inequality and yet racial intolerance still exists, I feel there is something gravely amiss.

Gazing out my window at the streets of my neighborhood, I see beautiful children playing. My heart saddens because for the rest of their lives they will be treated differently in our society. Their only crime is the color of their skin. I meet with one of my neighbors who served during the Vietnam conflict. I see how he still torn by the atrocities which took place in another country, only to be condemned when he returned to America. My heart is saddened. When I see a young black man in his early twenties who has already been arrested twice, been shot at, had to live on the streets since he was fifteen, had no exposure to positive role models to give direction and guidance, but is ridiculed by society because he "doesn't fit in", my heart is saddened.

Most of my sadness evolves around the enormous disparity in which hardship is geographically allocated. Are there any shelters in University Place? What about the North End? How many Veterans homes exist outside of the Hilltop/Central area? It is not only unfair to people who fall into the growing population of the needy. It is also tremendously unfair to the citizens of the outlying areas. How can a person gain a sense of sympathy for another person's condition if he has never had to face that which burdens another? How can one truly understand the uselessness of trying to "pull one's self up by his bootstraps" if he has never been exposed to a system which requires a certain number of individuals to remain impoverished in order to justify its budget for welfare and incarceration?

These are hard questions to answer, especially if a person is far removed from the epicenter of the storm. In order to transcend our current state, each of us is required to search within ourself and ask "Am I part of the problem, or part of the solution?", because color is no longer a basic prerequisite for discrimination, yet still allows itself to be the barometer for "guilt by association", the question remains; when will the walls come down? Berlin has torn down hers. So has Russia and China. When will America get out the wrecking bar and begin dismantling her walls that separate the people?

Perhaps I have exposed too much of my mind and thought to you, my readers. 1992 has been intense for a number of reasons. We are faced with issues on a national scale that, if left unattended, could result in the demise of our society as we know it. Maybe that might not be a bad idea after all. Maybe if millionaires had to stand next to poor and jobless people in a bread line, then just maybe we could begin the process of rebuilding our country on the morals and goodwill it was founded on. Maybe if lawyers and politicians were being tried by a citizens court for their improprieties, new legal and governmental systems could arise.

Compassion is what is needed now more than ever. Maybe America, in her attempt to be the greatest country in the world, has forgotten humility. Let us hope not. Let us pray (to whatever God it is that we pray to) that we can begin to exhibit some form of brotherhood towards one another before we reach a point of no return.

What's New In '92 by Erin Ford & Larry Norman

On Thursday, February 20, we held a gathering at the UPPER TACOMA RENAISSANCE ASSOCIATION. The purpose was to inform area residents of the services that are currently being provided by various organizations. Phil Carter from the YMCA told us about "Friday Night at the Y" program which offers recreation and supervision to area youths from 9:00 to 1 a.m. each Friday. Phil mentioned that currently nearly 200 kids participate and that there is a great need for supervision and volunteers. Kids between the age of 14 and 20 are asked to participate. They must have valid I.D.

Lourie Walker and Darlena Gray were on hand to represent the Hilltop Action Coalition. They spoke on the 1992 missions:

- 1. Combat and control drug and gang activity
- 2. City garbage problems clean up the community
- 3. Better lighting
- 4. Address the housing issue
- 5. Gain community and city support

The attitude at HAC is that this mission will be accomplished block by block, one day at a time (keep up the good work!!!)

Erin Ford gave a presentation from Safeway. Since becoming the store manager last summer, Erin has jump in with both feet helping local organizations and local residents. Over the holidays the local Safeway store donated food baskets and items to those in need. Erin is also involved in assisting with local youth activities. Plans are in the works for a car wash in the Safeway parking lot to help raise funds for youth activities. Erin has also worked hard to improve customer relations at her store. The response has been positive.

Bill Conner spoke to the audience about some of the housing programs which are being offered in the Hilltop area. Bill indicated that residents who have been renting, may be able to qualify for buying a home. He also indicated that there are funds available to provide assistance in paying closing cost and down payments. There is also an opportunity for the community to get involved in designing the types of homes that are going to be part of a 50 unit new construction project here on Hilltop. Bill stressed that while these are opportunities for residents of Hilltop, the opportunities would also be open to residents outside the Hilltop area. So it is important that our community take advantage of this program while the focus is mainly on Hilltop residents.

Commander Whitehead from KFOX radio stopped by and spoke briefly on the Black History Spectacular to be held February 29 at Peoples's Community Center. There has been much support from various local venders in support of this program. The sponsors were the Hilltop Merchants Association and the Metropolitan Park District of Tacoma. Commander indicates that there will be more activities to come (we appreciate the support, Commander!!!).

Larry Norman (that's me) gave a brief history about the newsletter. Currently there is a circulation of about fifteen hundred. Larry spoke of the purpose of the newsletter and the importance of community support of the newsletter. "This newsletter is an opportunity for our residents to have a say on any issue and to provide information and inspiration".
