LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Mr. Norman:

"With a few minutes to spare before heading out the door to work, I sat down at the table and picked up the November issue of HAPPENINGS ON HILLTOP. I didn't know how it got to our house and thinking it was another piece of junk, I nearly threw it into the garbage. I began reading it and was moved by much of what was written. I heard sadness and despair. I heard frustration and pleading. I heard a sense of being overwhelmed at the depth and the immensity of the numerous problems that run through our society. More importantly and with thankfulness, I also heard empathy, courage, hopefulness, desire, challenge, commitment, and caring."

..."This has become my community (a long way from my childhood), and the drug dealers and slum lords can't have it. There is great sorrow, but there is also great joy!"

..."It seems that the battle never changes-only the battlefields, from the streets, the jails, the classroom, the work place, the board rooms and every where in between. Will there ever be any respite?"

"Then, from somewhere, comes a voice such as yours that says there is hope and there are people who care that Hilltop and its rainbow of residents rise above the squalor and say we count, we have rights, and we can affect change".

"I am often reminded of the story of the little girl at the beach picking up and throwing back into the ocean the sand dollars washed to shore with the waves. A man told her there were too many, that she couldn't save all of them, and that it really didn't make a difference anyway. As she threw another sand dollar into the ocean she simply said, "To this one, it makes a difference".

..."We must continue to encourage one another and implore others to join us with their skills and abilities at the water's edge to return sand dollars, one at a time, back into the ocean. We have to believe that what we do does make a difference, even if only to a few. God knows and blesses".

This month I rolled into the theater and went to see Malcolm X, the great motion picture by Spike Lee. I entered the theater expecting to it to be full of brothers and sisters, but as I took my seat I realized that there were as many whites as well as African Americans. I could hear small private conversations and comments from others in the audience and I wondered if whites were offended by some of the remarks. I guess not, because there were no problems.

I have read the Autobiography Malcolm X and I thought that I gotten all that I could of the X experience. I was wrong. As I sat and watched the movie, I was able to see some things that I had overlooked. One of the main things I overlooked was that this story relates directly to the problems we are facing on Hilltop.

When I look at many of our Hilltop youth, I see a little Malcolm in them. What I mean is, they share a common bond with him because they are doing the same things that Malcolm did in his younger days; they hustle, smoke chronic, sell drugs, and most of them have been to jail or prison.

I have talked to many Hilltop youths and it is clear that they are intelligent.

I often wonder what could become of them if they were given an equal chance or if they lived in a different environment. I can picture some of them as doctors, lawyers, teachers of our youths and entering the business world. I know that these guys are smart just to be able to do what they do. There are people who have been to college who don't posses the basic salesman skills that they use on a daily basis on the street. Just think what would happen if they were motivated to use their skills to take them in a different direction. They can become educated in different areas. But for white society, they would become dangerous weapons.

Our government doesn't want that to happen so they make it very hard for them. That is why we as people must unite together and help ourselves. If we don't, no one else will.

The movie also showed me that so many of our youths belonging to gangs is not negative, it is positive. It shows that they have a want and a need to identify with something. If I was to start a movement for change, they would be the first group I would work with. Lets face it, they are young, intelligent and they have nothing to loose and the most to gain, just like many of the followers Malcolm X. If you think in terms of numbers, these youths have more members than any other black organization in Tacoma. Just think what power they could posses if they all were to unite.

Since the movie has been released, I have noticed that the people in Hilltop have become closer. Last week there was even a house party in Hilltop and there was no violence toward one another. Even more surprising, the police came but did not close down the party or take anyone to jail. I'm not sure if the movie X had anything to do with it but I get the feeling that the people of Hilltop are tired of hearing about deaths and arrests.

If you haven't seen X, I advise you to go see it. The movie is a little long but it is a story about a man that African Americans can not afford to miss.

TIME FOR A CHANGE

If you haven't heard, it is very possible that K Street in the Hilltop area of Tacoma may soon be changed to Martin Luther King Boulevard. At least That is what many Hilltop residents want to happen. Since the beginning of the streets existence, it has been known as K Street. But for some time, Hilltop leaders have been voicing their opinion on the matter.

At a Tacoma City Council meeting earlier this week, the matter was brought to the floor. Tony Wright, a local African American business owner says, "Although the name change would not end all the problems in the area, it would serve as a foundation in which we can build on".

Steven Smith, an African American and resident in the area says, "Renaming K Street will not make a big enough impact on the community". He feels an educational center would be more service to the youths of Hilltop and would have more impact on solving the problems.

African Americans were not the only people at the meeting voicing a positive opinion on the change. One white K Street business owner says that there should be a Martin Luther King Boulevard but it should not be K Street. He feels that for historical reasons K Street should not be changed. But he urges the city to change I 705 to Martin Luther King Way.

Another white male commented that the name of K Street should be changed because Hilltop has a large African American community. At the same time, there is no trace of any monument to represent the achievements of African American heroes. It is about time the city gives the area something to represent their achievers.

If you were to travel around the country, you would find that there are hundreds of cities with Martin Luther King Boulevard. Las Vegas, Atlanta, and Seattle have Martin Luther King Boulevard. The question is, why is Tacoma always the last city to follow the trends of cities? If we can answer this question, then maybe Tacoma will begin to grow into a booming metropolis.

But as long as Tacoma is content with the way things are and no changes are made, the city will continue to plummet. If K Street is to be changed to Martin Luther King Boulevard, it will take the help of the people. If you are in favor of change you can help by calling the office of city council women Delores Silas. Just let her know that you are in favor of the change. I'm sure that she will more than happy to hear from you. Support the movement.
