AO:	It's a big difference, big changes
MO:	Yeah, big changes
AO:	Do you think those changes were positivity or negatively?
MO:	Uh Positive
AO:	Oh so it was a great change moving from Western Samoa
MO:	Yes it's a big change
AO:	Why do you think so?
MO:	Think so, because of the living is big change and the way you acting
AO:	Different Environment?
MO:	Different Environment, yeah
AO:	Do you think uh, do you think that the US has bigger opportunities?
MO:	Yes the US has big opportunity

MO:	All the family in Samoa, we used to grow up with, there's not really but poor family but the way they raise you up. You know you wake up in the morning you have to discipline really good the kids. You know they get spanking, spank you if you do something wrong if you not doing thing good they spank you so hard. If you go to school if you don't do your homework or you not listening the teacher they spank you
AO:	Oh so they discipline is also at home and in school?
MO:	Yeah home and at school
AO:	And do you think that's a good thing for students
MO:	Yes, it's a really good. The students they listening, they not doing bad stuff, they go to school, they learn good, and they listen to the parents and they respect the teacher too, because the way I saw the kids over here in Washington some kids they don't respect the teacher, they don't listen, they don't do their homework, they don't do the things but in Samona if you go to school and the teacher sasa (spank) you, you come home and they tell your parents, your parents turn around and spank you hard
AO:	Oh okay, alright Do you think Samoan culture is the only culture that does discipline like this, or do you think that other cultures does this as well?
MO:	I think this the only Samoan culture that discipline like that.
AO:	Alright okay
MO:	When you go to school, long time when you go to school. You don't eat at the school, they don't have school in Western Samoa. They don't have a breakfast or lunch, no, no more. You eat at your house, at your home, if you take some food at school you take it, but if you don't eat at school at home, you go school, they don't eat, you don't eat.
AO:	So you grew up in school, with no school lunch, it always had to be home lunch?
MO:	NO school lunch, no Only if you eat at home, they have only the water, they only pipe (pipe water/water fountain).
AO:	Is there a reason why they didn't sell school lunch?
МО:	Uh because that Samoan, they not not really um not not much money to to raise up the school in Samoa
AO:	Wow. Do you think that effected your education not having any school

	lunch?	
MO:	No, no people kids know already, but if you go to school you eat at home, if you don't finish if you don't eat at home, if you don't eat at home you go school whatever they have it around the school, they have coconuts, they have papaya, they have uh something like that. They just, you just after the after the if the break time the school lunch the school you just go outside and the kids they eat coconut, they eat coconut, they eat	
AO:	Oh so every kid has resources like that?	
MO:	Yea , they all around the school, the family all the stuff around the school. Even if, you can go eat some papaya coconut mango tree everything like that around	
AO:	How do you think um students who don't have food at home, how do you think they are?

AO:	Like people in Western Samoa, where you grew up in, uh what about the kids who weren't able to have food at home. Do you think they find another way or?	
MO:	The parents, they always have the food at home but they don't make up uh they don't they eat at home and they go school they don't eat at school but grow up in my family. I have a good family in Samoa we have a big store in my family. We raise up a good family, we eat at school, at home. We make a breakfast and our parents wake up in the morning and make us tea and bread butter, we eat goof and we take some some food at the school.

If you coming from the bad poor family they teasing you "Oh shes poor" "shes like that" They are racists, but I don't want to be a racists

MO:	Big change now the family they going out, they going to New Zealand, Australia coming out of America yes it's a lot of big problem, big changes
