SAFEWAY THEY'RE WHAT A NEIGHBOR SHOULD BE by Larry

As difficult as it may be, if a person is willing, any situation can become a positive experience. Take for instance the local Safeway on eleventh street. I was involved in what could be considered a very negative situation last month involving the management. Rather than dwelling on the negative aspects of the event, I chose to be as constructive as possible. And that attitude paid off for everyone concerned.

After making a few phone calls to Safeway management and security, I was able to coordinate a meeting with the store and district manager, director of security for Safeway stores and the director of the new security company. During our meeting, we discussed a number of issues regarding the store. It was clear that upper management had a sincere desire to resolve concerns that customers have. What was also very clear was their commitment to be constructive and creative in finding ways to address the issues I brought before them.

The district manager had himself been a manager at our store some years ago. He was a manager during the late sixty's when racial tension was at an all time high on the Hill. As we talked, I couldn't help but feel that a large portion of the communication and trust I was hoping to develop, was already in place. As each person took turns voicing their opinions and concerns, the rest of us listened and would respond always in a constructive manner.

At the end of an hour and a half, the five of us had agreed on many points of issue, and a commitment to begin follow up as soon as possible. One major focus was to begin reestablishing a strong relationship between the store and the community of Hilltop. A community forum with local residents, area leaders and Safeway management is forthcoming. Consideration to hiring qualified local residents for store security will be given strong consideration. Also, consideration will be given to begin hiring more minorities in store management positions. The point was made that in areas with large minority populations, a minority presence in store management could greatly assist with resolving disagreements and misunderstandings between store staff and customers due to language or communication barriers.

As we stood up and began to shake hands, it was clear that the differences that less than two hours earlier seemed a great challenge, had been reduced to situations which merely required fine tuning. I had spoken to the division manager of Safeway stores a week earlier. He told me he genuinely understood the challenge before us, and was encouraged by our efforts to work towards a collective resolve. Safeway's motto "Safeway, we're what a neighbor should be" once again, had a nice ring to it. I wish to thank all who participated in this endeavor and look forward to working with each of you.

But there are many in the world which have nothing to celibate or to think of celebrating. Things like this I think of the most.


