DR. BENJAMIN CHAVIS BRINGS THE SPIRIT AND MESSAGE OF THE MILLION MAN MARCH BACK TO THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST




n April 15, 1997, Dr. Benjamin Muhammad (formerly Benjamin Chavis) revisited the Pacific Northwest at the Central Area Motivation Program in Seattle. The purpose of his visit was to bring news of his acceptance of the Islamic faith and to update the masses about coming events relative to the Million Man March.

Who, you may ask is Dr. Benjamin Muhammad? He has, for the better part of four decades, been involved in the struggle for the dignity and self respect of his people. From his early child hood in the Carolina's, "The Doctor" was making his presence felt.

- At twelve years of age, walked into a segregated library and was instrumental in getting the "White's Only" policy changed.
- * During the seventies, he was incarcerated for nearly ten years as a member of the "Willmington 10."
- * Served as the National Director of the NAACP From 1993-1994.
- * Co-director of the Million Man March, 1995.

I personally met Dr. Muhammad in 1993, when he was at Mt. Zion Church, in Seattle, for the 75th Anniversary of the NAACP. So moved by his appeal for people to work harder in their communities, that I asked to speak with him briefly afterwards. I didn't see him again until October 16, 1995, at the Million Man March. This time, I was only ten feet away from him, but the masses swept him away after his brief interviews with CNN and BET.

This night, as I waited for Dr. Muhammad to speak, I noticed the lack of media. In fact, I was the only media person in attendance. What I also noticed, was the number of youth in the audience. I spoke to Bro. John Muhammad's son, a youth of seven years old. He understood completely why he was there and how he should conduct himself. There was a large number of "The Nation" in attendance. However, the majority of the audience were just "folks" waiting to hear Dr. Muhammad. One brother was passing out literature about a program to help fathers play a greater role in their children's lives. I also noticed stacks of the Final Call magazines,

along with a tray of bean pies. The message of "Self Empowerment" was everywhere.

To set the tone for the evening, there were speakers from Tacoma, Seattle and Los Angeles. As Dr. Muhammad reached the podium, there was a standing ovation that lasted nearly three minutes from the crowd of about a hundred. Dr. Muhammad began to speak regarding his recent acceptance of the faith of Islam. He seemed adamant that his (or any man's) religion should not deter other "Men of God" in working towards solutions for our people. This sentiment is similar to that of Malcolm X during his April 14, 1964 speech in Detroit, when he addressed his stand on religion (ya'll should check out "The Ballot or The Bullet"speech by Malcolm X).

Dr. Muhammad spoke on the importance of action: "If there is injustice in your midst, it will remain until a righteous man removes it." He also cautioned those in attendance not to be fooled by the accepting society of the Pacific Northwest: "Since the Pacific Northwest has diversity, make sure there is room for Black Awareness and The Nation's Diversity."


I did not get the impression that he was excluding anyone from the task at hand because he stated that "Our struggle is big enough for everyone."

Next, we were given the agenda for the next four years rearming the Million Man March: 1997-State-wide observance of The Million Man March

1998-County-wide observance "

1999-City-wide

2000-"We're Going back to D.C. Bring the Wife and the Children!"



Dr. Muhammad stressed the need to get involved, by declaring that he would visit a hundred cities before October 16, 1997, to proclaim the "Good News." There are plans during the tour, to negotiate with local prison systems to allow The Nation to work with incarcerated African Americans to help stop recidivism.

At the conclusion of his remarks, I asked Dr. Muhammad for a few moments to cover a few questions. Here is what he had to say:

What role can youth play in the upcoming events and Black leadership today?

"Youth must perceive sincerity in our efforts to assist and encourage them" Dr. B. Muhammad

dr. m: "The priority of The Nation is youth leadership. Youth must perceive sincerity in our efforts to assist and encourage them ."

hoh:

- hoh: Are the challenges facing youth today greater or lesser than those you've faced over the years?
- dr. m: The challenges are greater today. However, our youth have the potential to rise above this adversity. I believe The Nation has been called by God to resurrect our youth."
- hoh: What was the impact of the Rap Summit (April 3, 1997) on youth?
 dr. m "Many of our youth haven't heard yet. There are plans to release an album and do a tour. This will make it clear as we work towards Peace in our Streets."
- hoh: If you had one thing to pass on to our youth who are struggling today, what would it be?
- dr.m: "By all means, put God at the center of your life as you plan for your future."

I found it strange, at first, that Dr. Muhammad would come all this way to the Pacific Northwest for such a small crowd, with no media coverage. <u>But as I looked into the eyes of those in</u> <u>attendance and spoke with him personally. I understood that it was not the number, but the com-</u> <u>mitment that had drawn him here.</u> Far too often, we get caught up in numbers, rather than individuals. I am reminded that "it only takes a spark, to get a fire going..."

RAP SUMMIT CALLED FOR BY MIN. FARRAKHAN

ith the recent death of Rap Artist's Tupac Shakur and Notorious B.I.G., many communities across the country fear even further violence amongst youth. Serious concerns have been raised regarding the violent content contained in many of the lyrics. The artist contend that much of the "message" in their music is encoded in the slang they speak. But without guidance to understand what the message is, many youth have been misdirected. It appears that the simmering discontent of many African American communities, has met with a volatile lack of hope, shared by so many youth today.

On April 3, 1997, Minister Louis Farrakhan called many of the nations elite Rappers to Chicago. "The base of all this is atonement, reconciliation and accepting responsibility," said the minister. Those in attendance included: Snoop Doggy Dogg; Too Short; Doug E. Fresh; Ice Cube; Chuck D; C-Lo; Willie D and many others. A pledge was taken by those in attendance that calls for a commitment by Rap artists to bring enlightenment to the people in a constructive manner (see Rapper's Pledge on page 8).

I have taken a few excerpts from this important issue of The Final Call (April 15, 1997, Vol. 16, Num. 24) to give you an idea of why **YOU NEED TO GET THIS ISSUE!** Peep this:

LOCAL RESIDENTS SPEAK AT EVERGREEN STATE COLLEGE, TACOMA

n April 29, 1997, James and Dwayne Waller, along with Larry Norman and Antonio Edwards, presented a sobering view of the affects that a "War On Drugs" has had on the Hilltop community. James Waller gave a brief history of the Hilltop community. He also addressed how the governmental programming of over twenty-five years has not effectively addressed the concerns of those individuals who have been targeted by this war.

Dwayne Waller presented the dramatic, *War On The Hill* documentary which explained visually, how this War has affected individuals. This piece was filmed directed and conceived on location in Hilltop. Mr. Waller expertly depicts "Life on The Hill" through what he calls Guerilla photography.

Antonio Edwards introduced the final piece; *Community Justice: A Monumental Concept.* Mr. Edwards worked with Larry Norman, Dwayne Waller and others, to create this meaningful piece which focuses on the healing process a community must go through while dealing with the War On Drugs. This documentary covers the building of the Hilltop Monument

In the closing, "Where Do We Go From Here?," the following solutions were proposed:

- * True Economic Development designed <u>for</u> and <u>by</u> those individuals most effected by this injustice.
- * Development of educational and recreational tools designed specifically to encourage youth to seek forms of expression that promote a peaceful coexistence with others.
- * Persistent lobbying at the local, county and state level of government to abolish current laws designed to perpetuate the use of law enforcement and drugs as a means to control people economically, psychologically and spiritually.
- * A re-connection with our spiritual nature to promote a consciousness that seeks the highest level of self-determination for ourselves, our families and our community... regardless of the conditions that have been created to expedite our demise.



I pledge that from this day forward I shall use my talents and my gifts to promote the liberation of my people and all human beings who suffer from ignorance,


I pledge that from this day forward I, as a leader, as a teacher, as a guide, as a friend, and as a brother will lead my people to the best of themselves, with the help of God.

Dear Parents, Teachers, Social Workers and Guidance Counselors:

My name is Lawrence Norman. For over seven years, I have worked with various agencies and community groups in the Hilltop Community. Each year, the work with youth becomes more and more challenging. Parents, communities, courts and the educational system have all but turned many local youth over to law enforcement, incarceration agencies or worse; the streets..

While working in Seattle as a firefighter, I found that many of the issues faced by our youth were regional and national. More specifically, there is a growing sense of urgency by school officials to "create" a safe environment in public schools. Many challenged youth have chosen not to conform to these requirements. Yet ironically, many of the "environmental" concerns faced by the youth (contributing to most of the dysfunction) have not been addressed.

The issue of *Safety* versus *Equal Access to Education* will eventually create two entirely segregated school systems: one, working towards "**educating**" youth, while the other attempts to "**house**" youth during school hours. If alternative schools are to benefit the growing number of expelled or suspended youth, it is mandatory that TRANSITIONAL components are offered at these facilities.

Region 23 is an opportunity for youth who have chosen or been directed out of main stream education, society and economics. It is, in many ways more challenging because perspective students are required to exceed expectations... period! We have observed what youth are capable of, positive and negative. Already, facilitators who designed Region 23 have done a number of retreats, mediations and conflict resolutions with many of the most angry and discouraged youth.

Region 23 also offers young men and women who are in their 20's and 30's the opportunity to work off community service hours and assist Region 23 in re-directing and encouraging youth. The program begins at 8:30. The core of instruction is presented until 10:30. From 11:00-1:100, Region 23 works on economic and community development. The afternoon deals with civics, community service, field trips and speakers (1:30-3:00).

If you, or someone you know is interested in this program, call and make an appointment. Youth must have parent permission to attend. Space is limited, so only those who present a strong desire to attend and exceed, will be offered the opportunity to participate. **PEACE**
