



Once again this issue of Happenings is displaying the talent of some very creative and serious writers that live amongst us here on the Hill. I guess that I'll write about my favorite subject--"The System".

I really don't understand this system that we live in. Here we have the most valuable resource on earth going to WASTE

because nobody wants to invest the time, energy, and money that's needed to develop it. Here on the Hill we have a natural resource that's more valuable than oil, gold, timber, fish, or diamonds.

I'm talking about the minds that create this paper. The minds that read this paper. The minds that make up this community.

I find it hard to believe that the System thinks that salmon, spotted-owls, and seals, are more valuable and important than our kids.

Our young men between the ages of 14 to 28 years old are on the verge of becoming extinct. One out of five of them will be killed. The percentage of them that will be crippled, locked-up, and deemed useless reaches almost 50%. Why can't we save them like we do the owl, salmon and seals?

I was reading the other day the Exxon Corp. paid 18 million dollars to clean up 112 seals that got caught up in the oil slick when the drunk captain of the oil tanker Valdez ran aground a few years ago.

Do you know what 18 million dollars would do if it was directly applied to 112 of our young men? In fact, 18 million dollars could re-educate and rehabilitate the entire Hilltop Crip Street Gang. How come some responsible American corporation won't invest in these kids and open some real doors for them.

Why do they keep pushing for more police and more prisons when all these kids want is a chance to participate in the American Dream. I know that our kids are human and that they are smart and energetic. But, nobody wants to listen to them and they keep getting shut out. Nobody wants to take the chance. What's up with that? 

HILLTOP COMMUNITY SERVICES... DOING WHAT IT TAKES TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE



On July 8, we set out from Sheridan St. Church with a bus load of area youth and adult facilitators to Buttercreek Lodge in Packwood, Washington. Young Life was gracious enough to rent the facility. Many people had to donate food, resources and cash to make the trip a reality. After a brief prayer from Rev. Fletcher, we were off.

On the way there, the bus stopped and everyone was allowed to get out, stretch and reflect. It felt good to many of the young folk to be out with adults they had come to respect. Many opportunities presented themselves for each person to share his feelings about many different issues that effected their life and their community. There were all types of activities such as fishing, hiking (yea, that was a joke!), writing and group discussions. During the group sessions, many youth expressed their anger and frustration with current conditions in the 'Hood and amongst the homies. Jim Knight (dir. UTRA) came up, Roy Fletcher (dir. Peoples Center) and Al V. (Young Life) came up to offer their support and words of advice and encouragement. There were opportunities to express yourself with a camera, the video camcorder and even the "mike." All in all, we got a lot out of this experience. There are even plans for future events. Mucho thanks to everyone who kicked in and to the young people who attended. Your ideas and input are needed in order to build a strong future and community for those who will follow us.

The following week, we took 6 young children and Steph (a community service worker) to Yakima for the Rituals of Remembrance and the Enshrinement Ceremony at the African Village. Though it was hot (real hot!) and flies were big enough to whisper in your ear, it was a wonderful experience indeed. The ride over the mountains allowed the kids to stop along the road and "taste" nature. Once there, we were allowed to learn a bit about our culture. There was no need for a watch, because drummers let you know what event was starting or stoping. There were lectures as well as activities for the children to participate. There were so many beautiful, black faces. All seemed eager to take something back to their homes (villages) to share. Mother Roho is to be commended for her vision and strength to keep the dream of a homeland here in America alive. Others from the Hilltop community are planning to make frequent visits back, so we will keep you informed. PEACE
