### **EDITORIALS**

y good friend Larry Norman came by my corner the other day and informed me that he will begin publishing Happenings On Hilltop again in the near future. I am so glad that he has found the time to put the paper out again so that the people in the community will have a forum or platform where they can express themselves.

Just in case you are a new reader of the "Happenings," or you have forgotten who I am, let me introduce myself. My name is I.M. Blackman. I have lived in this (and all other) Black communities, all my life. My partners and I have a vast amount of experiences and knowledge of Black culture and we like to talk about it. I can't say that we are always right, but that's where you come in. You can put your two cents worth in and put us on the right track. I realize that a lot of what I say is my own opinion. So I'm going to put my opiion out there until you put yours out there.

I have a few thoughts about the Vietnam War and the Moving Wall that was in Tacoma during the month of July. I know... I know..., the war has been over for nearly thirty years and we should let it rest. But I just have to say this. I felt really bad because I didn't get out to see and experience the Veteran Memorial/ Moving Wall (even after it was brought damn-near to me).

I know there were a lot of Vietnam Veterans who didn't get to pay their last respects either. A lot of Vets are still suffering from the affects of the war, even though all this time has past. They still haven't been treated and compensated for the PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Syndrome), alcoholism and drug addiction, or any number of illnesses that have plagued us since the war. There are too many of my Black brothers who are falling through the cracks. They are missing out on the treatment and financial resources that are available to them. It seems to me that many of the White Veterans are getting the help they need and deserve, but the "minority" Vets are missing out.

This brings me to the "Veteran" of our current national war; those who are missing out on the benefits and services that was meant for them. They too, are suffering from the same illnesses that the generation before has suffered.

I am talking about **The War On Drugs** and the war against so-called "**Gangs**." Folks, here you have a war that is fought daily in our streets and communities. Many of these youngsters (Veterans of the Drug War) have experienced as much, if not more, violence than most of the soldiers in Vietnam did. They have been beat down by the police and had their "homies" shot in their presence or watch them die in their arms. These young people have been traumatized and need treatment as much as anyone else that is suffering from PTSD.

I also feel that they should be compensated for their losses because most of them have been the victims of discrimination within the legal system. Hardly any of the Black youth that were arrested for drug crimes in the late 80's to early 90's got fair and equal treatment.

Currently, President Clinton is reviewing legislation the may correct the obvious disparity in sentencing of minorities for cocaine related drug offences (Yea right. I'll believe that, when I see it!). Further, the government has been allocating money to help clean up the crime and problems related to to drugs and turn the youth around. To date, hardly any of this money has gotten to the kids and families of those for whom it was intended. Most of this money has gone for law enforcement personnel and tools like; cameras, jails, cars, service providers, etc.. The actual victims (the so-called gangsters) have yet to receive treatment or rehabilitation for complications related to "The War On Drugs."

Well, let me stop right here because I could go on and on about this subject. It is truly one of my pet peeves. So, what do you think and how do you feel about two generations of Black Americans who seem to have been used and then left out... out in the cold? See ya!!

### A "MOVING" MEMORIAL

n July 14, I went to Mountain View to see The Moving Wall (Vietnam Veteran Memorial). This is a complete replica of the original Wall in Washington DC. The Moving Wall has been touring the country since October, 1984. On the wall, is the list of service men and women who had lost their lives during service in Vietnam (some 58,202). The first casualty was in 1957 and the last us soldier to die was in 1975.

As I looked at the awesome numbers of row after row, with name after name, it occurred that there are a lot of people who are still trying to mend and get on with their lives. I also thought about the large number of Vietnam Vets I know personally, right here in the local community. Occasionally, we would talk about the experience of war and many of the awful things one had to do just to survive.

I remembered the many Veterans who wept (as if relieved) once the Memorial was completed in 1982. It didn't matter what each fallen US soldier had done good or bad. The only thing that mattered was that he or she had served in Vietnam. In a lot of ways, I thought that was good. Anyone who has participated in any event, deserves recognition for his or her contributions.

I reflected on a similar set of emotions when people here in the Hilltop Community tried unsuccessfully to have the names of our fallen friends and loved ones placed on The Hilltop Monument (May, 1993). I thought to myself; "Hell, didn't the people in this community lost their lives in a war; A WAR ON DRUGS?


I remember the frustration shared by many of those who helped to conceive and build the project. When we found out the stipulations placed on the project by the city, many felt we were not being respected or acknowledged for our losses. As the Hilltop Monument sits today, it is a blessing and loving reminder to many of us, of the sacrifices we have made in this community.


So I really could understand how many Vets felt until the Wall was finally complete. I'm sure there were a number of people who didn't like the design, or the fact that an Asian person designed it.

But like us here on Hilltop, we were just as proud once our project was finished.

I observed a Vietnamese walking by the wall and some of the expressions on people's faces. I thought to myself "Hey, they lost more of thier people than we did, plus much of their countryside and resources." I could see that even this fact could not remove some of the deep scars people still felt.

Finally, I met a gentleman at the wall who said he was with the 173rd. What ever that meant sure caused a stir with other veterans who were visiting the wall this day. I was honored to share a few touching moments with him. Anyway, here are some pictures. Hope you enjoy them. 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





# "The Cornerstone" of Performing Arts (Pantages) prepares for a museum

The Pantages Theatre has a long history with Tacoma. In 1918, Vaudeville was seen for the first time by local residents at the Pantages Theater. In 1932, The Roxy Theater arrived and brought memorable shows to many, until the current restoration, which began in 1978 and was completed in 1983.

In speaking with Charlee Parker-Glock, Marketing and Education Manager, I was told that the Pantages is the "cornerstone" of the Broadway Center, which is the group of theaters (including the Rialto) located along 9th and Broadway, in downtown Tacoma. But there's more. Charlee says that "the Pantages is the cornerstone of performing arts for the entire South Puget Sound!."

I spoke with Mr. Rui Rodriguez, who recently moved to the Hilltop from California. He works with the Broadway Center in the maintenance division. He is also a talented artist. He was asked by Babe Lehrer, board member of the Pantages, to design a replica of an original cornerstone of the building which was saved during the last restoration (see picture below).

Ms. Lehrer plans to erect a museum filled with the rich history of the Pantages. This actual cornerstone will be the "cornerstone" of the museum, once completed. Keep up the good work, folks!




