## EDITORIAL

Violence, Violence, Violence!!! It's the same old story. Each day, we find ourselves poised for the morning addition of the newspaper to see what type of violent act has impacted our communities and neighborhoods. We have grown accustomed as a society to accept situations as hopeless when in fact, with a little effort by the powers that be, we can change this thing around.

But many have been asking, "What can I do?" You would think that with over 30 agencies supposedly serving areas such as Hilltop, that we should be closer to resolving at least some of the issues of violence that are plaguing us. All it takes is a drive down 23rd, 11th, K STreet (yes, I said K st!), 9th or any number of current areas in the Hilltop Community. You will find that there are literally hundreds of people out in the street daily, crying out for help. Granted, what many of our neighbors have had to do just to survive has created violence in this community.

Instead of always focusing on the effects of this violence, can we discuss a few options (other than more police!) that could speak directly at the issues? Many people are tired of hedging around the issues anyway. Let's face it, this isn't about gangs, drugs, homelessness or any number of ;social ills. Violence exists because of the lack of non-violent activities. That's right, as simple as it may seem, if we are to curb the rising level of violence, we need more non-violent things such as jobs, recreational activities housing, preventive health care and education.

This may sound like a long list of request, but when you look at the make up of a stable neighborhood, you see a balanced blend of each of those items I just mentioned. Many would argue that there are already facilities like that in the Hilltop Community. Yes, but one must also realize that when the Boy's Club was a foundation in the community, it was set up to accommodate the community. The People's Center use to be the Malcom X Center and a young person would have to wait his or her turn just to get in the front door.

Again, you had a community-run facility and people wanted to be there. This promoted non-violence. Young people were taught to respect their elders because of all the interaction. There was no need for many of the programs that exist today because people were involved in non-violent activity.

Also, when there were businesses owned and operated by people from the Black Community (Walker's Exxon, 24 Flavors, Mr. T's, Clarence Petit's 7-11, etc.), there were non-violent opportunities to make a living. Can you see what I am getting at?

Violence has truly gotten out of hand. If we are to win this battle for our children, community and way of life, we must take what available resources we have and create environments that will promote non-violent behavior and activity. You don't have to live on Hilltop to be effected by what happens here. So, if you or your community would like some focus and direction, maybe we can help. Give us a call!!!

#### IS THERE....

UNITY IN THE BLACK COMMUNITY? By Dangerous

Was the B.C.U.D., (Black Community Unity Day), successful in what it originally set out to accomplish? In some ways yes, in a lot of ways no. The Black Community Unity Day concept was initially derived from a rap show featuring the group Bloods and Crips. The group was scheduled to perform at Temple Theatre on September 19, 1993. But after the article in Sunday's News Tribune (September 12, 1993), public opinion was altered. Many people believed that the purpose of the event was to promote gang violence.

How could this be when the title of the event was "Unity"? Is not Unity a peaceful condition? By Monday afternoon the promoters went through various setbacks. After reading Sunday's newspaper, the insurer backed out of the event, the owner of the theatre received several threat calls, and since the City was not notified, they declined to support the event. In other words, the idea of bringing the Bloods and Crips together for a peace rally was somehow threatening and dangerous. The promoters had already discussed the event with local gang members (primarily the older ones) from both the Bloods and the Crips who were willing to volunteer their time as consultants and security.

The concert was only one part of an entire event which would have included keynote speakers from the Evergreen State College (Tacoma Campus), The Nation of Islam, and some local churches just to name a few. The fruit of Islam, Bob's Security Service, four off-duty police officers, and several local residents had agreed to help with the security. Some of our community artist works with the them "Unity" was planning to be on hand. The concert would have opened with a prayer lead by Rev. R. S. Brazil. Both the Bloods and the Crips felt this could help resolve some of their matters.

This event was an attempt to show the high risk Black Youth that we, as a diverse Black Community can come together for the common cause of saving them from street violence. So what if it was the newspaper article that informed people of the event, the problem is why it there was more negativism than support.

After having an up and down week, the promoters were determined to have the event no matter what. It ended up being an open forum of discussion amongst members of the community at the People's Center. No rap music, no keynote speaker, no Bloods, just a few Crips and a few local residents. This was very good in itself, it just needed more support to make for a larger turn out. Hopefully we will continue this event annually. PEACE!

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


