






ecently, I was speaking with a good friend of

mine, Brother Anthony Muhammad. We had been talking about the percentage high of African Americans who are incarcerated and the appalling **number** of African American youth being removed from the school system prior to graduation. Regarding incarceration. Brother Anthony says,"Ya know, we should start a Boycott... Just Jail Don't Go!" I was sitting at my computer at the time. I stopped and asked, "What? Just don't go?" Brother Anthony laughed, "Yeah, JUST DON'T GO. It's that simple. Just look at the <u>numbers</u>!"

Well folks, I had to come up with a graphic for that one! And as you can see, it's simple yet captivating. But for many of our folk, it's not that simple. Many of us who are second and third generation inmates find it hard to just stop going to jail. Building jails has become an industry, full of advertising and job opportunities. But... in order to have a jail, one must have prisoners.

I only have a few questions: How much does it take to keep a person locked up for a Pierce month in County? How many African Americans are currently locked up? What is the cost of a years tuition at The Evergreen State College, Tacoma Campus, or any number of trade or vocaschools?How tional much could each taxpayer save by supporting a persons efforts to self-sufficient? be Could someone please tell me?


Brother Anthony and I have been talking it up about this Jail Boycott. People want to know what they can do; how they can get involved. Those who have been prisoners want to know how to break the cycle. Those in the community and organizations want to know what services to offer for this to be successful. All I can say is, it's going to be a tough challenge. Old, negative ideals don't die easily. It will also take time for people who have spent years in the system, to see themselves as anything than other an "INMATE."

There will be more information coming on October 16, 1997, so stay tuned. If we would just do some **basic math**, we would see how much we all could save... in the form of lives and money!

The contractors who currently build the jails, could begin building schools, affordable housing... or whatever. The inmates could start building a future and contributing to society.

Let's get legislation passed making it mandatory for an officer to give you his/her name, badge number and reason for the stop. If you have been stopped for a specific infraction, then an officer should have no problem providing you with this information.

The days of going down to "city hall" to complain about an issue "after the fact," are over. If we are to overcome injustice, we must become part of the process itself. That means we must begin to propose alternatives of our own.

Let's start reading, watching and talking about the issues that affect us the most. Then, let's start DOING something about it.

I've been hearing people say that this might be a cold hard winter because of "El Nino" or the Ozone or something else that somebody done made up. At any rate, I guess that it's time to "really" prepare for the winter. I'm excited because there are so many things to talk about as summer is closing. School is getting ready to start (in fact, school is in by the time you get this paper).

A few weeks ago a Policeman was shot by a man who was having problems with his wife. Of course the policeman was described as a "Hero" and it seems that the system was ready to roll out the fancy big funeral and hoopla that should be reserved for only the really "special people." I don't agree that a person is special just because of his job or position. But here we got people thinking that all police are special....(and we damn sho' know that that ain't true!!! This particular cop sho' wasn't no hero or special person to a whole bunch of young black people and their families (May his soul rest in peace).

Princess Diana got killed in a car wreck over

the Labor Day weekend. The amount of conversation and sympathy that was generated by her death was astonishing. You could walk past the cardboard /blue tarp tenthousing underneath any freeway bridge and hear Po' folk talking about "Princess Diana". Little kids, welfare recipients, any and everybody had something to say. They talked about how "it is so sad... it's a shame that the two kids are left without a mother", and all of the other comments that people make when someone has died.

All Lives <u>ARE</u> Precious. I'm reminded of that daily as I see and talk with some of the truly special people in our community. I realize that someone who I think is special, may not be so special to you.

But, there are some folks that I think we all can agree on. "Daisy" was one of those. Daisy Stallworth was a member in good standing in the black community, starting from the time of her Black Beauty Products store on "K" street, until now. A beautiful black woman who a lot of people are going to miss. I think that Daisy can be counted amongst the Black women like the Maxine Mimms', Virginia Taylors', and Mary Hunts' (just kiddin'...and that's not to say

that Mary wasn't special), of our community.

I think that public displays of sympathy and grief should be saved for the truly special people who have been a real asset to our communities and lives.

Now, just because not everybody is considered "special," doesn't mean that their life is not "Precious." EVERY-BODY'S LIFE IS PRE-CIOUS.

The other day I had the chance to sit and watch some kids play and gather at the park across the street from one of my old friend's house. The monument, there is an inscription that reads "All Lives Are Precious." I watched the kids for a long period of time but all that I observed them doing was being disrespectful and violent toward the other kids. They said that they were only playing and trying to be "cool" (or whatever they call it being nowadays). They wrestled, hit, shoved, tripped, and generally harassed each other the whole time they "played". Some little white kids came to play and the black kids called them ""honkey's", white trash," and other names. I finally had to get up and go over to tell them that in that park "all lives are precious" and that means that you should treat all lives with some sort of respect. I told them that you can't respect others by calling them names and by talking bad about them.

As I walked away and glancing back, I could see that the kids now were playing peacefully and sittin' and talking civilly. Now, that brings up another subject...The role of the adult in the lives of our kids.

Back in the old days the whole community looked out for your kids. If ole' lady Shubutay saw you doing something that she know your parents didn't let you do, she would stop you and then go tell your parents.

We couldn't get away with nothin' back in the day. But nowadays, we as adults, don't hardly intervene at all. We can see kids smoking and cussing and we don't say anything. In fact, most of these kids look pretty scary to us, so we be thinkin' that we don't want to have to "throw down" (or get thrown down).

But, I found out in talking with the kids this weekend that if you talk to them with respect, and you make some kind of sense, then they will listen to you. I think that we should intervene more often in order to teach our kids to show respect to each other and adults.
