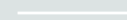

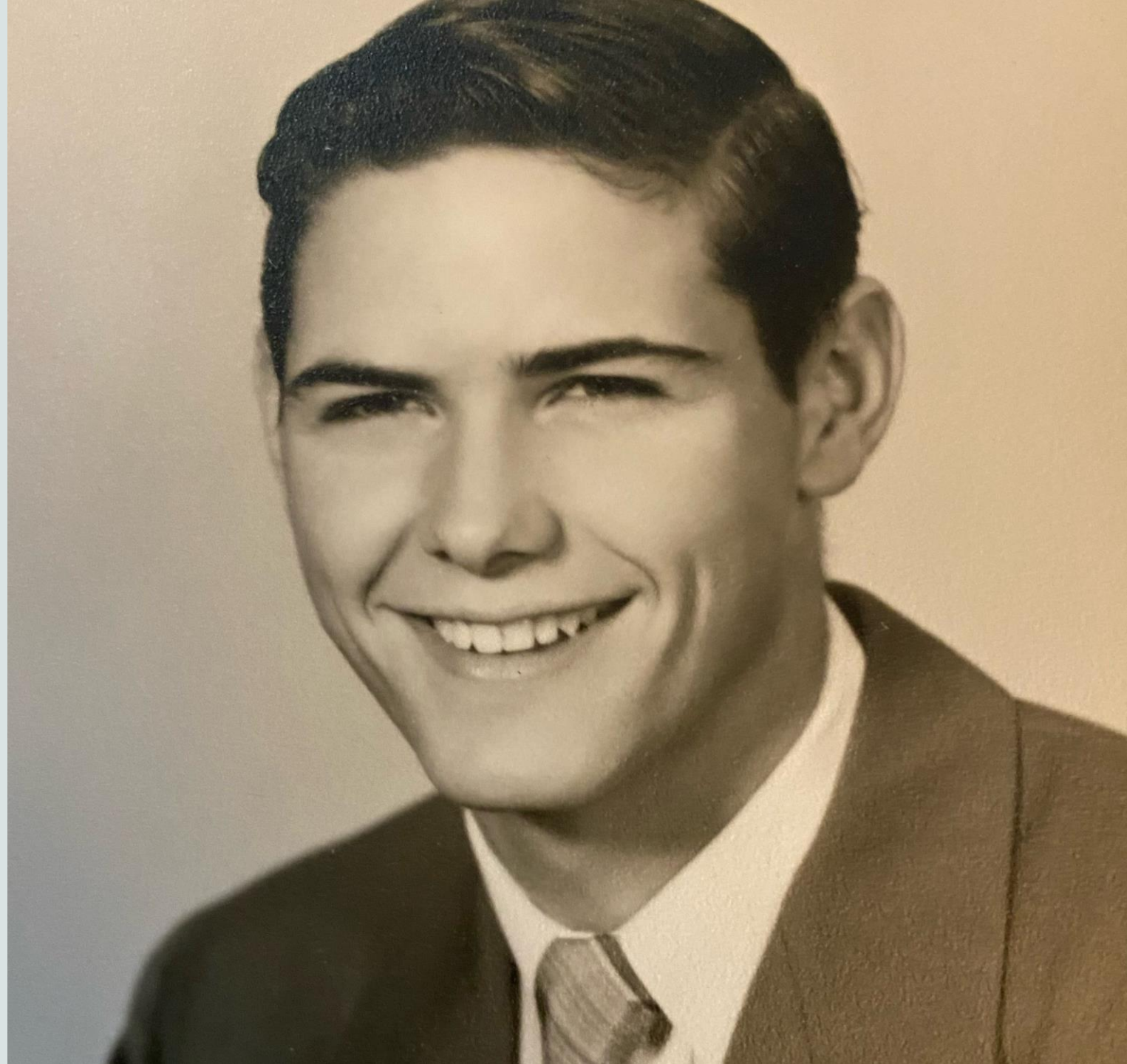

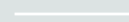

I probably first met John when I first started working at Oasis in 2001. At the time, due to hostility against LGBTQ people and safety concerns, Oasis was in a confidential location off Bridgeport in University Place. John volunteered for Thursday night check-ins and special events like Oasis's LGBTQ prom. The prom was a big deal, especially at the time because it was one of the few activities that was in a public space (Mountaineer's Club).

John also took the lead to ensure that youth knew about civic and organizing activities in advance of the Tacoma United for Fairness Campaign (TUFF) to get citywide LGBTQ non-discrimination protections. He was often the point of contact for Oasis when we attended campaign events at the TUFF headquarters (Barb Montro's building).

In 2011, Oasis founded Bridge-Builders, a community action council of youth and adults coming together to tend to the specific needs of LGBTQ youth countywide. John was a founding Bridge-Builder and was generous in lending his time, money, and attention to an effort that was radical because it brought young people and adults together to shape the future of the organization and our community. John did the same with Oasis and Rainbow Center co-located a few years later.

John inspired, shaped, and deepened the civic commitment and participation of several generations of Oasis youth members across at least two decades.

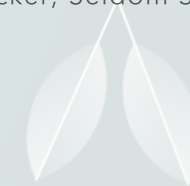

“I considered John to be a friend and loyal supporter during my campaigns for mayor. I must say that there were many times when he was also my teacher, mentor and advisor on issues related to social justice. In this regard, I can say that I was often his student on these issues—particularly as they related to gay rights. I can recall some time back, our conversations regarding the issue of civil unions and marriage equality and how they were simply not the same. Despite his patience and I might say persistence, I confess that I just wasn’t getting it. That was until I recall him saying: “Bill, you have the option of marriage or civil union. Correct? I do not, and that’s not just or right.” At that very moment, I got it. I am delighted that through John’s efforts and many, many others, we now see nearly 80 percent of the people in this country finally do get it. John left a quite a legacy. John McCluskey was an inspiration, mentor, and instigator. John understood that change happens bit by bit, building up to a sea change hopefully in one's lifetime. John dedicated countless hours to mentoring anyone willing to listen and volunteering evenings at Oasis Youth Center where youth would frequently comment that they had never met a gay man of his distinguished age. He served on many boards including Equal Rights Washington, PCAF, Oasis Youth Center, and Pride Foundation. Perhaps more than all of these investments combined, John along with his husband Rudy, taught our community how to love.

Unapologetically. Fiercely. And with lots of humor. John was sometimes a bit dramatic, uncompromising that we hold higher standards for what's possible, and willing to lead by example. While John is no longer with us, his deep love of community - for Rudy and Tacoma - will live on for decades to come.

"Marshall McClintock and Geoff Corso moved to Tacoma in 2002 during the TUFF campaign. John and Rudy had an extensive network and brought us into it. When Rudy had the stroke in circa Aug. 2006, Marshall, I and many others saw an opportunity to repay John and Rudy for their community leadership and kindnesses. During the past 16 years, many people have helped John and Rudy fulfill basic needs including moving services and housing, applying for homecare services and providing homecare services, grocery shopping, bookkeeping and accounting, planning and hosting their wedding, transportation to doctor appointments and social events, and much more. Most of these services were provided for free to them, and I think this speaks volumes to the impact John and Rudy made in the community before the stroke upended their lives."
