Civic Center Receives New Roof

The "grande dame" of Vaughn is receiving a make-over! Thanks to the generous \$30,000 grant from the Ben Cheney Foundation, the roof of the main building of the Civic Center was replaced in February. Last October, a \$16,000 grant from the Gottfried and Mary Fuchs Foundation funded the new roof and painting of the smaller building. The Russell Family Foundation and the Angel Guild have also contributed to the renovation efforts. The Civic Center Board hopes to have funding in place soon for the painting of the main building. We are truly grateful to these charitable organizations for the wonderful support which makes capital improvements at the Civic Center possible.

With the exterior projects completed, the Board's next task is to undertake the renovation of the gymnasium. We will be seeking funding to paint the interior, replace the ceiling and renovate the stage and entryway. The Angel Guild has already commenced the funding drive for the new ceiling with a \$3,000 contribution.

The Connection Between Your Home and Shellfish

Do you know where the wastewater from your home goes? "That's easy," you may think, "into my septic system." But are you sure? It's all too common to have a leak in your system or a failure in your drainfield and not know it. If this is the case, the answer to the question would then be, "My wastewater goes into a creek, drainage ditch or the Sound." If so, the result is a health risk to your family and your neighbors from direct contact with bacteria-contaminated shellfish from the beach.

To help prevent this health risk and to keep our valuable water resources clean, the Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department is partnering with the Key Peninsula-Gig Harbor-Islands (KGI) Watershed Council. The approach includes checking septic systems to see that they are operating properly and providing information on ways to ensure your system is well maintained in order to prevent a failure and to save you money.

The Health Department and KGt Watershed Council plan to work with the residents of Dutchers Cove, Filucy Bay and Vaughn Bay because water sampling tells us these areas have a water quality problem and a major cause appears to be failing septic systems.

The thought of a failing septic system is a frightening one for many people because of the potential expense required to repair or replace the system. However, if it is found that your system is "failing" a complete replacement is often unnecessary. In some cases it may be as simple as fixing a broken transfer line.

To learn more about what you can do to help protect your health and water quality and to hear what the Health Department and KGI Watershed Council can do to assist you, a public meeting is being held at the Key Peninsula Civic Center in the Whitmore Room on Thursday, April 26th, beginning at 7 PM. Earthquake Assistance

If you suffered earthquake damage you have until April 28 to register for disaster assistance. FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) may help pay for basic needs not covered under insurance policies. Some disaster aid does not have to be paid back, while other help may be in the form of low interest loans. FEMA representatives will explain the details when called on the toll-free registration number listed above and you can file for help by phone.

If you would rather meet face to face with a FEMA representative, they are located at their new Tacoma Disaster Recovery Center at 3639 South Pine St. (the former Costco building). Hours are Monday through Friday 9:00 AM to 6:00 PM and Saturdays, 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM. This Center is closed on Sundays. Representatives from FEMA, SBA, the American Red Cross, Pierce County Emergency Management and the City of Tacoma are all at the Center. Information is also available from the Internal Revenue Service, Housing and Urban Development, legal services and Washington State Employment Security.

State and federal officials continue to urge disaster victims to call the registration number, 1-800-462-9029. Eight counties, including Pierce, King, Kitsap and Mason, have been declared federal disaster areas and are eligible for Individual Assistance and are being considered for Public Assistance. Persons covered by insurance may receive assistance from the government for areas not covered by the insurance.

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A View From Home

The Riders are coming! The Riders are coming! No, not Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders. Not the Riders of the Purple Sage. Not even the Ghost Riders in the Sky. I'm talking about the ones that really spell trouble with a capital T, the ones emanating from the halls of Congress in the other Washington.

It's not that we haven't had riders on federal laws before. But in the "good old days" they were used mostly for "pork-barrel" projects. Basically, a rider is a provision attached usually to an appropriation bill. The problem with riders is that they often get tacked onto the main bill the night before it comes up for a vote and there's no time to discuss it or for public input. Spending bills go through a lot of negotiating before a final version is voted on, and the vote is usually on a "take-it-or-leave-it" basis, with no further amending. So if a member of Congress wants to get something through that probably wouldn't make it on its own merits, the object of the rider is to ride through on the coattails of the important spending bill.

A big change in the use of riders took place in 1995. They became an effective tool for getting rid of various environmental regulations. For example, a senator offered a rider to prevent any new additions to the Endangered Species Act. A representative from the Detroit area has three times introduced a rider to prevent federal agencies from doing anything to decrease the emission of "greenhouse gases". So he has effectively undermined implementation of a global agreement involving more than 100 countries and thousands of scientists. And the public doesn't even know this is happening.

The only effective way to stop these riders up to now has been for the president to veto or threaten to veto a bill that has one or more of these riders attached, Clinton, from 1995 to 2000, blocked more than 75 anti-environmental riders. One of them would have eliminated tax incentives for renewable energy technologies and energy efficiency programs.

How will the new president deal with these riders? Hang on to your hats, the environment of our planet could be in for a wild ride.

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

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To Your Health

To continue my theme this year of the future of medicine in the new millenium, I'd like to spend a little time looking at robotic surgery. I'm not talking about R2-D2 at the operating table, but real live doctors using real live computerized robotic techniques to operate on real live patients

One of the breakthroughs in surgery over the past two decades has been the development of endoscopic surgery - surgical procedures done through a small incision using long tubes with either a light source or operating instruments on their tips. This has allowed the laparoscopic removal of the gallbladder, arthroscopic repair of the injured meniscus of the knee, and scores of other "minimally invasive" procedures. The end result is a smaller surgical wound that heals faster and a shorter recovery time for the patient.

The next logical step has been the development of computer guided surgical instruments directed by a surgeon sitting at a computer console instead of at the patient's side. The surgeon uses a 3 dimensional computer-generated image of the affected organs, and, using robotic effector instruments (think of an extremely sophisticated joystick), operates inside the patient. Theoretically the surgeon doesn't have to be in the same building as the patient, but there has to be someone on site who can take care of the patient in case something goes wrong. That means there has to be a surgeon in the patient's area who could open up the patient and conclude the operation the old fashioned way if necessary.

Robotic surgery is in use in Europe and is being tested in the United States. Over 60 closed chest coronary artery bypass graft surgeries have been performed, and this looks to be one of the primary uses in the future. Don't look for C3P0 in our Key Center office soon, but his cousin may be working at Tacoma General or St. Joseph's Hospital soon.

The IRA: Your Power Tool For Retirement

For home improvement professionals, gone are the days of plain old hammers and screwdrivers. For speed and convenience, they rely on power tools.

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The Garden In April 2001

Tomato seeds are germinating in the window sill pots and will be ready to set out in late May. Many gardeners save their own seed by choosing those tomatoes that have characteristics that please them. Tomatoes come true to type because each flower has both male and female parts and bees do not visit to bring other pollen. Gently dribble seeds onto a paper towel and allow to dry and eat the rest of the fruit.

Tomatoes like sandy, well drained soil, but appreciate watering during dry weather. Do not sprinkle or get water on the leaves. To extend their season in the late summer and early fall, arrange a sheet of clear plastic supported by sticks and held down on its edge by rocks. On sunny days, remove it during the warm part of the day and replace it at night. This system may prevent tomato wilt that often causes early death of the plant.

Red or green pepper seeds can be used from a mature grocery store fruit and started in window sill pots a week or so later than tomatoes. They go into the garden in June. They like well drained warm soil and benefit from water and fertilizer.

Root crops such as turnips, rutabagas, beets, leeks and onion sets can be planted now. Hold off until late June to plant carrot seed if carrot root worm is a threat in your area. The tiny fly that lays the eggs around each seedling has come and gone. Most varieties of carrots will provide food all winter long when planted late.

This is flower season for many perennials, shrubs and bulbs. Wild flowers such as Trillium, checker lilies (Fritillaria), dog toothed violet (Erythronium), and camas (Camassia) are in full bloom, while false Solomon's Seal (Smilacina), fairy bells (Disporum) and wild irises are in bud.


