So when the little ones reach school age (hopefully our educational system may reach the point where children are taught the basics and ability to think and speak their thoughts clearly) not how to play, disrespect authority, sex and foolish abstracts.

Thanks to Ruth Little. You gave me the fun of seeing the quilt display - food for thought of our brave pioneers who started this American art of necessity. Cloth was so scarce, every tiny scrap of material had to be used - nothing wasted.

Also, thanks for the fun of remembering having helped to set up a very special display at Henry Gallery, of antique dolls. In those years, always having loved dolls, I was active in the Seattle Doll Collectors Club. I joined it, at its beginning, when three of our sons left for overseas service. It was the first such club in Seattle, but now there are dozens of organizations in that vicinity. Two early members faithfully attended from Tacoma. Now, of course, there are several in Tacoma, but they have become so highly specialized - so few oldies extinct - not such fun! Also we served as hostess at the phenomenal doll show at the World's Fair in 1962. Enough?



REPORT ON TANSY RAGWORT

The Pierce County Weed Board took a strong stand on control of Tansy Ragwort duringthe summer of 1981.

According to Woody Bernard, Area Extension AGent, the Board has begun court proceedings against 67 landowners, including timber companies whose neighbors have complained because they have not controlled Tansy. Those people can be found quilty of a misdemenor and subject to a fine of \$500.

Board members also have contracted with spray services to cut and spray two parcels of land that have been heavily infested for several years. In both cases, the land owners have been billed for that expense. If not paid, the bill will be attached as a tax lien to the property.

In addition to regulatory control of Tansy Ragwort, the Weed Board has provided information and cost-sharing programs for county residents also. Over 5000 phone calls were recorded on the weed phone and over 3000 personal contacts were made. Sprayers were purchased and made available for over 1000 use days during the short period they have been available.

At a recent meeting, the Board approved an increased amount of cost share money for chemicals to be used for fall spraying. For further information on Tansy Ragwort control call the Weed Board office at 535-0600. An6 Tansy plants killed this fall will not be around next spring.





ACCIDENT PREVENTION:

PLAYPENS: The safest playpens are those with the mesh sides and padded surfaces. Watch for pinch points, sharp corners, breakable plastic ornaments, loose fitting hardware, and decorations that might come loose and be inhaled. Slats and side rails should be free of splinters and have nontoxic surfaces. Slats should be no more than $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 inches apart. Don't use the play pen in a moving motor vehicile.



Each member is ask to bring one dozan cookies and a \$1.00 gift. Cars meet at the civic center parking lot about 12:15, for those who need rides or directions.


SQUARE DANCERS

The mushroom crop didn't amount to much at the beginning of the Season: the ground was too dry in most places. But when the rains began and the weather stayed mild, they exploded all over the woods. There was a great variety of species to be found - really exciting for the true mycologist. I have never seen such large specimens of King Boletus. Most of the fungi were of no interest to the average 'pot hunters' since they are interested in edible mushrooms only. I'm definitely in that class so I limited my picking mostly to chanterelles. A day spent in the woods looking for mushrooms is such fun!

I must tell you about my last trip to gather mushrooms. A friend and I were sauntering about in opposite directions as we often do. She met a man picking brush who asked whether she had permission to be there. She assured him that she was with Mrs. Little who had been talking to the owner of that property. He then asked whether Mrs. Little had ever taught school and when she told him "yee", he joined her until they came to the spot where I had discovered come chanterelles.

My, here I've written a couple of pages about mushrooms and digressions related to them and I planned to write just a sentence or two. Mushroom season is just about past and Christmas season is almost here.

When I was a child back in the stone age, Christmas decorations were done the day before Christmas. This was not a peculiarity of just the Putnam family. All of our friends and neighbors in Spokane celebrated Christmas that way. Of course there were no Christmas trees for sale in the stores. Everyone went to the woods and cut a tree. It was trimmed the night before Christmas after the children went to bed. When we grew older we were allowed stay up and trim the tree and we feasted on pop corn and apples which were a nightly ritual at our home My father popped (downstairs in the furnace) a huge dish pan of pop corn almost every night and of course we always had lots of apples.

In those days all trees were lighted by real candles which fit into a small metal clip that snapped onto the branches of the tree. It makes me shudder now just to think of the danger but I never heard of anyone having a fire. Those twinkling candles were beautiful! In fact even after I began teaching, we used real candles on our trees at school programs and also church "Christmas Exercises" as they were called. Seems incredible now.

In those days children got just a few simple presents - two or three. We hung our stockings and guess what was the big deal in them - an orange and a banana. Of course those fruits were not commonplace. At our home we had lots of delicious candy, cookies and cakes.

Now when I shop for my greatgrand-children, I'm disturbed at how difficult it is to find any toys or games that aren's shoddy junk - poorly built, mechanical toys that barely last through the holidays. They are a waste of money and bad training for the children. I understand that there will be some sturdy home made wooden toys for sale at our next Arts and Crafts show. 





YEAR END TAX PLANNING

Today is not too early to think about actions affecting your 1981 federal income tas return---- January 1 may too late. We'll try to point out a few items and give an overview of items to consider. For specific questions we advise consulting with your tax advisor.

USE PENCIL AND PAPER, good strategy will generally call for accelerating deductions to reduce 1981 income and postponing income to 1982 which will be taxed at a lower rate. At this point, listing 1981 income and deductions to date and highlight those which might be controllable at reporting time.

1. Zero Bracket Amount: The zero bracket amount provides most taxpayers a standard, minimum deduction from adjusted income; a married joint return will eventually be sold at a loss, allows \$ 3400, Married separate is \$1700 and single is \$ 2300. A cash basis taxpayer can determine if such items as interest, charitable contributions, and medical expense are most uctible taxes can be timed, too, if advantageous in 1981 or 1982.

2. Year End Payments by check, note or credit card. A cash-basis taxpayer will obtain the deduction when paid; Further, a check delivered to a payee before the year end (even if not cashed until 1982) will be a 1981 deduction. A tax deductible

deductible in 1981 even though payment before January 1, will allow the lump is made next year. The counterpart also holds, a check recieved in 1981 is tax tables. income even though cashed in 1982.

If retiring this year or next it may be important to ask your employer to pay you the total benefit within one year to qualify for lump sum treatment.




