

Home Cemetery Dedicated

On a beautiful sunny Saturday, April 22, about 75 interested people gathered for the dedication of the

Old Home Cemetery.

The cemetery was established in 1921 through a 2.5 acre gift from Joseph Heiman to the Peninsula Social Club. In 1944, the Social Club asked the Peninsula Heritage Land Trust to assume ownership of the property and place it under perpetual care to protect it forever under conditions specified in the transfer deed. The transfer took place in February this year.

Only one gravestone remained from the original site. Thanks to Paul Woodman of Home, several gravesites were re-located and marked and a trail was cut through

Summer

Fun Camp

Last summer the Key Peninsula CivicCenter offered its first Summer Fun Camp which was a tremendous success. It served over one hundred and twenty Key Peninsula children ages five to fourteen and provided jobs for low income youth through the Summer Youth Employment & Training Program. It was set up with the focus of providing low-income children the opportunity to participate in a day camp experience at a nominal fee. Although the daily fee for camp was only \$1 a day, almost half of its participants were on scholarships. (The scholarships were provided through generous donations from area service organizations and businesses such as Key Center Key Bank and Telco Community Credit Union).


However, the Summer Fun Camp concept and future is now in jeop-The requested additional funding is not available for this summer's camp. Although many businesses and organizations have once again pledged their support, it will not be enough to cover the expenses of the camp. Another forseeable problem is the Key Peninsula Civic Center Association is unable to have their Director support the camp on a full-time basis like it did in 1994.

The Family Resource Center, Children's Home Society of Washington, Tacoma/Pierce County Health Department and the K.P. Civic Center Director have all been instrumental in helping to set up a broad spectrum of new programs for the anticipated 1995 Summer Fun Camp. However, with these new problems, the camp has become only a possibility, all of which has left organizations such as the Family Resource Center concerned about how the community will be affected if the program is discontinued. Many parents have already voiced a definite need and desire for the camp to continue again this summer. As of April 26, over thirty calls had been logged by the Civic Center office and

the Family Resource Center concerning the 1995 Summer Fun Camp. Many of the calls were parents seeking early applications for their children.

Thus, the Family Resource Center (884-5433) staff is now quickly working towards an alternative such as the possibility that they will be able to offer "children's activities" on certain days throughout the sum-

Basic Obedience Dog Training



1995 Property Value Notifications

Barbara Gelman, Assessor-Treasurer, announced that the 1995 property value notices will be mailed in early May. If there was no change in the property value, then the taxpayer will not receive a new property value notice. The 1995 appraised property values are used as a base for calculating the property tax due for payment in 1996.

While most property owners will see an average increase of three to four percent over their 1994 property value, a few areas will see a larger increase. The larger increases are due to substantial sale price

increases in particular areas of the county.

Gelman said "those taxpayers who believe their 1995 property value appraisal is higher than the current fair market price in their area, or have facts to support a lower appraisal value, should contact the Assessor-Treasurer's office to discuss the specific details concerning their property (475-9555)." The Assessor-Treasurer further stated that these property value appraisals are for 1996 taxes and will have no impact on the current 1995 property taxes.


New Opthalmologist Office Locating In Key Center

Well, it seems we have made it through another tax season, and even if it sounds trite we have to start thinking about taxes due April 15, 1996. Some of the things I found that could be improved on, when clients bring in their tax information is to better organize the data submitted. If you deal in the stock market, keep the record of your purchase with your income tax records. Then if you sell that stock, you can put your sale record with your purchase record because you will need it to report the complete stock transaction. It saves an extracall to the stock broker. 

TO YOUR HEALTH

Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) continues to be the leading cause of death in infants from 1-12 months of age in the United States. Despite years of studies, no definitive cause has been identified. Like many other problems in medicine, SIDS may be the result of a host of factors and defects, but a slow consensus is building that the position the infant sleeps in may be an important factor. The American Academy of Pediatrics has spon-sored a "Back to Sleep" campaign, where they urge parents to place their infants on their backs or sides for sleep, and not on their stomachs. This applies basically to all healthy infants, and is coupled with the recommendations that they sleep on a firm surface, with no compressible pillows in the bed with them. It's estimated that currently 75% of children in this age group in the U.S. sleep on their stomachs. In

other countries around the world where a similar program to support sleeping supine (on your back) for infants, a significant drop in SIDS approaching 50% was observed. Cultural differences as well asother factors may preclude this dramatic a change here, but it is a simple thing to do, and the consensus is building among doctors it's probably the safest sleeping position for our infant patients.

While I'm talking about prevention for children, I want to put in a plug for the Key Peninsula Health Center's Well Child Clinic. Although sponsored by the KPHC, it's held in my office at the Key Medical Center at 15610 89th St. KPN each Tues. at 9:00 am, on a first come first serve basis. It's open to all children living on the Key Peninsula up to age 12 years. The \$10 donation to the KPHC covers the child's exam as well as the needed immunizations and office labs, and arrangements can be made for those unable to pay. Remember all kids entering sixth grade next year will require a second MMR immunization, so this may be an opportunity to get that in before the school year is over. 

Election Ballot To Be "All-By-Mail"

Pierce County Auditor Cathy Pearsall-Stipek has announced that the September 1995 Primary Election will be conducted almost all by mail, rather than in the traditional polling places such as schools, fire stations, and grange halls.

The vote-by-mail option was given to county auditors by the Washington State Legislature in 1993, and the option extends from June 9, 1994, to June 9, 1996.

The Auditor claims that the voteby-mail method will result in higher voter participation and a possible 30% to 40% reduction in election costs "if all goes as planned."

An exception to the new voting method will be provided for those who feel a need to actually go to a polling place in that there will be 12 locations "strategically placed throughout the County for those

who wish to deposit their vote-bymail ballots in a secure ballot box." The locations of these depositories will be announced sometime prior to the upcoming September elec-
