Pioneer Days celebration - August 6 and 7 Family fun, games, entertainment, food!

The Key Peninsula Civic Center Association and Key Peninsula News are co-sponsors of Pioneer Days, a celebration of history and living on the Key Peninsula. The celebration begins at 10:30 am with the parade which will march down Highway 302 from Key Center to the Civic Center in Vaughn (the old high school now remodeled into a wonderful multi-use facility). Plenty of free parking is available in the fields just west of Key Center and bus shuttles will transport you to and from the festivities for just 25¢ per person or \$1 per family.

Opening ceremonies begin at the conclusion of the parade (11 am) and then the real fun begins. Free games for kids of all ages begin immediately in the arena at the end of the grass field. Free entertainment commences on the flag pole stage in front of the Civic Center. The Midway, between the Center and the arena, will be filled with games that offer you the chance to test your skills, free demonstrations and tastey delights cooked up by local and area concessionaires.

Animals of all shapes and descriptions will be on view in the arena starting at 3:30 pm with ample seating for over 400 in the bleachers erected for this two-day event. And finally, a free display of the baking acumen of children ages 4 to 18 who will have their best cookies, bread and cakes on display in the Civic Center for all to see.

Judging of the baking, and of the animals in the arena, will be going on all day August 6 and 7 and the winners will be announced and ribbons awarded at 5 pm on Sunday, August 7.

Free big-screen viewing of the Seafair hydroplane trials on Saturday and the races on Sunday will be available for adults in the authentic Beer Garden located just west of the Center on the tennis courts. Strict control of alcohol by off-duty police will ensure a great time for all. The Beer Garden is the ONLY place alcohol may be consumed on the grounds. This will be strictly enforced.

This is the biggest and best celebration you will have an opportunity to attend this summer, next to the Puyallup Fair! Come on down to the Key Peninsula Civic Center and get in touch with your roots. It's everything you want a great celebration to be.

Free parking for all - lots of room!

One of the great challenges in putting on a celebration with the scope of the New Pioneer Days is handling the number of people expected to attend. In past years parking overflowed the limited space available at the Center and nearly blocked the street in front, which would have severely handicapped emergency vehicles had they been needed.

This year parking areas have been secured just over the hill from the Civic Center, insuring ample parking for all. The large field just west of Key Center will be available, with Boy and Girl Scouts, the VFW and others assisting with parking. A bus company has agreed to provide transportation to and from the

Civic Center for 25¢ a person (\$1 maximum per family) each way.

Nothing could be simpler! Free parking, nearly free transportation right to the front door of the Civic Center and Scouts and the VFW to watch after your car during the celebration.

Note: limited handicapped parking will be available on Civic Center grounds for those with a state permit.

So pack up the whole family and drive on down to PIONEER DAYS '88. Take State Highway 302 to Key Center, go west on 92nd and follow the signs to PIONEER DAYS '88 - A CELEBRATION OF FAMILY FUN!

Parade route outlined

Beginning early Saturday morning, August 6, parade entrants will gather at the K & J Feed Store just south of Key Center. Promptly at 10:30 am the parade will leave K & J Feed and go north on Key Peninsula Highway to Key Center, west on 302 to the head of Vaughn Bay, then south on S. Vaughn to the Civic Center.

The parade will end about 11:15 and opening ceremonies will start at 11:30 at the Flag Pole Stage in front of the Civic Center.

Celebrity Grand Marshall Joe Guppy (KING-TV "Almost Live") will lead the parade beginning the annual Pioneer Days celebration. The entourage will leave K-J Feed Store at exactly 10:30 am and proceed north through Key Center then west on State Highway 302, arriving at the Civic Center at approximately 11:20 am.

At press time the parade was shaping up nicely with an honor guard, the Farragut Brass Band from Bremerton, Shriners Afifi Clowns, Mountain Man, Sunnycrest Nursery float, an entry from Peninsula Light Company, a 1940 vintage Gibson tractor, Key Peninsula Lions, horses, Cub

Scouts, a 4H group, the Harbor Handlers and Marie the Pet Pig to name only a few. (There persists a rumor that something called the Vaughn Bay Marching Kazoo Band will take part, but only the day of the parade will tell whether such an animal really exists.)

The Key Peninsula Business Association is coordinating this year's parade under the helmsmanship of Cheri Mastro (D.J's Mini Mart), assisted by Fran Kent (Key Accounting), Mary Ann Huntington (Kitsap Pavilion), Marv Keizur (Myr-Mar Accounting) and Doug Blundell (Longbranch Chowder House). It appears their hard work is paying off in the form of another memorable parade.

What is KPCCA?

The Key Peninsula Civic Center Association was started more than 30 years ago for the express purpose of looking after the Civic Center, formerly Vaughn-Union High School.

With expenses mounting and taxes soaring, the Association created the Key Peninsula Park District, establishing in one motion an entity that could raise money through property taxes to support this civic run facility and which could own property not taxable by the state or county. The Association sold to the Park District, for \$1 and other valuable considcrations, the property and improvements of the Civic Center, pledging to continue fund-raising for the support and wellbeing of the facility and agreeing to run the facility for the Park District and the residents of Key Peninsula.

Through thick and thin, the Association has kept that promise. Through contract negotiations with the Park District it had created, through good times and bad, the Association has had a single purpose - the preservation of a community facility for all people, used by any segment of the resident population and available to all whether they had the ability to pay rent or not. To keep the doors open and the programs maintained takes a minimum of \$50,000 each year. The Civic Center Association pays a considerable portion of that yearly expense.

Pioneer Days has been one means of raising funds for Civic Center activities. Others include: two sessions of roller

skating for the youth of the community each Friday night of the school year; Bingo on Wednesday nights; Reno nights; spaghetti dinners; dances; auctions; Mother's Day Brunch; Arts and Crafts shows and much more.

Volunteers make the community what it is. No one gets paid in money for keeping the Center open and running; instead the payoff comes in the form of doing a job well and knowing the work benefits the entire community. You can't put a dollar value on the sense of satisfaction gained from this kind of work.

In that spirit the members of the Civic Center Association say "thank you" for your support of Pioneer Days and all the other activities that help the Civic Center continue to serve the community. KPCCA Executive Committee members are Dale Loy, President; Kay Harvey, Treasurer; Vicki Henschel, past-president; Dan Busz and Rick Oldenburg, atlarge members.
