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
RENO Night

KPCCA Board Meeting Minutes - October 13, 1994

The meeting was called to order by Sylvia Haase, vice president, at 7:30 p.m. The minutes of the September meeting were approved as published. The treasurer's report was approved as presented.

TOPS: Barbara Lewis said light bulbs are needed for the VFW room. The group will be using the room from 6-9, an additional half hour from the original time.

BINGO: Bingo will be held in the Whitmore Room until the furnace is installed. This will keep players in a warm place for the time being.

FURNACE: The permits are all done, contracts are into HUD, and the target date for installation is October 24.

USO DANCE: The dance is scheduled for January 28, 1995. Auditions for entertainment will be held on October 29. There will be a display of cars from the 40's, and a good used car will be raffled off. A no host bar and dinner will be included with dance.

BUILDING & GROUNDS: The buildings have been rekeyed, and only a few keys will be given out to tighten security. Groups have been asked to identify which lockers they are using, as each group is to only have one in use.

SKATING: Stacy reported a new team is taking over skating. It will be for ages 14 and under, and kids will not be allowed to skate if parents do not bring them. Once kids go outside, they will not be allowed to return to skate. Fighting, weapons, or drugs will not be tolerated, and the child will not be allowed to return to skating for the rest of the year.

FLAVOR OF FALL: This event was a great success and realized a profit of approximately \$12,000. Next year, it will be held on September 30, so start thinking about donations and groups who may be willing to donate. HISTORICAL SOCIETY: It was msc we rent the library to the Historical Society for \$200.00 per month plus utilities and a fundraiser for one year

non-exclusive use. The society would like to be moved in by December. STOVE: Bargreen's will be bringing the new kitchen stove and installing it. It was msc to instruct staff to put the Bingo equipment in the single-purpose locked room.

CHRISTMAS FESTIVAL: This is scheduled for November 26. Volunteers are needed for the kitchen, front desk, and set-up.

RENO NIGHT: Scheduled for November 5.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE: Sylvia Haase will chair this committee of five to nominate a secretary and treasurer. Other positions are also vacant on the Board and need to be filled. The meeting adjourned at 8:35 p.m.

Holiday Meals Task Force

This Thanksgiving will bring the Holiday Meals Task Force to the Key Peninsula Civic Center. The Holiday Meals Task force is a coalition of concerned citizens from Pierce County businesses, social services agencies, and dedicated seniors who have banded together to provide a meal service to seniors who are hungry, lonely, and isolated over the holidays.

In previous years the Tacoma Sheraton has prepared a special holiday meal for hundreds of seniors, in the Tacom a area, who otherwise would not have received a hot turkey dinner in a joyful, festive environment. Even those sen-

iors who were home bound found themselves on the receiving end of a holiday meal due to these dedicated volunteers.

Now in 1994 it is possible for the Holiday Meals Task Force to make the Key Peninsula Civic Center a satellite site for the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday. The Task Force will enable those seniors who are in need on the Key Peninsula to receive an old-fashioned turkey dinner in the company of friends at the Civic Center on Thanksgiving Day. 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


Divorce trap - a married couple sold their house for a large gain on which they deferred taxes by indicating that they intended to buy a replacement residence within two years. The next year they divorced. After that, the husband used his half of the sale proceeds to buy a replacement residence within the two-year limit, but the wife did not. Tax Court: The husband had deferred tax on his half of the gain from the house sale, while the wife now owed tax on her half. However, because the initial tax return filed for the year in which the house was sold had been a joint return, the husband was liable for the tax now owed by his former wife, and the IRS could collect it from him. (Note: The past can sneak up and bite you if you are not careful.)

Now is not too early to be getting your information together for your 1994 income tax return - remember that a cancelled check is no longer proof of a charitable contribution - get a receipt from the charity. You can sell securities that have gone down in value to take a loss and then after 31 days buy them back to retain your previous invest-ment position. If you are in business, now is the time to be making equipment purchases, especially if you have had a very good profitable year - you can deduct up to \$17,500 of equipment purchases for 1994.

Now is also a good time to choose your tax preparer - also remember the less expensive one could cost you more in the long run because they have not delivered the best service. You cannot pay too little and expect to get much, sometimes by paying too little we don't get what we expected. Quality is worth





It seems that despite our advances in modern medicine, some bacterial illnesses are destined to remain a threat to the human condition. With the recent rise of Tuberculosis and Syphilis, we are seeing a resurgence of germs developing resistance to our antibiotics, but in India last month doctors faced an even older scourge, the Black Death.

Black Death was the term used to describe the plague as it ravaged medieval Europe. It's caused by a bacteria, Yersinia Pestis, which causes two types of illness. The former, called Bubonic Plague, is spread by infected fleas from rodents. This phase of the infection causes fever, headaches, and painful swelling of lymph glands, and occurs 1 to 7 days after exposure. This type is relatively common, especially amoung people exposed to rodent fleas, and yearly isolated cases are reported from Arizona and the southwest. The Pierce County Health Department used to test fleas from rats down in the tideflats, and their last report of fleas with Yersinia Pestis was in 1946. The much more devasting and communicable form is Pulmonic Plague. In India last month, hundreds of cases and hundreds of deaths were reported from rural regions as well as Bombay, Calcutta, and Delhi. Pulmonic Plague occurs when the germ travels from the lymph glands to the lungs, and is coughed out in an aerosolized form. This spreads the germ quickly, especially in areas where there is overcrowding and poor hygiene. The mortality rate for untreated Pulmonic Plague is 60 - 100%, but it is easily prevented and treated with aggressive modern antibiotics. While we have our problems with access to health care, they obviously pale in comparison to India. The cost of the antibiotics to prevent the spread is literally only pennies a day, but they do not have the system to dispense it.

Kabuki, a Japanese restaurant located in Tacoma on south 38th street next door to the Best Company, is a perfect place to eat if you or one of your guests is unsure about Japanese food. Some of my friends shudder at the mention of raw fish, seaweed, or what they feel are other strange ingredients. Not to worry at the Kabuki. They have something to please almost anyone, including rabid Japanese cuisine fans.

I enjoyed an excellent lunch of thinly sliced bite-sized pieces of New York steak served with a slightly sweetened sauce, a clear miso soup with mushrooms, a beautifully arranged salad of many colored lettuces and a shrimp and vegetable tempura with a dipping

The teriyaki sauce on the steak was the best I have ever tasted. All the flavors were very subtle and blended together in a harmonious whole. I managed to eat every single drop. Tempura is simply deep fried items. The difference is the feathery light coating. And Kabuki has the perfect touch with tempura. The large shrimp was perfectly fresh and perfectly cooked. There were also several pieces of tempura-cooked vegetables including carrot, mushroom, sweet potato (suprisingly good), and onion. My lunch cost \$7.95 and included steamed rice and tea. It was a very satisfying meal ... carefully cooked and presented on the plate with the eye of an



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Using Online Services - Netiquette


Since childhood you have probably learned about etiquette. As a result you learn how to behave in various situations so you would fit in and not make a fool of yourself. Well, if you are going to sit down at your computer and enter the information highway, you better know something about netiquette. Netiquette is the online version of etiquette. It is very important if you are to enjoy

Online services such as Prodigy, America Online, Delphi, Genie, Compuserve and the Internet vary a great deal in terms of what is expected on a bulletin board. There are some general rules that apply to most, but not to all. The Internet is an entity all to itself. It is not monitored by any one and no one owns it. However, the boards or newsgroups may be monitored or not and someone owns each of these groups as they allow the computer space for the interaction

to take place.

First lets talk about bulletin boards also called newsgroups on the Internet. Bulletin boards are the main place a person can interact with groups of other people with common interest. You will most likely find a bulletin board on these services that matches every major interest you have. The Internet has over 6000 newsgroups and the number is increasing daily. Prodigy has in excess of 50 boards with approximately 1000 topics. Other services have varying numbers of boards all on just about every subject you can imagine. Each service sets up boards differently and it is important to understand how they are setup and how they expect you to interact with the board.

When you first log into a group on any service, it is best to spend a little time reading notes and observing how others interact. If you do this before you send a note you will probably see how to fit into the environment you are entering. Different boards tolerate beginner questions better than others. On the Internet there are specific places to go to ask for information. Most general repetitive information is supplied through files called FAQs, which stands for "Frequently Asked Questions." The Internet itself and virtually every board or service on the Internet has several FAQs to help you get started. In addition to hanging out until you see how the board participants interact with each other, these files are essential to making you a good board citizen.



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
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
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Most groups like their users to stick to the topics of that particular board. However, on some services people get to know each other and then converse more casually. This is really not the proper place for this but since many services charge for E-mail the board gets uses as a "free" way to send mail. Remember, however, that the others may be offended by this and everything you write goes out to everyone on the board. Not only that, anyone can take a copy of your note and ship it to anyone or any other board. So be very sure that what you write on a public board is truly for public consumption. Now that all the major services are connected to each other through the Internet, it is literally possible for your note to reach several million people. It is, by the way, improper to post someone elses note to a bulletin board without their permis-


Now this seems like an opportunity. Perhaps you could advertise something online. Well, yes and no. The Internet is very hard core about advertising. Most boards will route you out fast if you try to advertise on their time. Most commercial services will allow you to advertise but only if you pay them and it gets put in the proper place. Prodigy runs an ad across the bottom portion of every screen. However, these are all paid ads and I would bet they are not cheap. Most services including the Internet do have places you can advertise, but be very sure that is where you do it. Improper advertising will probably get you nasty replies and I mean really nasty replies faster than almost anything else you can do.

Most of the commercial services like Prodigy, America Online, etc. are monitored by the company that owns them. They try to control vulgarity and vicious attacks. However, many of the boards on the Internet are free for alls. They are controlled only by the people who log on and interact. They will censor the users as they see fit and there is usually no one to kick someone off who is inappropriate. Although if someone is showing a pattern of being really out of control, they can be reported to the institution that provides their access. Since the majority of connections are provided through employers, most employers would prefer their employees were using it for work not for "flaming"

Flaming - the word used to describe an out of control attack on another user of an online service. Some of these can be very nasty and very upsetting to see. Some people feel that because they don't have to look at you and they don't have to hear you, they can say anything they want. They frequently say things that no one would ever say to your face. This usually is the result of something you said that they didn't like. However, there are some real fruitcakes on line who just launch an attack for no apparent reason. The vest way to deal with these people is to ignore them If you are on a commercial service you might also report them to the service.

One last caution, there are boards out there for EVERY interest. If you have children using the online services, especially the Internet, you may want to spend some time getting familiar with which boards they use and with whom they talk. There are many boards with sexual themes some with sick sexual themes and there are some sick people out there. Just like in the "real" world
