RFK park scheduled to re-open in June

Work progresses on renovation of Robert F. Kennedy recreational park on the Key Peninsula. According to Mitchell Brones of Ohno Construction Company which is handling much of the work, the project will probably open on or near its June 30 scheduled date despite delays caused by the unusually high rainfall earlier this year. Work which began in January now includes a completed new 300 foot dock, pictured above. Under construction is a covered cook shed fabricated of steel, picnic areas, large parking areas soon to be hardtopped, a road network throughout the recreation area, and floating piling bouys for boat tie-up.

Growth means changes in local schools

The steady pressure of growth in enrollment, the retirement of veteran teachers and administrators, and the shifts in the needs of modern education all point to a number of changes likely to occur in our Peninsula School District over at least the next few years.

One of the major immediate decisions facing the District and the community is how Vaughn Elementary can best be either modernized or completely re-built.

And, if Vaughn is to be completely re-built (or replaced), should it be constructed on the current site west of Vaughn Post Office, or should it be located elsewhere?

That question will be the subject of a series of meetings held with parents, school district officials and members of the public. The first meeting will be held on April 18, from 3:30 to 5:30 pm and is one of a series planned; all will be open to

the public. More information may be obtained by calling Steve Aspden, principal at Vaughn Elementary, at 884-9233.

The complete modernization of Vaughn, which was built in the mid-50's, will be paid for from state school modernization funds and from other money authorized by the voters in two recent school bond elections.

Engineers and architects who have been studying the various needs of the Vaughn facility will present the "Vaughn Facility Committee" with a number of alternatives. Proposals will also be presented on alternate sites for a "new" Vaughn school. These proposals for possible new locations will probably include the Elgin-Clifton Road area, and also property that the District already owns near the Key Peninsula Middle School. Consideration will also be given to suggestions for the best use of the

current school site and facility if Vaughn elementary is moved to another location.

More new construction coming

New construction is not limited to the Vaughn Elementary school, as work is already underway to create additional classroom space at Key Peninsula Middle School. Some preparatory site work on that project was completed over the recent spring recess, and the balance of the construction will be done over the summer. All of that work is expected to be completed by the opening of school in September.

Evergreen Elementary was recently completely remodeled, but the pressures of increased enrollment continue to be felt, and additional classrooms will be needed in the next few years to keep up with families coming to the area.

Retirements, transfers, changes

The growth of the Peninsula school district and the retirement or impending retirement of several principals, administrators and teachers will undoubtedly mean that transfers will occur throughout the system in each new school year.

While some transfers will result from retirements, others may come about when other Districts around the state recruit our teachers and administrators. Still other changes may occur as teachers and principals move to different schools to add to their background experience or to fill either special or new educational school programs.

Movement of this type is entirely normal for a rapidly expanding school district and should be expected as our schools change to meet the challenges of the 1990's and beyond.


The Association is also in need of new members who would like to help bring other fresh, new programs to the community.

Nutrition presentation has some interesting facts

At a recent presentation at the Key Peninsula Health Center, Verna Bergmann, a nutritionist practicing in Gig Harbor shared some interesting facts with her audience.

The health risks of high cholesterol have been much discussed, but Bergmann added the fact that women aged 40 to 60 will experience a two milligram per year rise in cholesterol levels, which means that a forty year old woman could move from a "risk" (200 mg. per decaliter* of blood serum) catergory to a "high risk" (240 mg. per dl. of blood serum) category, even though she was not eating any more cholesterol than she ever had.

More and more emphasis is now being placed on a gradual change of eating habits and lifestyle as a way of controlling personal risk factors. Bergmann teaches classes called "food habit management" in which students are taught how to eat well and how to integrate new eating and exercise habits into their lives.

During the presentation, Bergmann discussed some of the ways to structure eating to maintain optimum health. Here, condensed from her talk, is a crash course on fats and cholesterol.

We Americans are already doing better; we used to get 43% of our total calories from fat. As a nation, we are now down to 37% of our total calories from fat, but it is recommended by the American Heart Association that we get no more than 30% of our calories from fat. Animal products and meat are the main sources of high cholesterol fat, with egg yolks taking the cholesterol prize at 213 milligrams of cholesterol per yolk.

The fat and cholesterol content of other foods is not so obvious. Those packages of ground beef, for example, that say the meat is extra lean, or no more than 16% fat, are labelled with the fat by weight. The only meaningful way to understand the real fat content is to know the grams of fat in one ounce of the meat, which tells you what percent of the calories come from fat. Extra lean ground beef is about 40% fat. Some "low fat" cheese is about 5% fat by weight, 30% fat by calories. Chicken and turkey are low in fat, but chicken and turkey franks are about 70% fat.

With a little arithmetic, you can calculate the actual fat content of prepared foods as well.

There are 9 calories in a gram of fat, so if you multiply the number of grams in a serving or can or whatever, by 9, you can figure out the calories which come from fat. You can then apply the 30% ratio to that number. Ms. Bergman pointed out that some days are low-cholesterol days and some may not be so low. But awareness, combined with education and discipline can mean a longer healthier life. *a decaliter is a tenth of a liter or 100 mills

Allyn Waterside Park fund raiser



Halibut, Lingcod Season

April 16 is an important day for Puget Sound saltwater bottom fish anglers. The 1990 halibut and lingcod seasons open, creating goo trophy bottom fishing opportunity, both in Puget Sound and the Strait of Juan de Fuca. This year, for the first time, anglers are required to carry a halibut catch card.

Lingcod season also opens in all marine waters east of Tatoosh Island, Neah Bay on April 16. The season remains open in the Strait of Juan de Fuca and the San Juan Islands through November 30 with a two fish limit, while the marine waters south of the Point Wilson-Admiralty Head line close May 31, with a one-fish limit. The minimum size of 22 inches remains in effect. Spearfishing divers are allowed one lingcod with no size limit in Puget Sound.


Hood Canal shrimp meetings


In mid-April the Washington Department of Fisheries will host two public meetings to discuss 1990 Hood Canal shrimp season options. Agency biologists will provide a brief presentation of the status of Hood Canal shrimp stocks followed by a discussion of possible season alternatives. Sport and commerical shrimpers are encouraged to attend and participate in one of these meetings.

The first meeting will be held in the Sheridan Park Recreation Center, 680 Lebo Boulevard, Bremerton, beginning at 7 pm on April 17. The Hoodsport Community Center (Fire Hall), off Lake Cushman Road, is the site of the April 18 meeting, also scheduled to begin at 7 pm.


The Hood Canal recreational shrimp season traditionally opens at 9 am on the third Saturday of May. The full season package will be announced by Fisheries director Joe Blum after considering input from the public along with the resource status.

Shown above is the aftermath of a five car pile-up on the Home Bridge. Accidents are a hazard of driving, and driving is a way of life on the Peninsula. The main cause of accidents is speeding, which is particularly a factor on our narrow shoulderless roads, where paving may not be in optimum condition and where there are many hills and curves.

Because accidents can also occur more often in some locations than others, the NEWS is presenting this information as a service to its readers. Accident reports will appear every three months or



The greatest number of accidents so far this year have occurred on the fourteen mile stretch of the Key Peninsula Highway, followed closely by highway 302 and Elgin-Clifton road.

so.

Elgin-Clifton: Since January 1, nine accidents have occurred on or around Elgin-Clifton road, which runs from an intersection at highway 302 to the Wright-Bliss intersection; three at Elgin-Clifton and 302, four in the stretch between the 13400 and 15100 blocks where the turn-offs for Lake of the Woods and Lake Holiday are, and two at the intersection of 134th and Elgin-Clifton road.

Highway 302: Since January 1, fourteen accidents have occurred on highway 302, which runs from the Purdy spit to Key Center; two at the Wauna curve, one at Goldman Drive, two at 144th NW, one at Creviston Drive, one at the 12400 block, one each at the 10100 block KPN and 11500 block NW, three at the 11000 block and two at the 9600 block, just outside Key Center.

Key Peninsula Highway: Highway 302 becomes the Key Peninsula Highway at Key Center as it continues out to Longbranch. Since January 1, eighteen accidents have occurred on the Key Peninsula Highway; one each at the 9100, 8700 and 8600 blocks, three at the 8300 block, one each at the 8100 and 8200 block, (all at or near downtown Key Center), one each at the 5600 and 5800 blocks (near the entrance of Volunteer Park), one at Lackey road, two at the 3900 block, two at the 3300 block (Whitman road), one at the 2400 block and one at the 2000 block. A five car pile-up occurred at the Home bridge.

Accidents have also occurred at 92nd and Olson drive near downtown Key Center, on Wright-Bliss road, Rocky Bay Point Road, 94th Ave NW, on North Heron Road and Rouse Road KPS for a grand total of 47 accidents so far this year.

Hydroplane Museum

The Tacoma Municipal Dock Building will be restored and modernized into a permanent home for the Unlimited Hydroplane Museum; it will also house local Sea Scouts and be a possible future terminal for passenger-only ferry service. The museum expects to be open to the public in late 1991 or early 1992.

"Honorary" parchment leases (suitable for framing) will be selling for \$25 per square foot, and there are 45,000 square feet available. Charter memberships are available for \$75 and include an exclusive lapel pin, gold membership card and free admission for the first year the museum is open. Contributors' names will be listed in the Museum's newsletters and displayed in the facility.

The Unlimited Hydroplane Hall of Fame and Museum is a legal IRS nonprofit organization and contributions are tax deductible.
