Something fishy going on

The pond will be stocked with hundreds of fish, 9 inches or longer, trucked in from Nisqually. They will be "lured" with corn, eggs and marshmallows. Poles with hooks and lines will be furnished and Duane Otten and his crew will supervise the fishermen.

Fishing promises to be good and, hopefully, there will be fish for dinner on a lot of tables on August 5.

The first Pioneer Days Run is all set for race day, August 5. The start and finish for both the 10K and two mile runs are directly in front of the Civic Center. Both races will start at 8:30 am followed by 50 and 100 yard dashes for children at 9:45, then awards and random prize drawings at 10 am.

Plaques will be awarded to the first male and female, and ribons will be awarded to the top five in each of the nine divisions in both races.

All proceeds from the races will be used to benefit the Peninsula High School Cross Country team, the Track and Field teams and the Scholarship Fund.

Parade route outlined

Beginning early Saturday morning, August 5, parade entrants will begin gathering at the K-J Feed Store, just south of Key Center. Starting promptly at 10 am, the parade will leave K-J Feed and go north along the highway to Key Center, west on Highway 302 to the head of Vaughn Bay, then south on S. Vaughn to the Civic Center.

The parade should end about 11:20 am, and the opening ceremonies will start at 11:30 am on the giant stage in front of the Civic Center.



Five dozen hands-on activities from eight learning centers will create a total environment inside the gymnasium highlighting toys, clothing, tools, salmon life-cycle and legends, canoe building, Native American and pioneer skills and crafts, and a magnificent exhibition of working tools that helped with the daily chores way back when.

What is **KPCCA**?

The Key Peninsula Civic Center Association (KPCCA) was started more than 30 years ago for the express purpose of looking after the Civic Center, formerly Vaughn-Union High School.

With expenses mounting and taxes soaring the Association created the Key Peninsula Park District, establishing an entity that could raise money through property taxes to support the Civic Center. The Park District bought the Center for \$1 and the Association pledged to continue to manage the facility and its programs for the residents of the Key Peninsula.

The Association has kept that pledge. Through good times and bad it has had a single purpose ... the preservation of a community facility for all people, regardless of their ability to pay.

To keep the doors open and the programs maintained takes a minimum of \$50,000 each year. The Civic Center Association contributes much of that expense.

Pioneer Days has been one means of raising needed funds for Civic Center activities, which include two sessions of roller skating for youth of the community on Friday nights, Bingo on Wednesday nights, Reno nights, spaghetti dinners, dances, auctions, Mother's Day Brunch, Arts and Crafts shows and more.

The members of the Civic Center Association thank you for your support of Pioneer Days and all the other activities that help the Civic Center continue to serve the community. 

U.S. Cavalry Regiment takes part in Pioneer Days

Company L, 7th U.S. Cavalry Memorial Regiment, will be encamped on the Civic Center grounds on August 5, taking part in the Pioneer Days Centennial Celebration. The company was formed in 1986 as a member of the National Indian Wars Association, Inc., and strict authenticity is maintained in its demonstrations and presentations to the public. The NIWA is a "living history" organization and members who join as re-enactors are expected to be prepared to live their roles as realistically as possible. Women are encouraged to participate as laundresses and soldiers' wives, and children are welcome when in period attire.

The regiment is representative of the 1872-1876 period ... "Custer's Cavalry" ... and is composed of four companies which take part in parades, encampments and monthly mounted drills to both educate the public and maintain the equestrian skills of the troopers.

Company L is looking for men who are serious Indian Wars Era buffs and who are willing to make a large investment in time and money to relive the life of the cavalrymen of the American Frontier. If YOU are interested, Pioneer Days is your opportunity to learn more about the Regiment and its activities.


Beginning at noon on August 5, kids aged 1-12 will have the opportunity to win prizes and ribbons in all sorts of fun and games until 3 pm.
