ARTICLE IX PAST PRESIDENTS' COMMITTEE

a. The KPCCA Board shall have the ability to collect funds for long

term endowment programs. These moneys will be collected as allowed by the IRS and administered by the Past Presidents Committee.

b. The Past Presidents committee shall appoint 4 members as trustees who together with the current Presi-

Hiking along the Pacific Crest Trail provided the opportunity for the Scouts to camp along high back country lakes each night while catching brook trout and swimming in the icy cold lake water. The trail weaved in and out of the Mount Rainier National Park eastern boundary and the William O. Douglas wilderness area,

providing spectacular views of Mt. Rainier, Mt. Adams, Mt. St. Helens and the surrounding cascade mountains. Wild flowers were in full bloom with deer and elk spotted.

The trip was the highlight event of the year following monthly backpacking and camping trips and the one week summer camp held the third week of August. The Scouts will now start to concentrate on the fall and winter program to include winter camping skills and citizenship responsibilities.

To Your Health

It's flu shot season again, one of the busiest months of the year for us. Last year we gave over 550 shots, and we're looking to break 600 this year. We'll be starting the shots at the annual Key Peninsula Health Center's Health Fair, which will be from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. on October 11th. In addition to the flu shots there will be information and displays from the providers at the Health Center. It will be a big day in Key Center as the business association's Ciderfest will be held in Key Center. The shots will be available at the Key Medical Center after the 11th through the month of November, with the revenues going to the Health Center. This is the major fund raiser for the KPHC, and they will be asking for a \$10 donation from those who can afford it, free is you can't. The flu shots will also be available at the Wednesday lunch meeting at the Community House on October 15th and over on Herron Island at the Fire Hall at a date yet to be determined.

This year's flu shot will cover more strains than previous ones. Like last year, it will prevent the strains B-Harbin and A-Nancheng, but new strains for 1997 are A-Johannesburg, A-Bayern, and A-Wahan. It is recommended for most people over 65, and those younger patients with significant illnesses. It should not be received by those who are allergic to eggs (the vaccine contains a tiny amount of egg protein) or others who have had a severe reaction to previous flu vaccines. It's best to hold off on the vaccine for a few days if you have a severe cold. It's not unusual to get a sore arm from the shot, and occasionally a low grade fever, but you cannot get the flu from a flu shot. Finally, this year's geography quiz - you may

remember from last year's article on flu shots that Nancheng and Harbin are both from China, but I'll give a free flu shot to the first person who can tell me where Bayern and Wahan are. (No they're not small towns in Wyoming.)

History Of Gig Harbor Boat Building On Display At Maritime Festival

The history of boat building in Gig Harbor is chronicled in a mini-exhibition created by the Gig Harbor Peninsula Historical Society and will be at the Maritime Center in Tacoma during the Commencement Bay Maritime Festival, September 27 and 28. The Maritime Center is located at 705 Dock St. and will be open 10 AM - 5 PM both days.

The exhibition is called Tools Tell

Tales and focuses on the peak of wooden boat building activity in Gig Harbor between 1912 and 1931. The shipyards profiled are Skansie Shipbuilding company, Robert Crawford Shipyard, and Anderson and Sons. These three companies built more than 140 ships, mostly fishing boats, during the nearly twenty year period.

The exhibition includes historical photographs of boat builders and some of the boats they built. The text describes the history of the boats and their owners. Typical boat building tools from the society's collection are also part of the exhibit.

The historical society's Executive Director Chris Fiala Erlich said the help of local experts made the exhibit possible. "Much of the information included in the display came from Lee Makovich," she said. Makovich has extensively researched the boats of the West Coast fishing fleet and has published numerous articles about the history of local boats and fishermen.

"Michael Vlahovich, a respected boat builder and instructor at the Maritime Center, provided valuable information about the use of boat building tools," said Erlich.

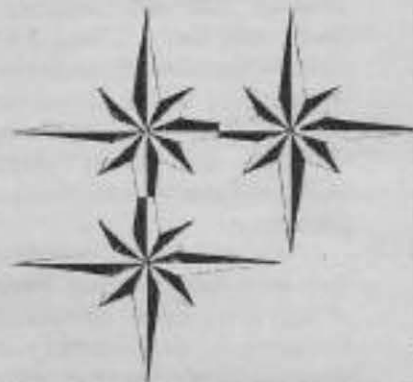

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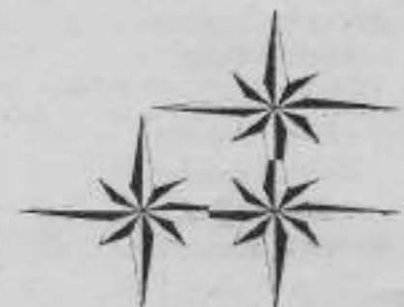
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Feeling Sad? Depression Screen Day Could Help

You feel bad in the morning. Better in the afternoon. You wake at 3 a.m. but want to sleep all the time. You've lost interest in the things that used to make life worth living. You're sad, unhappy, anxious. These symptoms last for weeks, months. Time slows down and minutes seem like hours. Gradually you begin to feel the world might be better off without you.

Does this sound like you or someone you know? One in five women and one in ten men will feel this way at some point during their lifetime. They could have an illness called clinical depression.

Compare these statistics to the one in nine women who develop breast cancer or the one in twelve men who develop lung cancer and you get a glimpse of the shocking and hidden toll this crippling illness is taking.

There is hope and there is help. Treatment is effective in 80-90% of all cases in as little as 6 to 8 weeks. The challenge is getting people into treatment. Many feel shame and stigma. Others do not know where to run. Some, like Philip Phillips, find help in an annual free screening program, National Depression Screen Day, a keynote event during Mental Illness Awareness Week that has attracted nearly 350,000 people over the last six years.

"If it was not for the screening day, I don't know if I'd be here today," says Phillips. "I would urge anyone who feels that they may have depression to take advantage of the screening. It saved my life, and I know it can do the same for others."

Mental health professionals from Northwest Psychological Services will offer local residents the opportunity to learn about the signs and symptoms of depression and to participate in a free screening as part of National Depression Screening Day, Thursday, October 9, 1997. Two free screen seminars are planned on October 9 at 12 noon and 4 p.m., in the small conference room at the Peninsula Library, 4424 Pt. Fosdick Drive NW in Gig Harbor. If you don't want (or don't have time) to attend one of the 1-1/2 hour seminars, you may stop by the small conference room at the Peninsula Library any time between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. to fill out the screening questionnaire and obtain information. All screenings are free and anonymous.

Participants at the Peninsula Library will receive information on the causes, symptoms, and treatments of depression, and may view a short video. Individuals may complete an anonymous written screening test for

depression, have the opportunity to discuss the results with a mental health professional and learn where to go for additional help if necessary.

"Depression can happen to anyone, and it is very treatable. It is important that the residents of the Gig Harbor community learn to recognize the signs and symptoms of depression, and to encourage their friends and family members who may be vulnerable to seek evaluation and treatment," said Ellie Sternquist, Ph.D., who is a licensed psychologist and director of Northwest Psychological Services, Inc. "We are offering this free screening as a service to the community to promote mental health awareness, and hopefully, to help individuals seek the assistance they need," said Terry O'Neal, Ph.D., a certified mental health counselor who is organizing the Gig Harbor Screening. Dona Lansing-Thompson, C.C.S.W., and Sheila Anderson, M.Ed. will also be available to assist participants.

At any given time, depression affects more than 17 million Americans of both sexes and all ages and ethnic backgrounds. Undiagnosed clinical depression costs American businesses almost \$24 billion a year in lost productivity and absenteeism. Common symptoms of depression include:

feelings of sadness, hopelessness, worthlessness; changes in sleeping and eating patterns; irritability, anxiousness, restlessness; fatigue or loss of energy; inability to concentrate; and thoughts of death or suicide. People who have several of these symptoms for two weeks or longer may suffer from clinical depression, a mental illness that can be successfully treated.

"The screen saved my life. I was constantly fighting thoughts of suicide and every time I drove, I physically battled my arms not to go into a tree. The screening turned my life around. I found there was a name for what I was experiencing and I was glad I wasn't going crazy," says Kathy Bojczak, who attended a screening last year.

National Depression Screening Day, held each year during Mental Illness Awareness Week, was developed by Harvard psychiatrist, Dr. Douglas Jacobs. Last year, more than 85,000 people attended screenings at 2,800 sites nationwide. National Depression Screening Day inaugurated the concept of screening for a mental illness when it began seven years ago.

National Depression Screening Day is a program of the nonprofit National Mental Illness Screening Project.

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In The Critter Corner

Fall in the Northwest brings with it dark mornings, chilly temperatures, bare trees, and of course, soggy weather. This is also the time of year that veterinary hospitals begin to see dogs infected with salmon disease.

Salmon disease or salmon poisoning is caused by a rickettsial, (bacteria-like) organism called *Neorickettsia helmsmithi*. This organism lives in a fluke or flat worm that becomes encysted in the muscles of some chinook, silver, chum or dog salmon and brook, speckled, cutthroat, mountain, rainbow or steelhead trout.

Dogs become infected by eating infested raw fish. The signs of illness develop about 5-8 days after ingestion of the tainted fish. The dogs initially become very febrile, lethargic and often do not want to eat. This is sometimes the only symptom noted by owners who present their pets early in the course of the disease. The diarrhea is often very runny and yellow in color and in other cases, blood-tinged. After a day or two of diarrhea, many animals appear to improve, albeit temporarily. In time the pet's temperature falls to subnormal. At this time the animal is so emaciated and weak that it can hardly stand alone. Many untreated animals die within 6-10 days after the appearance of the first symptoms.

Treatment for salmon disease is very effective if the pet is presented soon after the symptoms develop. In some cases, before vomiting and diarrhea develop, dogs can be treated at home with antibiotics. Tetracycline usually works the best. If vomiting and diarrhea have already developed however, hospitalization with fluid replacement and injectable antibiotics

is necessary to get the pet well.

Unfortunately, there is no vaccine or preventative for salmon disease. However, most dogs that get sick with the disease and survive are often naturally immunized and therefore protected against subsequent infection if exposed to the deadly organism again.

There are many residents in the Key Peninsula area who live on the water and as such, their dogs are at a higher risk for exposure to infested fish, especially if they live in an area where fish are sometimes washed up on the shore. We as pet owners can't always account for our dogs' whereabouts all day long and what they may have ingested while unattended, but we can adhere to some simple rules regarding what we feed our pets. Do not feed your dog raw salmon or trout. You are inviting trouble if you do. Also, do not feed your pet uncooked, smoked salmon or trout.

If you believe your dog has been exposed to the salmon disease organism or is having symptoms of the disease, see your veterinarian. We can provide a happy ending if your cherished pet is presented promptly.

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Referendum 47 Will Cut Property Taxes

This November, Washington voters will have a chance to cut their property taxes. The measure is called Referendum 47.

Currently, property tax collections can automatically increase six percent a year, no questions asked. Local officials are not required to do anything, but sit back and watch the money roll in.

Referendum 47 would change that. Referendum 47 will make local officials stand up and take a vote any time they want to increase your property taxes. A two-thirds vote would be required before they could increase tax collections beyond the rate of inflation. And a vote of the people would be needed to increase property tax collections more than six percent.

The savings under Referendum 47 start slowly, but build over time. For example, over the first seven years, the owner of a \$110,000 home would save almost \$1,000.

But the real value of Referendum 47 is in its long-term effect of "lowering the bar" for future tax increases.

Currently, property tax increases are compounded, much like interest

on a bank account. The higher local officials "set the bar" with annual tax increases, the higher your tax bills will be in the future.

Referendum 47 would reverse that trend by stopping automatic tax increases.

Referendum 47 doesn't prevent officials from raising taxes, but they would have to do it openly. Would your elected officials be willing to publicly vote to increase your taxes every year?

I don't think so.

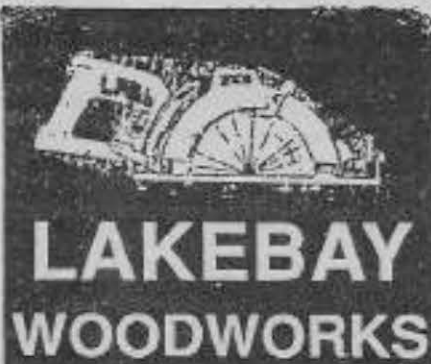

I had mentioned that some health care company CEO's had received exorbitant sums of money, and I was asked why I didn't name them. There are two answers: the two cases mentioned were probably just the tip of the iceberg, and it's the whole relationship between Medicare and the health care industry that needs looking into. Too often, focusing on an individual causes us to lose sight of the larger problem. Like not being able to see the forest for the trees.

I got the information from a source I consider to be reliable and accurate, and this information was apparently not widely disseminated in the media, for one reason or another. Kicking around in my head are a potpourri of other questions, some answerable, some which would surely elicit different answers from those whose view from Home differs from mine. But that's OK, that's what freedom of expression is all about.

Why is it that whenever talk of increasing the state gasoline tax is mentioned, the price of gas at the pump seems to go up, but those legislators (nameless here) who are the loudest about protecting us from being overtaxed never say anything about our being gouged by the oil companies? I guess the petroleum industry lobbyists have really been earning their salaries.

Is there any connection between the

announcement that a committee of Congress was going to hold hearings on the price of dry cereals and the fact that one can now buy corn flakes for two dollars a box LESS than before?

A few years ago, Fire District 16 had two levy issues on the same ballot. One was for money to build new fire stations; the other was to hire personnel to staff the stations. Why did the first levy pass and the second one fail?

The cost of transporting students is more closely related to the distance the bus has to travel than to the number of students on the bus, especially in a rural area such as the Key Peninsula. Why is the state reimbursement to the school district based on the number of passengers?

There have been a lot of adverse comments about the Makah Tribe's desire to take five whales a year for food and ceremonial purposes. Norway has, for several years, been thumbing its nose at the International Whaling Commission's moratorium on whale hunting and has been killing whales for commercial purposes, but nobody around here has voiced any concerns about that. Is this because of the large number of residents of Scandinavian descent in this area, or because of a pervasive antipathy to Native Americans in the Northwest?

I have many more questions, but I'd better stop now because I have a feeling the editor is reaching for her scissors.

On September 10th, a juvenile California Kingsnake became roadkill on McEwan Road. Since they are not native to this area, we are curious as to how it got to be crawling where it was found. We would appreciate a call at 884-2213 from anyone who might have any information about it.

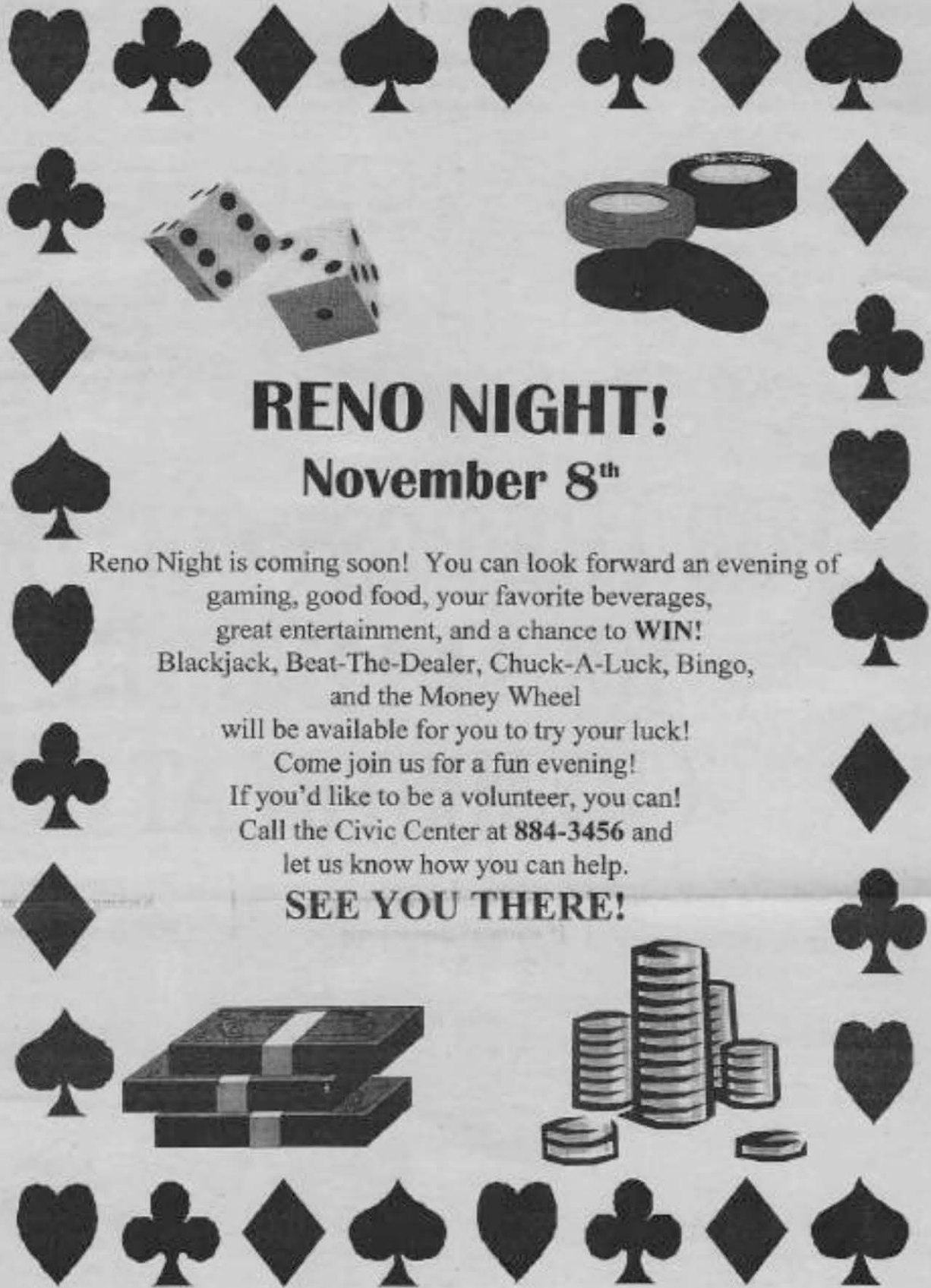

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Narrows Airport Announces Memorial Dedication

Aviation Leader Charles L. "Chuck" Gross was commemorated at a memorial dedication at Crossings Aviation, at the Narrows Airport in Gig Harbor, Washington. Chuck Gross, best known throughout the Northwest as an instructor and examiner, was well known and respected throughout aviation for his abilities.

Gross, a lifetime Tacoma resident until he passed away in 1995, was born in Pennsylvania in 1921. Following are some of Gross' accomplishments:

Airline Transport Pilot; Gold Seal flight Instructor (Airplanes, Instru-

ments, and Multi-Engine); Ground Instructor (Advanced and Instrument); Fixed-Base Operator; FAA Designated Pilot Examiner (nearly 10,000 pilot certificates issued); President of Washington Aviation Association; Founder of the Northwest Aviation Conference - Dedicated to the Advancement of Aviation Safety, and Consultant to General Aviation.

According to Amy Robinson, director of Airline Transport International in Gig Harbor (they train foreign pilots for Boeing and McDonnell Douglas.) Gross was "one of the most highly respected examiners in the Pacific Northwest." He raised genera-

tions of pilots out of the South Tacoma Airport and continuing at the Narrows Airport in Gig Harbor. Gross was the examiner for Robinson's private and instrument checkrides, as well as her instructor rating for CFII, and sponsoring her to be an examiner herself.

Crossings Aviation President and CEO Rick Boehlke is quick to give praise to the handwork and outstanding efforts of Gross to expand the aviation community and develop the Narrows Airport as a community resource, noting that the plaque dedicated at a Crossings new flag plaza at the center of the Tacoma Narrows

Airport, is an appropriate honoring of Gross. "Chuck was instrumental in restricting the City of Tacoma's controversial airport development on the Gig Harbor Peninsula to an accepted community and aviation asset," said Boehlke.

Gross' influence on so many of our Northwest pilots is profoundly summarized by Robinson: "I would say that the biggest thing he contributed to my flying is a level of good judgment."

The memorial dedication was sponsored by the Washington Aviation Association, which is located in Lakewood, Washington.
