Tim Noah comes to Gig Harbor

The Children's Museum of Tacoma is presenting Tim Noah, Emmy Award-winning songwriter and recording artist in concert on Sunday, July 19 from 1-2 pm at Celebrations Meadow in Gig Harbor. Since the concert is on the same day as the Gig Harbor Arts Festival, families may first see the Festival and then take their picnic lunch up to Celebrations Meadow to eat and enjoy the concert.

Tim Noah's show is a musical celebration of the imagination, and is based on his award-winning album, "In Search of the Wow Wow Wibble Woggle Wazzie Woodie Woo." The performance will also include songs from his new release, "Dare Dreamer," featuring all original music, custom-designed costumes and props, and lots of audience involvement.

Noah is a well-known producer of songs and programs for young people,

including his "Tim Noah Back-to-School Special," a one-hour program on KOMO-TV which premiered in September 1985. He has also received awards and recognition for his work on an energy conservation special on KING-TV, a ballad for the award-winning special, "DWI: Sorry Isn't Enough", and a ballad for the child abuse special, "Do you hear the Children Weeping?" both aired on KIRO-TV.

The Tim Noah Concert is a major fund-raising project for the Children's Museum of Tacoma, located at 925 Court C in downtown Tacoma. The purpose of the museum is stated to be, "a special place where children and adults can touch, feel, and experience their universe." Tickets for the Tim Noah concert are available at the Bubble-Gum Closet and Mostly Books in Gig Harbor, and will also be sold at a booth at the Arts Festival and at the door at Celebrations Meadow at the top of Peacock Hill. Ticket prices are \$4.50 for adults and \$3.50 for children, and it is suggested that one take both a lunch to eat and a blanket to sit upon.

Park Board meeting moves towards an agreement - a little bit (maybe!)

An agreement for the Key Peninsula Civic Center Association to continue operating the programs at the Civic Center for the balance of 1987 may have moved a little closer to reality at the meeting of the Park Board on Wednesday night, July 8.

Park Commissioner Daphne Daus distributed and explained a draft copy of a preliminary Agreement which she and Park Commissioner Mike Kent had worked out with the cooperation and assistance of KPCCA President Vicki Henschel and Vice President Dale Loy. The preliminary Agreement, which represented a great deal of work on the part of those involved, was designed to meet updated legal points which have been raised over the last several months, and to more closely define the responsibilities and relationships between the Park Board, the KPCCA and the KPAA.

The Agreement, if adopted and approved by both groups, is planned to replace a previous Agreement which was terminated this past spring, but which has been extended since that time. The Board supported a move to submit the proposed Agreement to the Park Board and KPCCA attorneys for comment and/or approval or amendment. Park Board Commissioner John Steiner authored a motion to seek an audit of both Associations by the State Auditors Office, but the Park Board voted to do this only on the written recommendation of their attorney, Joseph Quinn of Tacoma. Whether this will be done or not may be the subject of negotiation between attorneys.

In order to allow the attorneys for both sides to have more time to work out contractual details, Commissioner Terry Moore and the Park Board then voted to extend the operation of the current contract another 30 days.

Your Park Board

Oskar Schock reported that the Park District's Summer Fun Program began this week with 23 children enrolled. The district is working with Oskar to hire a student from the PLU work study program to direct the final three weeks of the program. He also reported that the scheduled move of the building donated to the Park District has been delayed due to an unexpected increase in the cost of moving the building. He is pursuing other options at this time.

Preparation for the auction sponsored by the Civic Center Association is going extremely well, according to a report given by Vicki Henschel. The auction will be a portion of the Pioneer Day celebration being promoted by the Key Peninsula Business Association and scheduled for August 8. Ann Larson is chairing the auction.

The balance of the meeting was dedicated to the ongoing contract negotiations between the Park District and its contractual organizations. Commissioner Daus gave a brief dissertation regarding the action that has transpired to date.

Commissioners Daus and Kent met with Vicki Henschel and Dale Loy regarding the need to find common ground on which to establish a new agreement. After more than four hours of discussion a document was drawn up and submitted to the attorneys representing both organizations. The agreement was submitted to the Board as an agreement "in theory" to be considered for approval. The Park Board unanimously approved the agreement with the proviso that approval from both attorneys would be required, and a preliminary ruling from the State Auditor. It is the intent of the Park Board to continue drawing up policy statements to back up the theory applied in the agreement.

The Board also passed a motion to place a ceiling of \$1,500 on the fee paid the District's attorney. Once the ceiling has been reached the Chairman has the authority to approve additional expenditures if warranted. This ruling was made in consideration of the expenditure of public funds.

A special meeting has been called for Wednesday, July 22 at 7:30 pm, to discuss the establishment of the 1988 user fee schedule.

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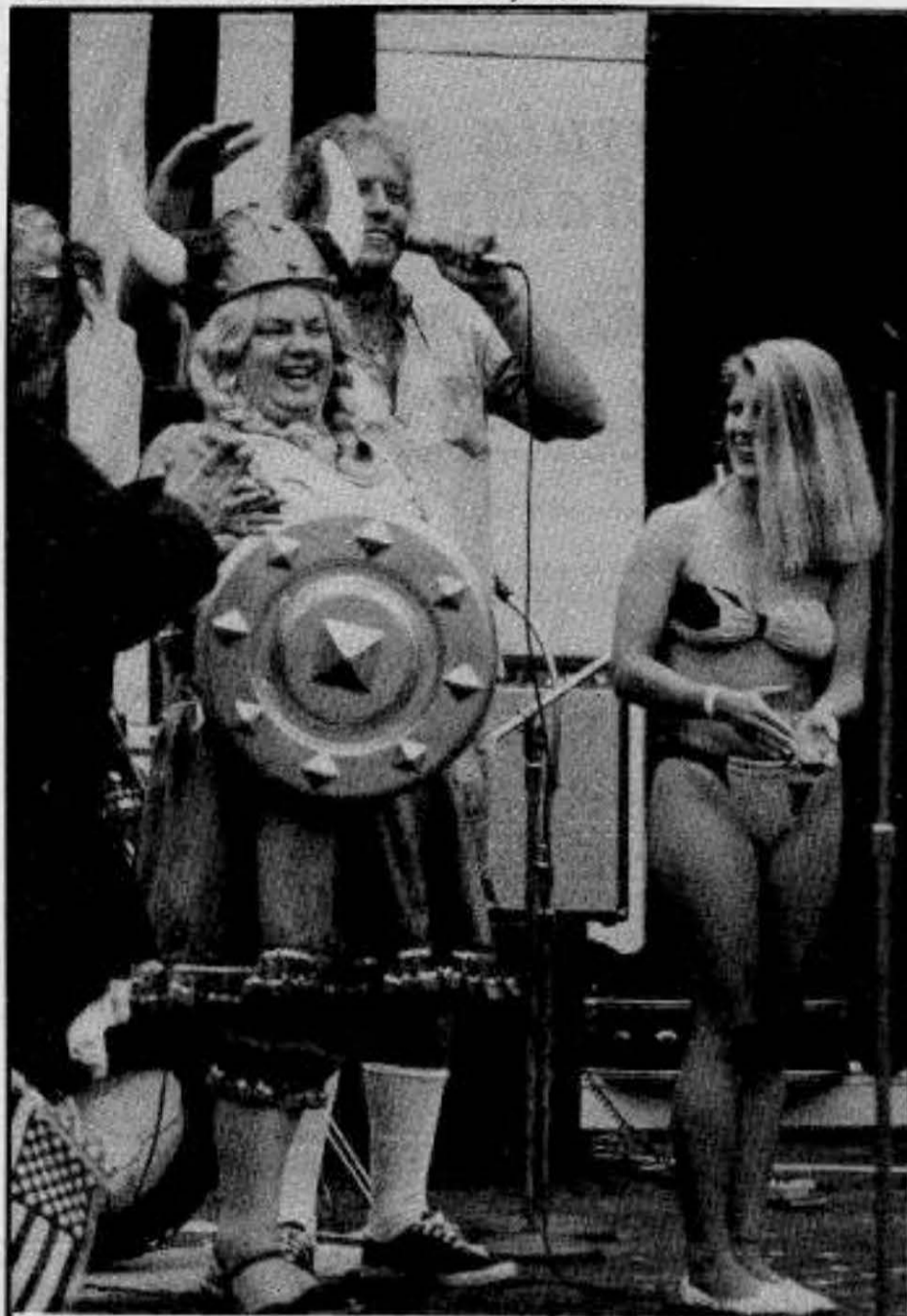

Fire District 16 passes quiet 4th: Burn ban lifted with rain

What appeared to be a hot, dry condition, causing concern for Fire District 16 Firefighters, turned out to be more of a cool, muggy, weather situation over the Fourth of July, making things easier for the department.

There were only six "runs" on July 4, and no fireworks-related injuries this year on the Peninsula. During the period of July 1 through July 5 there were 25 total calls, including 12 for medical aid of some type, 9 fire calls, 1 auto accident and 4 service calls. Bee stings and illegal burning on the Purdy Spit accounted for a large percentage of these calls.

The department has reported that a number of "wandering objects", such as trees, poles, posts, and ditches, all claimed cars in recent weeks. Also, there have been 3 motorcycle accidents, and all drivers are reminded that motorcycles are hard to see and require particular watchfulness.

During the entire month of June, Fire District 16 responded to a total of 82 calls, including 57 for medical aid, 19 fire calls, 9 automobile accidents, and 2 service calls. Some of the aid calls resulted from residents and others injured in falls.

An outdoor burning ban, which had been in effect from the first of the month, was lifted on July 9. Residents are reminded that summer burning rules, published in the July 1 issue of the NEWS, are in effect and must be observed.

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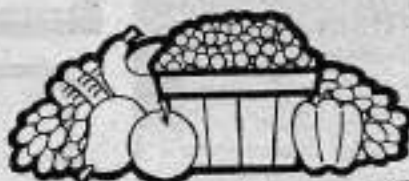
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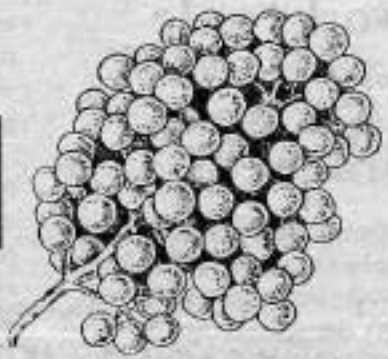

She prefers painting in the intricate style of Imari, an art form originated in Japan and copied in China and England. The tantalizing beauty of Imari is achieved by meticulously reproducing traditional patterns and embellishing them with many coats of luster and gold. The art demands skill, precision and patience few painters attain with any measure of excellence. Along with her china, Fischer's exquisite, hand-painted jewelry is displayed.

Gracing the walls of Burley Galleria's main exhibit hall are the oil paintings of Dorothy Bouvia Lusby, a retired Peninsula High School English teacher. Lusby's work focuses upon the many faces of Washington State; its mountains, waters, rustic scenes and flowers. Her art has been seen at the Tacoma Little Theatre, Tacoma General Hospital, The Gallery in Bremerton, Al-lenmore Hospital, and enhancing the homes of discriminating collectors.

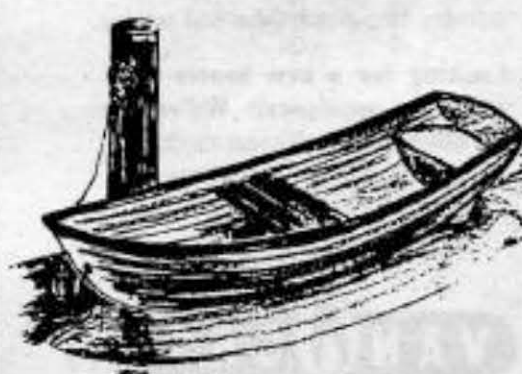

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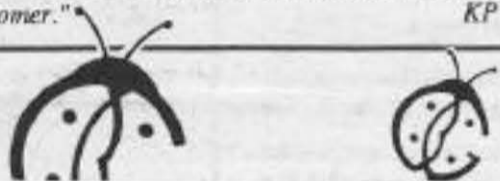

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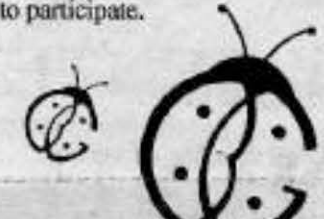
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Trouble-free fireworks delight 4th's viewers

The Fifth Annual all-Key Peninsula community 4th of July fireworks' spectacular on Von Geldern Cove was a great success. The waters were filled with all sorts of power and sailing craft that came from far and wide to share our fun and spend the night afloat, and the orderly spectators, many of whom came as whole family groups, filled "A" Street in Home despite the threat of a repeat of the day's earlier downpour.

Many thanks are due career firefighter Chuck West who voluntarily organized the event, arranged for the "porta-potties," refuse containers, and the blocking of "A" Street to other than emergency vehicles. According to firefighter West, the fund drive produced almost \$2,500, "and that will help a great deal to get started on our 'dry hydrant' project." The "firecracker" collection box at Macon Bacon weighed 21.2 pounds when picked up. "It was so full of money," said Walt White, "that you couldn't get another penny inside; we just laid coins on its top."

The real heroes of the event were the five volunteers who fired into the darkening skies the colorful pyrotechnics which thrilled young and old alike. We owe our gratitude to Key Peninsula Firefighters' Association members Rick Olsen, Karl Bonn, and Rick Stout, and to Kevin Dieckman and Mike White (the latter four being, coincidentally, members of the Key Peninsula Lions' Club), for handling the risky, smelly, sweaty business of bringing such beauty to Independence Day. "You could hear the 'ooohs and aaahs' from one side of the Bay to the other," one smiling youngster exclaimed.

These five volunteers must perform as paid employees of the firm from which we purchase the fireworks. Otherwise, the very hefty insurance provided by the firm would be invalidated. Although these volunteers are paid ten percent of the total price of the fireworks, they never see a penny of that \$250.00; they donate it in advance to the Key Peninsula Firefighters' Association's fund drive for special equipment. We are proud that these wonderful volunteers are a valuable part of our community. Many thanks Rick, Karl, Rick, Kevin, and Mike!

This year, in large measure thanks to the presence of Pierce County Sheriff's Deputies Sam Larsen and Ed Troyer, there were no reports of trouble caused by that miniscule group of miscreants who have blighted some of our past shows. "They were there," said one Home resident, "but the Sheriff's presence kept them in line. We had a totally trouble-free 4th." Having Home's "A" Street blocked off to vehicular traffic provided a much safer and larger viewing area.

Another Home citizen said, "I wasn't really in favor of having the fireworks' show because of all the mess left

by viewers and the threatening behavior of a few trouble-makers, but now, I'm a real supporter; this year's show was just great! Most of the viewers brought plastic bags and cleaned up their spent fireworks and litter and carried it away with them."

The day following the show, teams of neighbors from both sides of the Bay, Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts, and members of the Key Peninsula Lions' Club spent very little time cleaning up the almost non-existent litter. "Everybody behaved so responsibly; it was almost like the movie 'State Fair' where everyone was happy, friendly, respectful and tidy," said one of the clean-up crew, "it was just wonderful."

The Key Peninsula Firefighters' Association notes that thanks are due the *Key Peninsula News* and the *Peninsula Gateway* both of which gave the event excellent advance coverage, successfully encouraging spectators to behave in the responsible fashion with which this year's 4th of July celebration was characterized. 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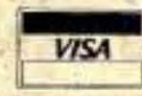
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
