The roadway has been torn up to add Hilltop Tacoma LINK rails for new transit oriented development which supports a more dense residential, commercial and leisure space within walking distance of public transport. LINK construction in the roadway will be completed next year; however, the sidewalk and Festival Area will take longer to complete. Forterra has big plans for the Rite Aid site and plans to add commercial business space and up to 300 housing units. This housing development is driven by the Hilltop Community. The passionate and hardworking Michealea Lemons says that the Hilltop Action Coalition board is right for her, just as much as I believe she is right for it. Hilltop Non-Profit Second Cycle Celebrates 10 Years

Second Cycle creates a safe space for youth to learn bike mechanic skills.



Second Cycle's Youth Summer Camp in July 2021

Second Cycle, a community bicycle shop in Hilltop, is celebrating 10 years as a non-profit organization with an open-house fundraising event on August 21st. "We had no idea that the community would support this project with so much interest," says Noah Struthers, executive director and a founding member of the project. "This is a huge milestone for the shop."

From humble beginnings in a small rented room in the alley behind Le Le Restaurant, Second Cycle now occupies a 5000 square foot storefront on MLK Jr. Way. The shop receives donated bicycles from the community that are then refurbished, stripped for parts, or recycled. Refurbished bikes are sold through a retail storefront that also offers new and used parts, as well as full-service repairs. Reducing financial barriers to the joys of cycling is a primary focus of the shop.

During the height of COVID restrictions in 2020, the demand for

repair services exploded as folks turned to cycling as an outlet to the Stay Home, Stay Healthy order. With the shop's DIY Toolspace closed, staff had to perform many of the repairs that riders would have otherwise been encouraged to do themselves. Customers who selfidentified as unhomed or front-line workers were given priority and offered free or reduced-cost services. By the end of 2020, Second Cycle staff had performed \$10,000 of inkind bicycle repairs during the year.

An expansion project in early 2021 created more warehouse space and a dedicated youth classroom, which has been essential to resuming programming while social distancing. Programming for adults and youth, including summer camps and monthly Slow and Social group bike rides, have ramped back up as COVID restrictions have loosened.

"Creating a safe space for youth has always been a goal of Second Cycle," says Struthers. "In the early days it was a place for neighborhood kids to get their bikes fixed and learn some mechanic skills. The neighborhood youth are a large part of this shop's identity."

Second Cycle will celebrate 10 years with a fundraiser party at the shop on August 21st from 2pm-5pm to coincide with the Summer Splash open streets event hosted by HAC and HBA. As part of the festivities the new youth classroom will be dedicated to Gerod Byrd, former Second Cycle board member and long-time volunteer, who succumbed to his fight with cancer in 2017.

The celebration will also include music, food, and fundraising activities inside the shop. The party will be preceded by a free community bike ride at 12:30 pm and a bike obstacle course will fill the street in front of the shop during that afternoon. "We're excited to showcase what we do for this community and also to honor a dear friend," says Struthers.

Shiloh Baptist Church New Solar System

Saving Energy at Shiloh Baptist Church

Shiloh Baptist Church is starting the summer off right with their new 19.78 kW solar system! Right in the beautiful city of Tacoma, Shiloh Baptist Church, a predominantly Black church, has a new surprise this summer. On Friday, July 16th at 4 PM, numerous people from the church and more joined together to witness the ribbon cutting ceremony of the solar panel installation.

This \$50,000 solar system, which was funded in part by Tacoma Power and partnered with Front & Centered and Spark Northwest, which matched its grant with \$10,600.

"We envision a Just Transition to a future where our communities and the earth are healed and thriving, our people have dignified work, and our government values, respects, and represents us," said Front and Centered on their website as part of their Vision.

As part of Spark Northwest's mission and vision, they stated this on their website: "We partner with communities to build an equitable clean energy future... A Northwest region 100% powered by clean energy that shifts power and wealth to marginalized communities."Of the many speakers that day, Jackie Flowers, who is the Director for Tacoma Public Utilities, had an important opportunity to share with attendees and the community.

"Until August 20th, community organizations, so nonprofits, schools, [and] governmental entities can apply for an opportunity to get a \$50,000 grant towards a renewable energy project...you can find information at our website mytpu.org/eogrant,"



Sphere Solar Energy, which is a certified minority-owned solar company, was also present today, along with Edwan Wanji who is the founder and owner, who also installed the panels.

Wanji, a Kenyan American, shared his reflections on what it means to have sustainable energy.

"I've experienced what energy burden is... having grown up in Kenya where I went to school sometimes without electricity at all and experiencing high energy bills here, [and now] just being able to see such an important place as this being a cornerstone, community, [and] church, to [be able to] lessen that energy burden to me is just a game changer,"

Dr. Gregory Christopher, who is the Pastor of Shiloh Baptist Church, shared his thoughts on that day and the panels.

"Naturally, they're going to bless Shiloh, but this is bigger than Shiloh, and so we want the community to begin to understand what climate change, and green jobs and solar panels and what all those things mean to our future,"

Spaceworks Supports Local Entrepreneurs

Spaceworks' Building Better Business Foundations webinar helps you find your 'Why?' and understand the importance of finding your target market.

I'm always encouraging other people to step out and go after your dream - start your own business. I decided to take my own advice as I've been working on phonetic booklets that can teach someone how to read and write English. So, I signed up for Spaceworks Building Better Business Foundations webinar, a 2 part series that focuses on finding out your 'Why?' and defining your marketing. Jennifer English, Spaceworks Business Training Coordinator, and Co-Owner of SPUN Clay Arts Studio & Gallery, taught the webinar. Part I was really engaging as we jumped right into how to create statements for your vision (where do you want to go? what is the dream for your company?), mission (how will you get there? What does your Company do?), and values (how will you act along the way?). The most fun part for me was about finding your 'Why'.

made time for attendees to develop their 'Why' while we were together. I found my 'Why': To make it easy for anyone to learn to read and write English so that they can reach their full potential. So cool!!

Part II covered Market Research & Target Marget. Jennifer relayed why it is important to know who your customers are early on so that you are better off later on. She said that, "It can be really difficult to let go of trying to please everyone, but by casting a wide net, you may end up missing the mark with all of your audiences." Jennifer added that clearly defining the demographics (married, male, 37, etc.) and psychographics (loves to travel, avid hiker, values family time, etc.) can help you figure out what similarities you see across your sales. For example, check out the analytics on your social media posts to see where and what kind of posts that you are getting traction on - where you are getting engagement. I asked her how to get that information, besides online research, and she said a great way is pop-up questions when they check out online. The most important question to ask a customer is, "How did you hear about my product?"

What's my style? To get more of her insight, register for the next webinar.

Developing a customer personas helps you define where and who to market to. It's like a dating bio for your ideal customer. She also advised that you pick carefully which social media sites to post on - you can't post on all of them or you'll go crazy. Pick a couple and do it well. You can also check out a competitor's site and see what kind of customer is following them and which sites they use. No matter what site you use, be sure to include a link to your site so people can make a purchase. Jennifer teaches other business foundation classes for Spaceworks. Look for the 12-week Business Launch Co-hort this winter for folks that have a product or service but you might not be selling it yet. In the Fall and Spring, she has a 4 week Idea Cohort.



Finding your 'Why' helps you stay focused. It's your purpose, your passion or a cause/belief that drives you - and if it resonates with others, that's why they buy from you. Jennifer shared her 'Why' for SPUN: To support and connect people so that they can realize their dreams. She

Jennifer offered special advice for artists and creative businesses: ask these 3 questions: 1) What's my niche interest? 2) What's my subject? 3)



HILITOP ACTION JOURNAL 7 Getting To The Root Of The City Of Tacoma's Zoning Change Proposal

Each area of Tacoma has different needs and if there was ever a time to become engaged at the local level, this is it.

If you have not been paying attention since 2018, Mayor Woodward, City Council Members, the Planning Commission, and the Housing Equity Taskforce began taking steps to fulfill their Housing Action Plan for the city. Before Covid, you might have even learned about the new building options called ADU's and DADU's which you might think of as tiny homes that are either attached or detached from an already existing home. These changes were the start of a housing transition plan which is slowly coming to fruition and called the Home in Tacoma Project¹.

The Root Policy Research team is the organization that performed the survey and submitted the formal proposal² to the Planning Commission. In 2019, they found that 7,159 households (Root, 6) with incomes less than \$35,000 were unable to find rental units. They also found this comparable to Tacoma Housing Authority which has 6,500 households on their waitlist. In total, a low-income family might wait 5 years before being given a chance to move out of a shelter, tent-camp, or emergency living facility. And while the goal of the Home in Tacoma Project is to increase affordable housing options within city limits it admits that it is not going to meet the needs of these lowest earners. A step in that direction was more recently made along that path with the City of Tacoma raising its sales tax to fund affordable housing projects3. These funds are supposed to go towards such low-income projects which will be more easily completed with the zoning change as more diverse housing options will be made available.

Originally, 75% of Tacoma's residential land was set aside for single-family homes only. The change to the zoning would allow more diverse construction for the creation of multi-family or *missing middle* housing. But even with new housing, Tacoma still exists within

an affordable housing vacuum meaning any new affordable housing built might get swiped up by noncommunity residents with remote jobs in Seattle.

The City is hoping to start this process with In-fill housing plus community input to slowly grow the program. In-fill housing is not gentrification, which historically was a process that targeted neighborhoods for demolition and displaced residents. In-fill housing means allowing for more diverse new construction on currently empty lots or in a private backyard to start. No residents should be displaced during this process. In a later phase of this project, construction developers may be able to submit plans that include the demolition of buildings but this is not the initial goal.

The types of homes that are shown as needed by the city are referred to as the missing middle and include buildings such as the duplex, triplex, fourplex, courtyard apartments, bungalow or cottage courts, townhomes, multiplexes, and small mixed-use live/work complexes. The new buildings are also required to be designed to match already existing home and residential patterns. To help with this, a height limit is being placed on buildings to keep them under three or four floors with transitioning spaces required so a one-story home isn't sitting next to a three-story building. Although, this is not something the City has always been good at4.

Criticisms of this project are mentioned in the City's Minority Report whic is from dissenting members of the City Council and include a warning about forprofit developers. New buildings constructed by for-profit developers are no guarantee of the creation of affordable housing as projects have to meet certain thresholds to pay off loans, for instance. This minority argument doesn't reflect that the same opportunities are available to the non-profit sector and community coalitions. This is rather a chance for capital investors and community

organizers to make 'A Dash for the Timber.'

The Root Policy Research team admits that there are more opportunities if housing is built north of I5 rather than south, as median home values are higher (Root pdf, pg. 7). Ironically, the more affluent a neighborhood is, the more likely they are to push back on affordable housing. This is a reminder of something else that in-fill housing is not, as it is not the same as community or even business investment with city, state, or federal funds. Also, the expansion of any Commercial Districts is currently being limited meaning areas like the Eastside won't become a 'destination within the city' anvtime soon.

Let's crunch some numbers: The Root Policy Research group reported that the median rent for 2019 was \$1,273 (pg. 7). To check the feasibility of getting this cost down or even stabilized, we need to look at the Growth Targets for Tacoma which are reported on by several organizations (pg. 12). Between 2016-2019 the growth in Tacoma was an average of 1,755 housing units which is below all suggested targets for our housing market to keep pace with the new demand. Therefore, if the goal is to make rents go down, the city needs way more housing units built each year than ever before.

The estimated time for the zoning change to occur and for developers to start submitting proposals is one to two years. Each area of Tacoma has different needs and if there was ever a time to become engaged at the local level, this is it. Communities around the US (and the world) have been creating their own Affordable Housing Co-Ops, Community Land Trusts, and even Community-Owned Grocery Stores for decades. This zoning change provides the legal framework that Community Leaders may use to transform their neighborhoods from the inside-out creating true bottom-up change but if the people don't unite, they risk this zoning change becoming a free-forall.

The Kinsey African American Art & History Collection Coming This Summer to Tacoma Art Museum

This groundbreaking exhibition features over 150 works of art, photographs, rare documents, and more, celebrating the achievements and contributions of Black Americans from 1595 to the present day. Exhibition open through November 28, 2021.

Tacoma Art Museum is pleased to present the widely acclaimed exhibition, The Kinsey African American Art & History Collection, celebrating the achievements and contributions of Black Americans from 1595 to present times. Considered one of the most comprehensive surveys of African American history and culture outside the Smithsonian Institution, the exhibition will feature over 150 of the shared treasures amassed by Bernard and Shirley Kinsey during their five decades of marriage. The collection includes masterful paintings and sculptures, photographs, rare books, letters, manuscripts, and more. The exhibition at TAM, which will include some works from the Kinsey Collection that have not been shown before, will run July 31 - November 28, 2021.

The exhibition has been cited in three national awards, including the National Medal for Museum and Library Service. Garnering national media attention and experienced by more than 15 million people, the groundbreaking exhibition has toured 30 cities in the U.S. and internationally, including the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of American History, The National Underground Railroad Freedom Center, EPCOT Walt Disney World, the University of Hong Kong Museum and Gallery, and California African American Museum, to name a few. Currently, the exhibition is at the Greenwood Cultural Center and Gathering Place in Tulsa as part of events marking the 100th anniversary of the Tulsa Race Massacre through June 27.

Representing the intersection between art and history, the exhibition covers the lives, accomplishments, and artistry of African Americans from the 16th century through the years of slavery and emancipation to the civil rights movement and today. Important objects include bills of sale, advertisements, letters, and legal papers documenting the slave trade; hand-colored tintypes from the Civil War era; art and literature from the Harlem Renaissance; and items spotlighting key moments in the civil rights movement, including the Woolworth store boycotts and the 1963 March on Washington. A history of African Americans in art is charted through works by numerous celebrated artists, including Grafton Tyler Brown, Bisa Butler, Elizabeth Catlett, Robert S. Duncanson, Sam Gilliam, Augusta Savage, Alma Thomas, Charles White, and many more.

Bernard and Shirley Kinsey, Floridians by birth and graduates of Florida A&M University, began collecting to remember their travels. Soon their collection became a repository for African American intellectual, historical, and artistic works. The Kinseys believe their collection helps give a well-rounded look at the African American experience and the integral roles African Americans played in building this country, providing new perspectives on chapters of the nation's history which have been ignored. Bernard and Shirley's son, Khalil Kinsey, serves as General

Manager and Chief Curator for the collection and exhibitions.

"The Kinsey Collection strives to give our ancestors a voice, a name, and a personality, enabling the viewer to understand the challenges, obstacles, triumphs, accomplishments, and extraordinary sacrifice of African Americans in building this country," said Bernard Kinsey. Khalil adds, "This is an American story, and most people only know a fraction of it."

While this exhibition has been shown in numerous locations across the United States, this will be the first time the exhibition has been presented in the Pacific Northwest. According to Bernard Kinsey, "The collection at TAM is an opportunity for people in the Pacific Northwest and surrounding areas to see historical artifacts and artworks that are extremely rare and vitally important to the story of America."

David F. Setford, TAM's Executive Director, said, "When I traveled to Dallas in September 2019 to see this exhibition and meet the Kinseys, I was overwhelmed. I was amazed by the power of the documents and works of art on display, by their ability to tell an untold story, and by the commitment of the Kinseys to share that story. I resolved that we needed to share this story at TAM."

The exhibition's presentation at TAM and related community programming is being developed in collaboration with an exhibition advisory committee comprised of 18 Black leaders, artists, educators, and activists from the greater Tacoma area. Special tours, performances, talks,educator workshops, school tours, youth programs, and more







Grit City Trees 2021: A Free Street Tree Program

In the 2020 season, Grit City Trees distributed about 206 trees with 75% going to Tacoma's traditionally underserved neighborhoods.

Grit City Trees is the City of Tacoma's annual free street tree giveaway program. This program provides free street trees to Tacoma residents who are interested in planting in the rightof-way, the planting space between the edge of the road and their property boundary. Applications for the 2021 season are being accepted now through September 5th for groups of neighbors, and August 22nd for individuals.

Why plant a Tree? Adding more trees to neighborhoods is proven to help keep places cool during the hottest days, clean the air we breathe, filter and manage stormwater runoff, slow neighborhood traffic, provide mental health benefits, and so much more.

Trees make our community cooler

The Urban Heat Island (UHI) happens when buildings, roads, and other heat-absorbing infrastructure attracts and holds onto more of the sun's energy (heat), compared to natural landscapes. This heat is slowly reemitted throughout the night, which keeps urban places hotter, around the clock. This excess heat causes an increase in heat-related illness to the community. Natural landscapes, including trees, can significantly reduce temperatures. The differences in temperature have been measured in real time across Tacoma during a 2018 study with Portland State University.

"Almost all cities experience a degree of the heat-island effect, but neighborhoods with low canopy coverage suffer the most, sometimes registering temperatures up to 7-9 degrees hotter than surrounding areas. The neighborhoods with the highest heat island values almost always directly correlate with low-income, historically minority neighborhoods. This holds true in Tacoma as well." – Tacoma Tree Foundation 2020.

Tree coverage is a major factor affecting the livability of a neighborhood and leads to clear differences in quality of life across neighborhoods in Tacoma. With tree canopy coverage as low as 2.9% in some traditionally underserved neighborhoods, it is vital that the City provide resources to support tree growth in these communities, to help improve the health of these communities.

Tacoma is committed to racial, social, climate, and environmental justice

The goal of the Grit City Trees program is to equitably grow happy and healthy neighborhoods through community tree planting. With the City's commitment to anti-racist transformation, even trees have a role to play. The Grit City Trees program prioritizes planting in Tacoma's traditionally underserved neighborhoods, which includes Hilltop.

In the 2020 season, Grit City Trees distributed about 206 trees with 75% going to Tacoma's traditionally underserved neighborhoods. We hope to increase the number of trees being planted in our traditionally underserved neighborhoods and increase the quality of life for people living

v- there.

We would not have reached these numbers without the amazing work of "Tree Captains." These community leaders inspire their neighbors to take incremental actions like tree planting, which continuously improves the environment and quality of life in their neighborhoods for generations to come. For that, we are forever grateful.

How to participate

The City can promote planting, but it takes a village to grow a forest. Neighbors are encouraged to work together, while following COVID-19 safety precautions, to apply for Grit City Trees as a group. Individuals are also eligible to apply. Tacoma residents interested in participating will need to send in the Grit City Trees application available at https://www. cityoftacoma.org/government/city_ departments/environmentalservices/ urban forestry/grit city trees. All applications will be considered with preference given to neighborhood group applications from Tacoma's traditionally underserved neighborhoods.

Free trees and other supporting materials such as TAGRO, tree stakes, and tree ties will be available for individuals to pick up at the City's Plant Holding Facility this fall. If you apply as a neighborhood group, all of these materials will be delivered for free, starting in October. In the spring, watering materials will be available for ease of tree watering during the dry summer months. Regularly watering a new tree for at least the first three years after planting is

crucial for them to establish healthy roots and thrive.

Hilltop – do you know where your rainwater ends up? When rainwater hits hard surfaces like roofs,

lots, it becomes stormwater runoff and washes pollutants like litter, pet waste, and car oil into the city stormwater system leading directly to Commencement bay and Puget Sound. In Tacoma, the stormwater system is separate from the pipes

sidewalk, driveways and parking

that collect wastewater from sinks, showers and toilets. Wastewater is cleaned at the Central Wastewater Treatment Plant before being released into Puget Sound, but stormwater doesn't get cleaned at the treatment plant. So in Tacoma:

In other words, Puget Sound Starts Here: wherever we live, work or play on the Hilltop. This fall, there are lots of opportunities for Hilltop neighbors to help take care of our piece of Puget Sound. September is Puget Sound Starts Here month!

o Apply for a Make a Splash grant. Applications for 2022 projects are accepted during the month of September (www.cityoftacoma.org/ makeasplash). Be reimbursed up to \$4,000 for a project that helps protect our surface waters or educate about the importance of preventing stormwater pollution.

o Adopt-a-storm drain on your street. Starting in September, volunteer to sweep up, rake up, pick up and keep litter and leaves out of your storm drain to prevent stormwater pollution and flooding when it rains. Program participants receive a yard sign to let everyone know you are helping protect Puget Sound. You can also request stencil art for your storm drain (pictured above.) Sign up at <u>www.adopt-a-drain.org</u>.

o Sponsor a Neighborhood Dog Waste Station – Is doggy doo an issue on your street? A friendly doggy bag station may help. Apply to have a free station installed on your street with a sign, bag dispenser, and free bag refills. All you need to do is monitor and restock the bags. To get started, contact Sarah Norberg at (253) 208-0536 or <u>snorberg@city-oftacoma.org</u>.

o Mark your catch basins (street drains) – Help your neighbors remember "only rain down the drain" by marking catch basins in your neighborhood with curb markers. Contact Citizens for a Healthy Bay <u>www.healthybay.org</u> to borrow a marking kit and get busy.

Green-up your neighborhood and protect Puget Sound from stormwa-

o Plant a rain garden. These bowl-shaped gardens capture, absorb, and clean stormwater runoff, and getting one has never been easier!

o Urban Habitat. Tired of mowing your lawn? Turn your turf into habitat at home! Get help now to create pollinator-friendly wildlife habitat.

COVID-19: Accurate Information For School Requirements

K-12 COVID-19 Requirements for Summer 2021 and the 2021-2022 School Year

Washington State Dept. of Health

The Washington State Dept. of Health has 2 goals for our students: o Minimize transmission of COVID-19 among students and staff in K-12 schools and to their families and broader community. o Maximize in-person instruction.

They believe that schools are fundamental to child and adolescent development and well-being. They provide academic instruction, support for developing social and emotional skills, safety, reliable nutrition, physical/ speech and mental health therapy, and opportunities for physical activity. This guidance provides feasible actions schools are required to take to reduce risks to students and staff from COVID-19 while schools resume in-person instruction.

For the 2021-2022 school year, schools must plan to provide full time in-person education for all interested students with the following required mitigation measures: face coverings/ masks, physical distancing, improving ventilation, hand washing and respiratory etiquette, cleaning and disinfecting, staying home when sick and seeking evaluation, testing as indicated, contact tracing in combination with quarantine and isolation, responding to cases of COVID-19, and meeting the reporting requirements to public health. While vaccination is not a requirement for in-person education at K-12 schools, it is the strongest protective measure against COVID-19 available to individuals 12 years of age and older. Vaccination and testing should be promoted for all eligible students, teachers, staff, volunteers, and families. Since vaccinations are not yet authorized for use in children ages 11 years of age and younger, schools must continue to implement a layered strategy as outlined in the requirements.

Finding Housing Solutions For Young People May Just Be One Day Away

Unique housing solutions to meet the needs of our young people... there is no cookie-cutter way to approach finding housing for everyone.

Nicollett Roe, Program By Coordinator for Tacoma Northwest Education Access

This past Monday afternoon, I got a call from a student I work with who needed access to money for housing. The following day, she was renting a room from a friend's house and had 3 months paid for, including gas, to get her SUV there.

The funds we used for her specific housing solution are called Centralized Diversion Funds (CDF) managed by A Way Home Washington. It's a highly flexible fund aimed to house 12-24 years old experiencing a housing crisis and not currently in a housing program. The goal is to get folks housed as soon as possible or within 30 days, for at least 90 days, and living outside the homeless housing system.

My expertise; however, is not in housing but it does overlap with my work. I completed A Way Home Washington's free three-day training to be someone from my organization that can apply for the funds. About seven more agencies in Tacoma have at least one person on staff who has

acoma

been through the training and can A Way Home Washington is even support folks in that same way.

As a Program Coordinator with Northwest Education Access, I serve students on non-traditional education pathways, ages 16-29, in navigating post-secondary education. I offer one-on-one, long-term educational support to and through graduation no matter how long that may take. Housing comes up often in my work as something that can keep a student from persisting, so CDF has been a tremendous resource that I want to share with others.

Our student-led model works, and A Way Home Washington uses a very similar person-centered model and flexibility to think up creative housing solutions. The funds can be used towards a ton of different things because they understand that there is no cookie-cutter way to approach finding a housing option for everyone. The specificity of an individual's needs varies, so the solution to get them housed must also be. And no, there is no cap on the amount one can request, but it is meant to be a onetime application (rather than, say, an ongoing emergency rental assistance.

flexible in this, though).

Here are some ways students have utilized these funds: One young person was couch surfing and occasionally sleeping at his uncle's house, but he couldn't stay at his uncle's permanently because there wasn't enough room. The uncle's house did, however, have an unfinished basement. With Centralized Diversion Funds, they were able to buy the materials and tools they needed to renovate it and make it liveable so that the young person could stay there permanently.

Another young person used CDF to buy a plane ticket to New York to live with his mother permanently and to cover the cost of food on the way there. One other person had CDF cover the security deposit, pet deposit, and additional move-in expenses for an apartment, including a UHaul truck, gas for the moving truck, a bed frame, mattress, and sheets. Lastly, a PLU student used it to cover summer quarter housing at the dorms after finding out their financial aid package couldn't cover it.

There are many more examples, but

my point is that housing solutions are just as unique as people. Everyone holds different relationships in their community that can be leveraged and thought about to consider possible solutions. Someone like me, certified by CDF to apply for the funds, can work with a young person to think through what some of their possibilities are and ultimately get out of their way and tell us what they need. As Nikita Oliver says, "Those closest to the struggle hold the solutions." Young people are no exception.

There are no income requirements where you have to prove your income status. There's no credits check, background check, any barriers that would keep someone from applying. It starts with a conversation and thought partner to complete the application after figuring out a safe and permanent housing plan.

MultiCare Invests \$5 Million In Forterra Fund To Improve Community Health Through Affordable Housing

TACOMA, Wash. —MultiCare Health System is proud to announce a \$5 million investment in affordable housing in Tacoma's Hilltop neighborhood through Forterra's Strong Communities Fund II (SCF II), which partners with communities to lower the cost of home ownership.

The new community-designed project will have four buildings with an anticipated 300 homes and approximately 25,000 square feet of commercial space. Half of all the housing provided will be attainably priced for local Hilltop residents.

When there's limited affordable housing options, families and individuals may have to spend most or a large part of their income on acquiring or maintaining secure housing. This burden can mean that people are not able to pay for things such as health care or healthy food. This can have lifelong, adverse effects on a person's health, and research shows that affordable housing can decrease the risk of diseases, mental health problems and other health issues.

"Our mission is focused on partnering with communities for healing and a healthy future, and this attainable housing project is a huge step forward for community health," said MultiCare CEO and president Bill Robertson. "This is MultiCare's first investment in a project of this kind, and we're glad that it's in one of the oldest residential neighborhoods in Tacoma."

The Hilltop community of Tacoma has been the center of Black culture in the South Sound for generations, and the neighborhood is experiencing rapid gentrification that threatens to displace long-time residents and businesses. Housing prices in Tacoma are among the fastest rising in the nation, and the impact of increasing prices is magnified in the diverse and resilient Hilltop community, where housing has become unaffordable to its residents. In 2019, Hilltop community leaders reached out to Forterra to help secure a key property at the heart of the Hilltop community, which was vacant for many years. That same year, Forterra bought the property at the corner of MLK Jr. Way and S. 11th Street through its Strong Communities Fund, and immediately began working with the Hilltop community to create a housing model for area residents that is attainable in the short term and affordable over the long term.

For the past two years, Forterra has worked with local community engagement partners, including Fab-5, to address the community's needs for attainable homes and affordable space for locally-owned BIPOC shops and restaurants, in a development that will incorporate Hilltop culture and art into this block. This new community-designed project contemplates four buildings with an anticipated 300 homes and approximately 25,000 square feet of commercial space. Half of all the housing provided will be priced to be attainable to local Hilltop residents with an anticipated groundbreaking in fall 2023.

"MultiCare's investment in SCF II puts those funds into a vehicle directly designed to build attainable and sustainable homes in under-resourced communities," said Forterra president and CEO Michelle Conner. "We are pleased that the MultiCare's holistic perspective of wellness leads back to healthy, affordable homes that resist displacement of a long-standing community."

Census Bureau To Release 2020 Census Results This Month With Redistricting Data

Redistricting data will be provided in two releases: the first release will be Aug. 16 and the second by Sept. 30.

Later this month, the Census Bureau will release the redistricting data from the 2020 Census. These data include the first sub-state population counts and demographic characteristics from the census; information that the states typically use for redistricting. Redistricting data, which were delayed as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, will be provided in two releases. Both releases contain the same information but are presented in different formats. The first release will be Aug. 16 and the second by Sept. 30.

Redistricting Data

The data that will be released by Aug. 16 will include:

- Housing unit counts
- Occupancy status for housing units (occupied or vacant)
- Population totals
- Population totals by race

- Population totals by race and Hispanic/Latino origin

- Voting-age population (18 and older) totals by race and Hispanic/ Latino origin

- Population totals in group quarters by major group quarters type Within each, we will provide data for multiple geographies such as Counties, Townships, Cities, Voting Districts, School Districts, Tracts and

RELEASE 1: August 16

Census Blocks.

RELEASE 2: by September 30

The second release of data will have easier-to-use formats to empower everyone to access and use the redistricting data. The same data will be released as Release 1 but in two additional formats that are easier to use. The public will be able to access the data through the Census Bureau's primary data dissemination tool, the data.census.gov platform available at https://data.census.gov/cedsci/.

Protecting Confidentiality

Because the redistricting data have demographic characteristics available for very small areas, it's essential that steps are taken to protect the data reported by or on behalf of individuals.

The 2020 Census redistricting data will be the first census protected using differential privacy. This modern method protects individual information while letting us share important statistics about communities. Differential privacy has been successfully used in several other Census Bureau data products. Data Quality

As always, the Census Bureau is committed to being transparent about the quality of the 2020 Census results. Shortly after the August release of



redistricting data, we plan to release additional operational quality metrics to provide further insight into how we collected the census responses and what that might mean for the quality of the data.

NWSA Passes Infrastructure Funding For Electric Trucks Project In Tacoma Harbor

Managing Members of the NWSA voted to further environmental sustainability efforts by approving \$560,000 to support the use of Electric Yard Trucks in the Tacoma Harbor.

Electric Yard Trucks, also known as terminal tractors, are cargo handling equipment that move containers to and from container stacks and rail cars. Rail Management Services will purchase the terminal tractors and charging stations, with the Northwest Seaport Alliance (NWSA) installing the electrical infrastructure to support the charging of the trucks. The electric tractors will be the first of their kind in the NWSA gateway. alike were exploring and celebrating the history of ragtime.

In 2020, the NWSA was awarded a \$780,000 DERA grant and accepted \$130,000 in Tacoma Power's Cargo/Material Handler Equipment incentive funding to bring six electric terminal tractors to Tacoma's South Intermodal Yard. The six zeroemission electric yard trucks will reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 260 tons per year. In addition, electric yard trucks are cheaper to operate than traditional diesel trucks and having fewer maintenance needs due to fewer moving parts. Rail Management Services has experience implementing electric terminal tractors and has successfully deployed this technology in its operations at other terminals.

Earlier this year, the NWSA adopted the updated Northwest Ports Clean Air Strategy, which lays out an aspirational vision to phase out emissions from seaport activities by 2050. Achieving this vision will involve adopting zeroemission technology across various parts of the supply chain, of which terminal trucks are one element. Investing in charging infrastructures supports customer efforts to increase operational efficiency and advances environmental performance in the gateway.

"The NWSA is thrilled to build upon the work of the Northwest Ports Clean Air Strategy and welcome this new zero-emission technology to our Tacoma Harbor," said Dick Marzano, Port of Tacoma Commission President and Managing Member of the NWSA. "This is just the beginning of showing the longstanding operational and environmental benefits of electric yard trucks within our gateway."

The Northwest Seaport Alliance is a marine cargo operating partnership of the ports of Seattle and Tacoma. Combined, the ports are the fourthlargest container gateway in the United States. Regional marine cargo facilities also are a major center for

M C Delivery's Road To Success



Tacoma's M C Delivery doesn't deliver packages by motorcycle anymore, but its delivery roots trace back almost 100 years to a Tacoma motorcycle dealership looking for a way to sell more inventory.

That dealership, Indian Cycle Co., sold Indian motorcycles and was owned by Max and Ida Steinhart. In 1928, they started Indian Cycle Delivery as a way to sell new motorcycles to customers by giving them local courier jobs in order to support themselves and pay for the motorcycles, according to a historical account provided by M C Delivery.

In 1940, Western Union telegram courier Jack Laycock pedaled the hills of Tacoma on his bicycle and longed for the easier transit of the Indian motorcycles he saw traversing Tacoma's challenging landscape. Unable to purchase even a used Indian motorcycle, he charmed Ida Steinhart into loaning him a used Indian motorcycle until he was able to make the weekly payments and ultimately buy one.

Eventually, Laycock, after serving overseas during World War II, and his wife, Nettie, purchased Indian Cycle Delivery Co. from the Steinharts for \$1,200. They received two used Indian sidecar motorcycles and the Common Carrier permit issued by the Washington State Utilities and Transportation Commission authorizing them to deliver packages weighing less than 70 pounds within Tacoma city limits. The Laycocks renamed the business Motorcycle Parcel Delivery, or MPD.


MPD eventually retired the motorcycle sidecars in the 1950s in favor of panel trucks to accommodate more diverse work and a booming economy.

But after the release of the highly sensationalized noir film The Wild One, starring a young Marlon Brando and Lee Marvin portraying outlaw motorcycle gang leaders riding and racing recklessly and taking over a small town in the process, the company changed its name to M C Delivery in 1958, according the historical account. The kangaroo logo said Shari, operations supervisor for the 40-person company.

Her father was planning on retiring around the time COVID- 19 emerged, but he's stayed on board to help get through the pandemic, "Because if we can survive this, then anything that comes in our future ... we should be able to handle," Shari said.

Today, M C Delivery operates a fleet of 60 cars, vans, trucks, and tractor-trailers doing mostly businessto-business delivery throughout Greater Puget Sound and beyond. "We go up to Arlington once a week and we go down to Longview once a week, so it's what the customers need," Shari said, adding that M C even makes occasional trips to Eastern Washington. The company offers same-day or expedited delivery of everything from documents and packages up to 70 pounds, to one or two pallets of items to full truckloads.

M C Delivery, in honoring and celebrating its history, plans to change signage on its delivery fleet to include a photo from its days as Indian Cycle Delivery, featuring original owner Max Steinhart with couriers of yesteryear in addition to the current kangaroo logo. All vehicles will have the new look by the 100th anniversary on July 15, 2028. The company also is transitioning its name to Indian Cycle Delivery/M C Delivery to honor its nearly 100-year

was added in 1965, completing the look that remains to this day.

The Laycocks' son, Andrew, took over the business in 1986 and remains CEO. His twin daughters, Shari Laycock and Sara Laycock-Webb, vice presidents in M C Delivery, will likely take the reins within two years, history.

"We want to thank all of our employees, past and present, as well as the local business community, for supporting M C Delivery over the past century," the company said. "We could not have done it without you. We look forward to the next century."

More About Evergreen Options Grant Program

Evergreen Options is a voluntary program that allows Tacoma Power customers to buy electricity produced from new renewable sources, like wind and solar, through renewable energy certificates (RECs).

This annual grant program helps recipients generate a portion of their own electricity from renewable sources including wind, solar, geothermal, landfill gas, wave or tidal, biomass, gas produced during the treatment of wastewater, and qualified hydropower. Recipients may also receive credit for any extra electricity their system provides back to the utility. Grant funding comes from Tacoma Power residential and business customers who participate in the Evergreen Options program.

The 2021 application period is open. The deadline for 2021 applications is August 20, 2021. Please submit your application prior to the deadline to be considered for the 2021 grants.
