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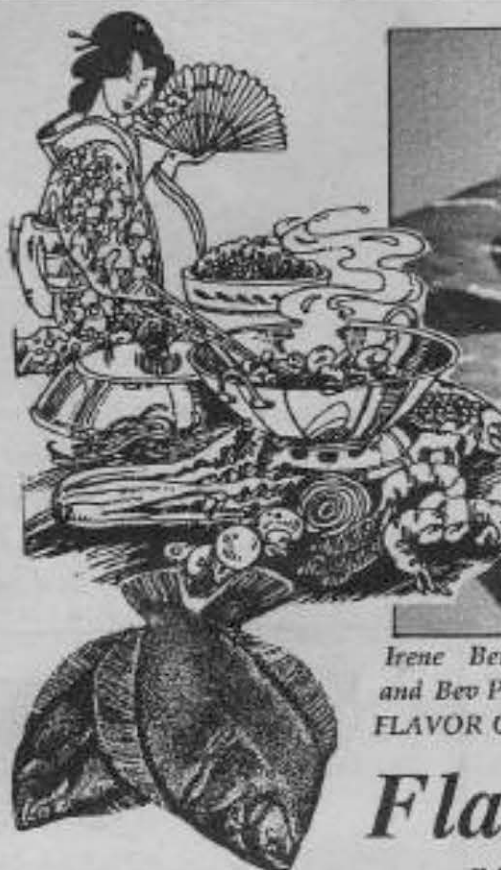

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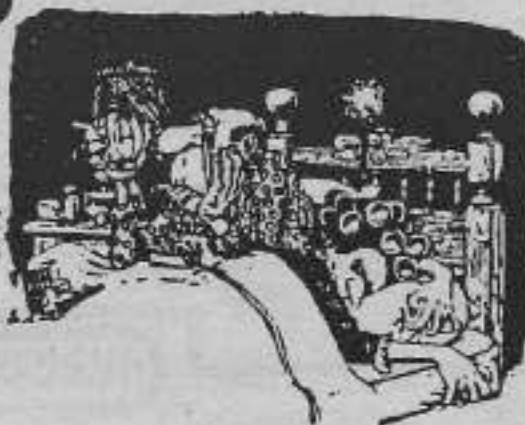
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## Ashes

The meeting was called to order by vice-president, Sylvia Haase. The minutes of the July meeting were approved as published in the newspaper.

**MANAGER'S REPORT:** Irene reported six new lights have been installed in the news paper room. Everything has been moved and the news paper is up and running in the new location. Six packets have been sent out for the house auction to be held August 25. Preview of the house will be on August 19.

**PIONEER DAY:** Tim reported a great turnout for the event. There were lots of children, and a well-behaved crowd in general. The board gave Tim a big hand for a job well done. Tim plans to chair Pioneer Day next year also. In the future, signs will be posted banning skateboards and bicycles in the parking lot for Civic Center events.

**FLAVOR OF FALL:** Claudia reported the menu is set and the dinner will prove to be an incredible experience. Plan to attend on September 30.

**RENO NIGHT:** This will be on November 4, and dealers are still needed.

**GRANTS:** We have had a response from Key Bank asking for more information, which will be sent to them next week. We are also in the process of applying for a grant to replace the windows in the Whitmore Room.

**HISTORICAL SOCIETY:** The August meeting will be a picnic, Pioneer Day drew lots of visitors to the museum.

**NEW BUSINESS:** Ed Taylor suggested we apply for a grant to obtain a large generator to run the well, lights and heating system at the Center in case of a disaster. It was suggested we ask the community to help get the Center prepared. Howard volunteered to check with the military about obtaining a generator.

The Executive Board will meet on September 7 to discuss the financial status of the Center and the budget. A Nominating Committee was appointed to find candidates for the upcoming election in November. Howard Reynolds will chair the committee; other members are: Shirl Olsen and Donna Bosch.

The meeting adjourned at 8:15 p.m.

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

## VOTE FOR Ruth BRAMHALL

*"The Key Peninsula community is important to me. As Fire Commissioner, I will bring a neutral citizen's prospective to fire department issues. I am asking for your support because I am the best person for the position."*



1) Please provide some biographical information, including your age, family, education and experience.

My husband, Jim, and I were married in Victor, Montana 48 years ago. Victor was where I was born 71 years ago.

Upon graduation from high school I worked for Douglas Aircraft, in California, driving rivets. I left that employment to enter nurses training in Great Falls, Montana. Upon graduation Jim and I were married and we live in Tacoma for 22 years. We have lived on the Peninsula for 26 years.

My first employment was at Doctor's Hospital and then I was employed by Mary Bridge Children's Hospital for 28 years as the supervisor of surgery and central supply.

My responsibilities included interviewing, hiring, training, staffing, purchasing and budgeting. Over the years I learned a great deal regarding concerns and fears of both parent and child. I also was accountable to many other people - the doctor, the anesthesiologist and other staff members and administration.

I served as the National President of the Association of Operating Room Nurses and afterward, for 10 years, served each year in the delegate and voting process. My duties as President required that I assign national committees, vote a monthly article for our Journal. Presided at the National congress. All of this required much coordination and cooperation between elected members, located all over the U.S., Headquarters staff and Congress exhibitors and advertisers.

2) What are your reasons for seeking this office?

I have been asked, by the Commissioners, the Fire Chief or a member of the department, to serve on several different committees over the past 7 years. I first served on the EMS Committee asked the community to renew the EMS levy. It passed. The next was the Future Planning Committee. Our final recommendations to the Commissioners were to build four

new fire stations. The recommendations were accepted so the Committee was asked to assist with informing the voting public the reasons the stations were needed and convince the voters to pass the bond. The bond passed.

I was appointed to serve as a Commissioner for a brief time, two years ago. I have attended most of the meetings since, precluding orientation.

3) What are your qualifications for holding this office?

As stated above, I have experience in more than one field. I am better qualified to represent the community.

I have also served as treasurer for the Jackson Lake Sportsmen's Club for the past five years, this includes doing the purchasing.

I have served on the Key Peninsula Health Board, the Key Peninsula Family Services Board and also was elected Citizen of the Year by the Lions Club.

4) What do you feel will be the major issues you will face if elected, and how would you propose to deal with them?

When we asked the people to approve the bond we said we would build four new fire stations. Due to several circumstances, including a delay in receiving the first two permits, when bids were let for the remaining two station it was apparent there was not enough money to build two more stations the same size. Meetings have been held, to orient the people and get input, for down-sizing the stations. We need to get the other two stations built.

I served on the Fire Chief Selection Task Force committee. The new chief has not been here a year. He has an open door, open to suggestions. He has also been submitting different ideas. Right now is the time for next years budget, consideration should be for more than one year and include a reserve fund. What can be done to down size the administrative level or re-align responsibilities? People have asked if a good physical fitness program is in place. Decisions are not made by one person. I am a worker and a contributor. I will represent the people that will vote me into office.

## Lakebay Food Bank Burglarized

The Lakebay Food Bank was burglarized by some mean-spirited hooligans on Tuesday, August 22nd. Entrance was made through a back window and escape was through the front door. In between, everything was destroyed. Phones were yanked out, desks were rifled and things were strewn around. The safe was vandalized, but did not give up the currency stored inside. 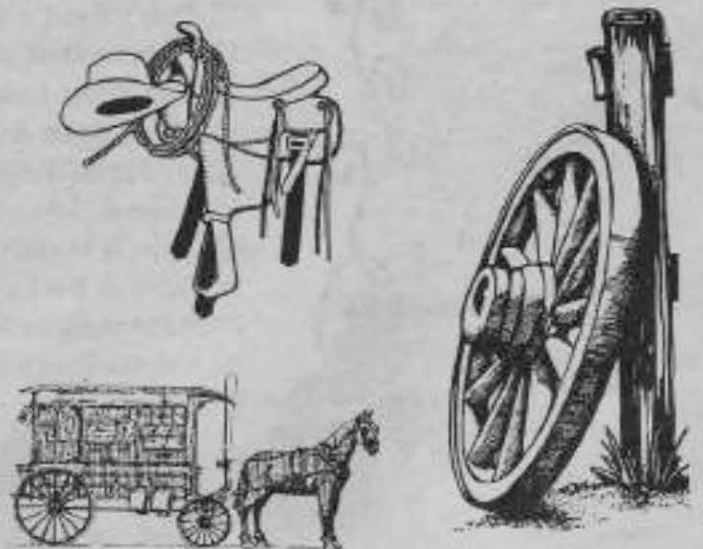

The summer days of 1995 draw to a close, and about 8800 Peninsula School District students will be heading back to classrooms on Tuesday, September 5th.

On our Key Peninsula students will return to one of three elementary schools, one middle school, or make the trip to Purdy to Peninsula High School, home to the "Seahawks." Returning students will find some administrative changes since last Spring as various administrators have taken new positions within the school system.

Pierce County is currently in the midst of a mini-epidemic of Hepatitis A, which has definitely reached our peninsula. We've seen cases of it and have given dozens of shots to prevent it, so it seemed like a reasonable topic to discuss this month.

Hepatitis is a non-descript term that refers to any process that damages the liver, resulting in elevation of the blood tests your doctor uses to monitor the liver's function. Liver damage can be the result of alcohol, other drugs, and illnesses, but there are at least three viruses that specifically injure the liver, conveniently called Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B, and Hepatitis C. Hepatitis A used to be called infectious hepatitis, and is spread by eating food that has been contaminated by the virus by someone who has the disease. For this reason it's the most easily spread and most common, often relating to an infected restaurant worker potentially exposing lots of patrons. Hepatitis B (serum hepatitis) and Hepatitis C are more serious disorders spread by exposure to bodily fluids, and while they are very infectious, fewer people are exposed to them because of the method of transmission.

After potential exposure to Hepatitis A, there is an incubation period of 2-7 weeks (average about 4

weeks) before symptoms of the disease appear. The presenting symptoms are fatigue, nausea, low grade fever, and abdominal pain. After these start, the patient often develops a yellow color to the eyes and skin called jaundice, with darkening of the urine and lightening of the stool. It's usually about this time that the patient realizes something unusual is wrong and seeks medical attention. Hepatitis A can be confirmed by blood tests, and the vast majority of patients can be treated at home with supportive care as long as they don't get dehydrated. It's important to make the diagnosis even though there is no specific treatment, as a shot of Gamma Globulin to family members can prevent it from spreading to other household contacts. This is necessary only for those who have eaten food prepared by the sick patient, or shared a toothbrush, drinking glass, or other similar contact; you cannot get it by sitting in the same room or riding in a car with them. Gamma Globulin gives temporary "passive" protection for about 90 days against Hepatitis A by injecting premade antibodies that attack the virus if it enters the recipient's body. There is a new Hepatitis A vaccine but it is not in widespread use, and its main purpose appears to be for those travelers who go to other areas of the world repeatedly where Hepatitis A is much more prevalent. At this time, the American Academy of Pediatricians is not recommending the Hepatitis A vaccine for everyone, but they strongly recommend all children receive the Hepatitis B vaccine, as it's a much more serious disease.

Fiona McLaughlin, who returned to college after 20 years, is a student at Tacoma Community College. With four children from first to ninth grades, Fiona reports, "Studying at our house is a family affair. We do our

homework together, and my report card is on the refrigerator right next to theirs."

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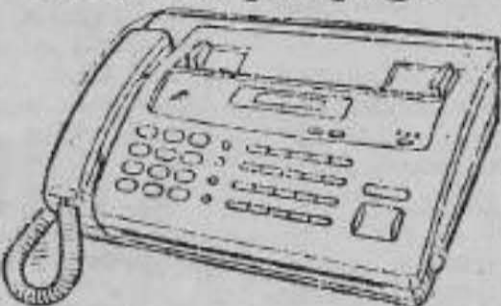
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# Tax Tips

I sit here, doing research for this column. Sometimes it is not the easiest job to select items which you might find interesting—but I thank all you readers for your support and welcome your suggestions and comments.

Watch out for this trap. Payments to a former spouse don't qualify as deductible alimony unless they will cease on the spouse's death. When a husband was required to make a set number of cash payments to his former wife (this obligation would continue after her death), the tax court held the payments to be non-deductible division of property.

Can you believe this? A woman had a daughter who was both physically and mentally disabled, and received payments from a state welfare agency to help pay for the daughter's non-medical care. The IRS and Tax Court stated that the care payments were taxable income to the mother.
