
### Want To Spend A Few Rewarding Hours?

The 25% deduction for health insurance premiums paid by self-em-ployed individuals has been reinstated retroactively for 1994 returns. (If you applied for an extension, adjust your tax return before filing to reflect this change.) If you are eligible for the deduction and filed without taking it, file an amended tax return, IRS Form 1040X now to get a tax refund. Remember, the deduction for 1995 will be 30% of the premiums.

It is suggested that you keep a copy of your tax return forever, even though there is a three year statute of limitation that applies to a normal filing. If the IRS says you didn't file, then it is up to you to prove that you did file. It has been said you should have your cancelled check if you paid, or a copy of the refund check and a copy of a certified mail receipt. It appears that a person could not produce any of this (even though he had filed) and the IRS was allowed to assess new taxes going back as many years as it wanted.

One of the great challenges of my life is to come up with a new topic for this column each month. When my creative juices run low, I resort to scanning the New England Journal of Medicine for interesting articles. In the June 16th edition, a series of articles is already causing controversy on the risk of breast cancer in women on hormone therapy seemed to be a springboard for my thoughts.

For many years, the use of estrogen, and more recently estrogen and progesterone replacement in women following menopause has been a common if now standard practice in western medicine. First used to relieve the hot flashes associated with the change, physicians soon came to realize that there were other benefits to women. Osteoporosis (the loss of calcium from the bones) is a common problem causing brittle bones and subsequent fractures after menopause. The development of osteoporosis can be slowed significantly with estrogen replacement. Pre-menopausal women have distinctively lower rates of arteriosclerosis and heart disease than similar aged men, but after the change of life, the rates of the two sexes come together. This difference is probably due largely to a protective effect of estrogen on cholesterol levels and the types of

cholesterol in women with adequate female hormone levels.

We have also known there is a down side to using estrogen by itself, as it increases the risk of endometrial and cervical cancers. The addition of progesterone to a regimenof estrogen apparently negates this risk, while preserving the benefits of estrogen. The recent article in the NEJM raises the question of increased risk of breast cancer in women on hormone replacement therapy. They followed 121,700 nurses for 16 years, and kept track of those who developed breast cancer as well as those who were on hormone treatment. During this period, 1935 women developed breast cancer, and they documented a small but significantly higher risk in those on hormone treatment. This difference was most pronounced in those women over 55 who had been on hormones for a longer time. In this situation, the addition of progesterone to estrogen did not seem to make the difference it had in uterine cancer.

So what are our recommendations? Clearly hormone replacement therapy has many benefits that in many cases far outweigh the small risk of breast cancer, but each woman should review her health risks with her doctor. If you are at risk for osteoporosis or heart disease on the basis of your own health or family history after menopause, hormone replacement is probably a good idea. On the other hand, if you've had significant breast problems or there is a family history of breast cancer, the decision is less clear. In either case, the use of yearly mammograms and yearly pap smears can go a long way in protecting your good health.

Peninsula High School Graduates Head Out Into The World

Almost 260 seniors from Peninsula High School "made the big move" on Sunday, June 11, as they graduated out into the world in a two-hour ceremony held at Olson Auditorium at Pacific Lutheran University, Marching in to the sound of "Pomp and Circumstance" the young graduates were greeted by a packed house of parents and well-wishers that filled the auditorium to the uppermost rows and left some others standing against the walls. Following the graduation about 90 members of the Class of 1995 got together for a Class graduation party and with that their high school days came to an end.

Where do they go next? Some good checking by members of "The Outlook" school newspaper staff, assisted by school counselors, indicates that about 70% of the PHS Class of 1995 is headed for college, many to nearby locations, and others to end up on the East Coast. Here's a breakdown of the indicated college destinations, along

with an approximation of the percentage of the class attending each college: Tacoma Community College (24%); Bates Technical College (1%); Olympic College (2%); Pierce College (85%); Green River Community College (1%); Clover Park Technical College (3%); Big Bend Community College (1%); Western Washington University (3.5%); Pacific Lutheran University (5%), University of Puget Sound (3%); Central Washington University (2%); Seattle Pacific University (1%); University of Washington (5%); Seattle Pacific University (1%); Eastern Washington University (1.5%); Whitworth College (1%); Washington State University (2.5%), and 20 other college locations throughout the nation a total of 8.5%. Just under 4% of the class indicated that they will be joining the military services, about 8% are going to go directly to work, and the balance of the graduates are currently undecided about their immediate plans.

### Tacoma Low-Income Housing Construction Begins

Work had begun on three vacant and run-down buildings in Tacoma that will be remodeled to provide housing for 44 low-income residents. The buildings are being renovated by the Metropolitan Development Council, a private, nonprofit social services action agency and community housing development organization.

Two of the buildings are located in the Wright Park neighborhood, at 615 South G (12 units) and at 621 South Yakima (21 units, including manager). These single-resident rooms will be available to low-income and fixed-income residents formerly homeless people who cannot afford other housing while seeking and securing employment.

The third building scheduled for renovation is located in the Hillton neighborhood, at 1210 South Yakima (11 units, including manager). The Martin Luther King Ecumenical Center is a partner in that building project which will also provide housing for low income individuals and for those with mental and physical disabilities.

All three renovation projects were designed by McGranahan Partnership, a Tacoma architecture, planning, and construction management company.
