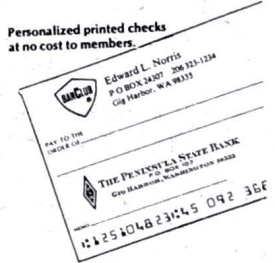

YOUR WILL- - -

Before deciding to make a Will, a person should understand what a Will does and how it accomplishes its goal. Before making a Will, it is crucial that you know what property you own and to whom you wish to give this property. I would suggest that every person make a list of his/her property before seeing an attorney, so they can be sure nothing is forgotten.

After death, a Will must be administered; that is, the wishes of the Will-maker must be obeyed. The person who administers the Will is called the executor (if male) or executrix (if female). You choose the person you want by naming him/her in the Will.

A Will that is properly made will remain valid until it is changed or revoked. If you have a valid Will, but wish to make a change or correction, it may be necessary only to make a CODICIL to the Will--this is a document stating the changes or corrections, but otherwise

leaving the original Will intact. A CODICIL must be properly executed and witnessed, just like a new Will, if it is to have legal significance. If you have an old Will and wish to make changes, my suggestion is to bring it to your attorney so he/she can properly advise you.

Although making a Will is not a difficult or complicated process, it carries a great deal of importance. Every person who wishes to control the distribution of his/her property should take the time to make a Will. Without a Will, your property will be distributed among your surviving relatives according to Washington law, and you will lose the ability to control your estate.

A final word of caution: To make a legally effective Will you must meet the following requirements:

- a) The Maker (called testator or testatrix) must be at least 18 years of age;
- b) The testator/testatrix must be of "sound mind" at the time of making the Will;
- c) The Will must be written and signed by testator/testatrix;

d) The Will must be witnessed by at least two (2) people WHO WILL NOT RECEIVE ANY PROPERTY IN THE WILL.

I would suggest consulting an attorney or a comparable person with sufficient knowledge of the law to be certain all requirements are met.

FIRE HAZARD SEASON

The State Department of Natural Resources reminds residents of Kitsap, Longbranch, and Gig Harbor Peninsula's that the forested land that you live and work in presents a fire hazard to your homes and businesses.

An escaped debris fire or improper outdoor cooking fire can become a damaging brush fire.

In order to protect you from losing control of a fire, the state has established burning rules that you must follow when burning a small yard fire up to four feet in diameter and three feet in height. A larger fire requires that you obtain a written burning permit.

Failure to burn within the rules or within a written burning permit is a misdemeanor. You may also be

required to pay for all fire fighting costs and could be liable for damages to your neighbor's property.

To obtain a copy of the burning rules or to obtain a burning permit, contact your local fire department or the Department of Natural Resources at 1-800-562-6010 (toll free).

The Department also reminds you to caution your children against playing with fire in the woods. Contact your local fire department for help in counseling a child that likes to play with fire.



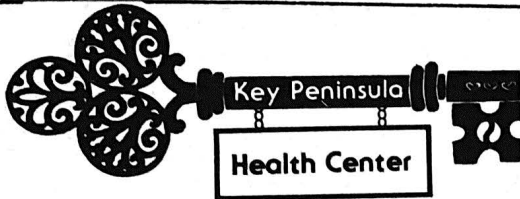

Rick Kindig, who provides mental health counseling at the Center, has indicated that he is now able to accept some new clients. Mr. Kindig is associated with Comprehensive Mental Health of Tacoma and is able to work with the Key Peninsula community approximately twenty hours per week. Fees charged are based upon a sliding scale that considers family income in relation to family size. Department of Social and Health Services medical coupons may be used to pay for the service.

Jim McMahon, owner of Key Center Drugs, has generously offered to donate to the Health Clinic 10% of all his sales of prescription drugs during the month of August...an added reason to support a local merchant.

Do Key Peninsula residents have sufficient access to dental care, or would the community benefit from having a dentist located in or near Key Center? Two dentists recently asked the Health Center staff this question, since each has some interest in setting up a part time practice in the area or possibly in association with the Center. A brief questionnaire has been prepared to get community opinion on the need for the physical location of dental services in the Key Peninsula vicinity. The questionnaire appears below. Please fill it out and return it to the Health Center at Rt. 1, Box 104-B, Lakebay, 98349. The compiled results will help the dentists and members of the Health Center Board of Directors in deciding whether to pursue the establishment of a dental clinic.

To date, the Friends of the Clinic fund drive has yielded almost \$4,000. These donations are more important than ever, since funding from the Kellogg Foundation was all but history on June 30. This generous community support helps to assure the survival of the Center and its continued ability to provide medical services for the Key Peninsula residents. A very large and sincere "thank you" to all who have donated and to Dorothy Johnson who is the chairperson of this year's drive. Please remember that contributions are tax deductible and that they may be made at any time.

Sixty-two people were given hearing screenings through the Mary Bridge Speech and Hearing Van on June 10 and 11. Robert Cropley, the audiologist who staffs the van, was delighted with the response and noted that almost one third of the people seen were asked to come back for further evaluations. The Center staff thanks all the businesses and organizations that helped to promote this service.

John Tuttle was recently elected to the office of Key Peninsula Health Center President of the Board. Also elected were Phyllis Anker as Vice-President and Vernon Merrill as Secretary-Treasurer.

HIGHLIGHTS OF A TOUR FOR ROOTS

We had sufficient information from both sides of our family trees to see that we had deep roots in the British Isles--England, Scotland, and Ireland.

That, combined with a real interest in the history most closely connected with our own country's, provided a great expectation for our planned trip there in June 1980.

The actual visit was far more wonderful than anything anticipated. Some impressive highlights in London were: the intensity of life there - throngs of people, rushing traffic, thousands of little shops as well as the world's largest department store, the importance of the preservation of history, a quiet barge ride on a canal through a residential area, a tour through the Westminster Abbey by an old vicar who sounded as though he were personally acquainted with each character in history he pointed out, food that was not American, the real Rosetta stone in the British Museum, bumping into the Streich family who were ex-neighbors in Lakebay and touring the Towers of London with them.

In London we experienced a variety of transportation modes to get to historic locations--undergrounds, doubledeckers, boat, taxi, tour buses and we added to that with a trainride through the quiet English countryside on our way to visit cousins in York in northern England. Their wonderful hospitality treated us to good English cooking, and day trips by car (hang on to your hat the speed limits are much higher than ours!) through neat plains, moors, farmland, tiny seaside



towns and ruins to see as much as possible in a few precious days.

Through our Wilson cousins who hosted us, we met someone with our family name, and although we compared family trees couldn't find a connection but still suspect we are related further back.

The quaint little shops of York, ancient as they were, offered much variety. We remember, too an organ concert in the mighty cathedral there, so full of history. We walked on top of the town wall and saw the festival celebrating the coming of the vikings centuries ago. It was hard to leave but on to Edinburgh we went to visit our cousin who now lives in Robert Louis Stevenson's home. It had a decor of quiet elegance, reminiscent of restored homes we saw of 100years ago, and was on the itinerary of many tourists.

The MacFies here treated us to panoramic views of the city, a real Scottish Variety Show, conversations about our common ancestor, an important figure in the Scottish Reformation, plus a visit to his home. Edinburgh--a beautiful old city in stone, dominated by the castle on the hill forboding in the daytime, beautiful at night by floodlight.

Our flight to Ireland was unique because it was made in a very small (quivering) plane at a low altitude. The only advantage was seeing the beautiful scenery at close range before we landed in the small town of Enniskillen to visit our cousins, the Welshes.

At the opposite end of the airport was an army barracks actively pouring forth armed soldiers and trucks. They were seen throughout the area we stayed in about 100 mi. from Belfast. But the hospitality we experienced, the beauty of the green rolling hills, and the significant family ties override memories of the war-like features of bombed buildings and barbed wire.

Highlights of this phase of our trip were: Sunday service in the church my grandmother and ancestors attended, seeing the family plot there, tea afterwards with old family friends in their quaint Irish farm home, drives through the countryside seeing farms, bogs, forests, and a beautiful filtered sunset seen from a bluff above a serene lake, the Belleck China factory and not being able to resist souvenirs from there, and the modernized 1759 we stayed in. The waterways lent themselves to the rowing races the eldest son had just won for all of Ireland. A quick tour of Belfast receded our one hour conventional flight to London.

Next month we'll continue on to our destination with relatives in Switzerland.

HOME, WASH. - LAKEBAY P.O. BY C. PAUL

History, like volcanoes, is the product of various upheavals, interspersed with calm spells. Such a quiet period has recently been shattered for the town of Home.

Former postmaster Middleworth was responsible for having the Lakebay Postoffice located at the head of Von Geldern Cove. It seemed only fair that the name Lakebay should be retained, as Lake Bay, at the head of Mayo Cove, had unquestionable historic rights to the name. The new, more central location, actually right in the center of Homes business district, has been accepted as one of the confusing, and perhaps amusing, facts of life by the locals. Strangers are sometimes more confused than amused, however.

With the avowed intent of reducing the confusion a petition was floated on the Peninsula that among other things, requested the name Lakebay be placed at the head of Von Geldern Cove. For some reason old time Home residents did not know of it until the Washington State

Board of Geographical Names had acted, assuming it to be the will of the affected residents. Under pressure, the petitioner withdrew his request and the board, attentive to concerned Home residents, will further consider the matter at its next quarterly meeting. The U.S. board relies heavily on the decisions of local boards. "It is withholding action until the Washington State Board comes to a final decision". (6-24-80-Bert L. Cole to Elton Troth).

There will certainly be a time when our beloved small postoffices will give way to a larger mail distribution center. Everyone concerned might well consider in advance, a postoffice name that will blanket the Key Peninsula without favoring or diminishing any of our historic names, such as Vaughn, Glencove, Home, Herron, Lakebay, Delano, Longbranch, and Taylor Bay. West Meridian seems forgotten as a pioneer postoffice site. Historic Jo Emma Beach is now called R.F. Kennedy State Park. One by one, all will be

lost unless local pride keeps a weather eye open.


