Dear Annie -

Thanks for your good letter including measurements of boxes, and am glad you like the idea of my place as very inadequately described. Everyone who has seen the "Red Pavilion" or "Ravensnote" or "Gog & Ganger" or whatever its name will be, goes extatic about it in spite of the mors that its in - inside and out.

I did somewhat exaggerate when I said that I wanted everything that is mine. The point was that I do at last want to enjoy the things I possess or what's the use of keeping them? The rugs for instance - I don't want so many that I'll have to store them - You have more adequate facilities for that. But the floors here are fine and in bad condition even if I do sand & refinish them and they can stand being pretty well covered. In a couple of places it would be desirable to have them over laps: in the "doorway" from studio to kitchen library "hallette" where there is the hardest wear. A small rug here thru entrance cannot be more than 28" wide. Maybe that little natural color one Tunisian pattern like a tortoise back which you used in your bed room would do. The hall itself is 38" wide.

In my working corner by the studio window one of the older rugs over a better one wouldn't be a bad idea to avoid worry about spilling a bottle of ink or so.

As I said before the rug Mina Parks gave me (size 8' x 11') is in two shades of faded greenish yellow and if it doesn't drop to pieces when clean will in spite of its many moth holes be fine for the studio room in which the predominating color of rugs should be yellow: yellow with green or a little red or a little blue but definitely not too much blue. You need <sup>there</sup> be much blue in the library. The strong blue, red or green - no yellow, could do in the bed room. Here it would be desirable to fill a space 7' x 7' approximately with one rug - less than 7' one dimension more than 7'

other dimension could do. The larger of the Tunisian rugs  
with mauve and yellow etc (which I believe you have never  
had - maybe in Woodbury or on "Signet House" Road) could  
be the one for the library. Another Tunisian rug with more  
yellow green and mauve is much too faded to do with, for  
any place. I have completely forgotten what's become of a  
Marlberry shade Tunisian rug with single large diamond  
pattern. That I would like if you come across it. Don't  
want the Chinese rug in sewing room. Don't need the Chinese  
rug in upstairs hall if you want it or unless you think its  
green would go especially well with yellows. and I don't  
need the down stairs hall rug which you want if you mean  
the one with blue in it. I do like it much but something  
else might do better in this house, for instance the down  
stairs hall rug with red, beige, a little black etc - no blue  
star medallion design. I believe I gave that one to you  
at least you paid \$9.00 duty on it so well have to  
think twice about it before deciding. I am thinking  
out loud in hopes that you can make the selection  
for me and we will both be satisfied. The Bakara  
should be fine for the "press room" when used as a  
quart room - if it is not much too large (Please com-  
pare dimensions with my plan.) The floor is concrete (May  
paint it with Flo-Tile) but in any case could stand  
being well covered. I believe there are none of the  
original rugs from home that I would want except  
the Bakara. I might very well use a couch rug or  
blanket Moroccan red stripes with a little white (and blacks?)  
If there are pieces like that hall rug which you find  
are perfect and irreplacable for you. You had better keep  
- I am sure it is easier to find a choice here than  
in Wilmington. Please do list other articles from home.  
I don't remember what they are. and as for furniture  
I can't see that any of it would be suitable for  
this house. On the other hand what isn't sent in this  
one shipment we will probably never get around  
to again. That green jar - I know you want it - me too  
- so it would be a double catastrophe if it were broken  
in shipment. So many of James Lee's precious porcelains  
were broken in shipment from China even with that  
superlative Chinese packing. so do consult with shippers

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about sending breakables. By the way there are some small pieces in the trunk under window. The white jar I had better leave in any case - Remember it's 12 centuries old!

Sunday Sept 12 - Thanks so much for having sent the dimensions of the Chinese boxes. The carpenters were to have come last Tuesday but didn't show up for which I was thankful - firstly because it suddenly turned very hot, and the big heat of the year is still on and no one can do their best work in it. I've been trying to clear up the litter of lumber, dry grass and brush but climbing up and down the hill in the heat is more than I can stand for long. I've been cutting away the honey suckle from the slave quarters - a thick matress of dead vines too pretty green on the surface. - a terrifying fire hazard. Day before yesterday across the ravine a grass fire got out of control and burnt all the way to the tops of the hill, with fire engines snorting all over the place, and yesterday they tore up my lower road but no fire to be found. In the excitement a young fellow in a big car rolled off the road down some steps into a front yard just below me. The car is still there upside down.

Another reason for being relieved at the non-arrival of the carpenters was that for ten days I have been quidng a hyper-energetic over 60, female about town - the collector & now head of Tacoma Art Association Mrs. Schneider. We covered every dealer, museum, to say nothing of numerous private studios - and a show every night. Thank heavens she left on Wed by plane to go back to work.

So with all this there has been little progress in improvements and have moments of discouragement because of the length of time that it will take. Therefore I am in no terrific hurry about the delivery of my possessions. Probably what I shall really need

first are the blankets as I have only two thin ones, borrowed, and I do expect overnight visitors will be dropping in before long. I can use the three blankets you mention - also the red one and blue one I had in Civila.

The family pictures and snapshots whatever they are you might send - also my boxes of books. Definitely these, on the third floor. Stevenson and Wilder <sup>125</sup> I can do without if the extra cost is more than ~~too~~ per book. The Lama scroll is the one with the single figure - a Buddha of some sort which you hung for a while in the living room over the red lacquer chest. I do not place "Mother's oriental type hangings". Do you mean the rose and gold Venetia brocade? This I could use. We bought it together in the Chinese market in Rome. There were some plush portieres with giant dandelion pattern too - these do not want. The rest colored "museum piece" rug I might as well have if you and Stan don't want it. Can use the African robes. Send the vallet suit case if you can pack anything in it. Don't want the square hat box - unless it too is useful for packing. A paisley shawl is always useful for covering up a bad spot - send it! and I could well use Stan's plum colored Chinese Robe - at present I have no robe of any sort, ~~so~~ Don't send too many rugs but not the too faded ones either. Remember I have a museum piece on the floor now and I find myself walking all around but not on it - my dusty foot prints are too conspicuous on it pale yellow. Of course theoretically and officially I do not relinquish claim to any of the furnishings that came from Tacoma but that may all be settled twenty years from now. You will recall my true story of the handsome young Moroccan soldier who went off to the wars for four years leaving his beautiful young wife. On returning he found she had been

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kept her while by an old man. He not only demanded her back but also payment from the old man for the time he had had her. The elder on the other hand demanded that the soldier pay him for having supported her during the four years. Before a French judge, the girl in correct Mahometan convention refused to state her preference, so the case was thrown out of court. Some days later, the judge astonished to see the two opponents walking in the street in a most friendly fashion, could not resist asking them what was their happy solution: They had sold the girl to a house and each bought two new pairs of shoes with the money.

But as for this shipment I have not the remotest idea of what it will cost. Do you think it would be possible to send Belains estimate for my O.K? Then we could decide about the Tranquillia and Faraway Meadow plates for instance, etc etc.

I have gotten around to taking some photos of the estate and will send some when ready.

You will probably think of more items to ask me about before the job is off. How do you feel about getting rid of all those things? How about coming along with them?
