LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

I am a resident of Home, Pierce County, and I enjoy walking the roads of our picturesque community. However, when dogs dash out of yards barking, baring their teeth, and nipping at my heels, walking loses its pleasure. Instead, walking becomes a frightening and hazardous experience.

I do not question the right of people to own dogs. (Our family had the same cared-for pet and companion for 17 years). But, with ownership goes responsibility. Common sense dictates that a threatening dog should be confined within a yard and not be allowed to jeopardize and intimidate neighbors. A continuously barking dog is stressful to those living close by, and indicates an unhappy animal. Dogs allowed to run loose, gather in packs, and can cause much damage to property and harm to other animals.

All of the above conditions reflect neglect and an uncaring attitude on the part of owners, not only towards people, but to the animals.

I realize that in these times people are concerned about protection of private property. Law enforcement officers tell us, however, that a small house dog that barks at strangers serves the same purpose as a large, menacing animal. Fences also serve two-fold, they confine the watch dog and discourage intruders.

Neighborly cooperation in solving community problems is much better than having to pass leash laws which are costly to enforce. Do not deny those of us who walk, jog, and ride bicycles the pleasure of our pursuits. Menacing dogs belong in yards; the roads are for public use paid for by property owners such as myself.

FOX ISLAND CHRISTMAS

Christmas 1914 was important to a six year old boy. Pa had inside information that Santa Claus might bring us kids a coaster wagon. Our Sears catalog was dogeared from looking. The image of that wagon is still in my mind. A beautiful low wheeler, with a fold back tongue to steer. One knee in the wagon and the other foot kicking, zoom zoom.

Sleep came easily, in spite of some last minute worries about our 8 inch square chimney. Six year olds do not question the laws of physics too much. The main thing was faith. With lots of that, we slept soundly. There were no airplanes, no cars, not even a refrigerator or electric clock to disturb the quietness.

Christmas morning! No time to dress or eat. What was that huge object beneath the Christmas tree, covered with tissue paper? Sure enough, a wagon! Wowee! Then a twinge of horror.. It was a varnished farm style wagon, with high wheels. High in front, still higher in back, with detachable sideboards. What a horrible disappointment. "Just fine", Pa said, "For hauling in wood". His eyes sparkled. He saw beauty that somehow escaped us.

After breakfast, the wagon was taken outside. We would make the best of this abomination. High and awkward, it was useful for work, period. When the Bemish boys came down the trail and asked where we got the funny wagon, they laughed when we said, "From Santa Claus". They said there was no Santa Claus. I said there was and asked Mom to back me up. She looked funny and did not answer.

The Bemish boys went on down the steep trail to the bulkhead road. Once there they started yelling, "Santa Claus, Santa Claus", and throwing rocks up the hill at us. Finally I noticed the rocks moved very slowly at our elevation, and were easy to dodge. I picked one us and threw it back. It went down a lot faster than it came up. There was a loud yelp from below. Mom asked, "Did you throw a stone?" I said "No, Santa Claus threw one." That was a pretty good Christmas after all.

SHOP EARLY - MAIL EARLY

With the Christmas mailing season just ahead, here are some tips from your local Post Offices to make sure your cards and packages arrive in time.

The suggested dates for mailing within the U.S. are December 10 for parcels and December 15 for letters. Make Christmas merrier for those who will receive your gifts! In addition to shopping early, be sure to properly address cards and packages, using zip codes. Wrap parcels properly. Strapping tape is excellent to use. Check the size of your envelopes before mailing. Letter size standards went into effect last year requiring envelopes to be at least 3½ X 5 inches.

Commemorative stamp kits make a unique and welcome gift for practically anyone in the family.

Two Christmas stamps have been issued for use during the 1980 holidays. The Contemporary design shows antique toys on a window sill while the Art Masterpiece stamp depicts a detail from a stained glass window in the Washington Catherdral.

Stamps may be purchased from your rural carrier. Checks are acceptable for pastage. The orders will be filled and returned to the customer the day after they are ordered if the carrier cannot fill the order on the spot. During the month of December, please make sure all mail deposited on rural routes has stamps affixed.

If you have a special request regarding the delivery of your packages, just leave a note in your mailbox for the carrier. They'll make every effort to see that all packages are delivered to your convenience.



TACOMA COMMUNITY COLLEGE OFFERS MANY WINTER COURSES FOR INTERESTED PENINSULA RESIDENTS

Fifteen courses, covering topics from creative writing to welding will be offered to Peninsula/Gig Harbor residents by Tacoma Community College winter quarter, beginning the week of January 5.

According to TCC Peninsula class coordinator, Joan Fandel, several of the winter's offerings have been specifically designed at the request of Peninsula residents.

Offered through the TCC Department of Continuing Education and Community Services, the courses will be held at Gig Harbor High School, Goodman Middle School, the United Methodist Church, Peninsula High School and Purdy Womens Treatment Center. Classes are open to all community members, and high school students may receive high school or college credit with principal's permission.

Two business classes highlight the nine offerings at Gig Harbor High School. "Business Management: Profit is a Mealthy Word." is offered 7-9 PM Wednesdays and gives practical pointers on maximizing business returns. Also offered for 2 credits is "Putting the Computer in its Place," scheduled for 7-9 Pm Mondays.

An examination of the richness and complexity of human relations is offered in "Friendship, Love and Sexuality -- A Philosophical Perspective."

An engineering course, "Introductory Blueprint REading and Drafting," is offered 7-9 PM Tuesdays.

Learning to use natural energy, stress management and relaxation techniques is the subject of "Take Charge of Your Life," slated for 7-9 PM Tuesdays.

"Piloting and Chart Navigation -Puget Sound Waters," offers instruction in boating safety, dead reckoning, charting courses and local procedure for U.S. Coast Guard License. Schedules 7-9 Mondays.

Personal money management is the topic of "Stretching Your Dollar" held 7-9 PM Wednesdays.

Tuition for these 2 credit classes is \$20.40.

Several 3 credit classes are offered with a tuition of \$30.60.

Among them "Creative Writing Workshop: Poetry and Fiction" offers help for both beginning and advanced writers. Using critiques by fellow class members for improvement, the class meets 6:30 to 9:30 PM Tuesdays.

Offered at Peninsula High School is "Basic Welding," 7-10 PM Tuesdays. Giving basic instruction in oxyacetylene welding, cutting and brazing, the class carries a \$40 materials fee in addition to tuition.

For December, cubs and their families may go Christmas tree cutting on federal or state land.





If you are a gardner with newly planted trees and young shrubs, just file these suggestions for future use. Most of us have established plantings and now is the time to prune them back to a neat trim shape and at the same time provide yourself with a wonderful supply of Christmas greens. The florists will sell you wreaths and swags of fir and holly at very fancy prices, but your juniper, arborvitae, yew, cyprus and many other evergreen shrubs and trees make wonderful holiday decorations. Cut back branches that are growing into neighboring plants, over walks, or crowding out less aggressive plants. Try to retain their natural growing form, but be ruthless with those long pushing branches.

Now gather up those lovely greens, you will have material to deck your entire home for the holidays. Do not take them inside the house this early. Make up swags and wreaths, but lay them outside where the dew or rain will keep them fresh.

In mid-December bring them in, trim them with cones, holly berries, and a bright bow, and your friends will ask where you found such attractive decorations.

If your garden does not yield all these goodies, a neighbor may share with you, or go to the Christmas Show put on by Capitol District of Garden Clubs on December 7th and 8th at South Park Community Center, 48th and So. Tacoma Way. Members of Bayshore Garden Club have tickets available. All types of greens, ribbons, and trimmings will be there for those who have no gardens to prune. You will also see new ideas for table settings and interesting designs for use in the entire house.

If you had any of the brown spotted leaves or fruit that was so prevalent this year, rake and burn all the leaves and runty fruit, then on the first windless, dry day apply your first dormant spray.

It is also time to prune fruit trees. Remove crossing, inward growing, broken branches. Shorten overly long shoots and remove water sprouts, those thin whipps that grow around old pruning cuts. Fruit trees should be kept symetrical, open, and low enough to spray properly.

Any unplanted bulbs must be in the ground immediately.

2. If you have an older home with high ceilings, install a dropped "false" ceiling. This is a simple do-it-yourself project using tee grid metal supports hung from screw inserts and 2'X4' sheets of insulating board laid into the grid.

The dropped ceilings accomplish three things: (1) It reduces the cubic feet heated and thus improves comfort at floor and ceiling level; (2) It establishes an insulating air space between it and the old ceiling; (3) It "modernizes" by making better proportions between : room size and ceiling height. Recessed lighting may be installed.




