

#### NEEDED SECURITY PATROL

In January, Dennis Hoff, a Key Peninsula resident, started the Home Patrol. Although a structural steel worker by trade, an injury forced him to look for another profession. He saw the need in the community in which he lives for the protection of isolated or vacated homes and this developed into the idea, then the reality of his security patrol service. He has enjoyed the full cooperation of the Pierce County Sheriff and the Gig Harbor Police.

There has been a great response to his project. In one month's time he has signed up seventy-five customers and has had many more inquiries. He will patrol an individual home twice each night and covers a vacation home three times in a twenty-four hour period. None of his rounds are made at predicted times during the twentyfour hours. If a group of neighbors on one road requests his services, he gives them a special rate.

Mr. Hoff is deputized, licensed and bonded. He is qualified to make arrests, which he did last month when he appre-hended an escapee from McNeil at Longbranch. The man, in for armed bank robbery, had swum the channel, landed near a home at Longbranch, and asked for a dry coat there. When he left, t police were called. The FBI the was in the area when Denny, knowing the area, guessed where the escapee might be, found him on the road near that location and turned him over to the FBI agents. In fact, he has made four arrests in his first month. He covers residences, businesses and the Civic Centers in his rounds.

#### SCHOOL NEWS

February 8 becomes another red letter day for the schools in the Peninsula District, so perhaps I should comment a minute on the upcoming special election. There are two ballot issues and they can be confusing. The first issue is a one year Maintenance and Operation tax levy for \$2,435,000. In terms of your own property tax, it means \$7.33 per thousand you have as assessed value of your property. This is the same rate as your 1977 taxes for school maintenance and operation, but not neces-sarily the same dollar amount you are paying, since assesments vary from year to year. The second issue is a

\$3,800,000 bond issue to build a new elementary school,

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



The bond issue, unlike the maintenance and operation levy, is paid over a period of twenty years. The total tax rate for all current bonds for schools is \$1.20 per thou-sand you have as assessed The successful passage value. of the \$3,800,000 bond issue on February 8 will raise your tax rate for school bonds about 60¢ per thousand from the current \$1.80 per thousand assessed. The rest is pretty much simple decision making.

I should note also that the legislature is going to have to make some decisions regarding school funding since a recent Seattle Superior Court decision has ruled special levies for maintenance and operation unconstitutional. While the legal battles go on; schools are still at the mercy of annual voter response. By then again, I am reminded But and pretty well convinced that communities around the country have exactly the kind of schools they deserve.

Not only is this senseless destruction of property, and a violation of property rights, damaging mail boxes is also a federal offense and carries a reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons responsible.



ROLLING RIGHT ALONG

Roller skating at the Civic Center on Fridays and Sundays has been a huge success; almost too huge. There have been so many people turning out that some of the sessions will be divided by age groups. This situation has necessitated more supervision than we have had. The building and grounds, as well as the skating floor will be supervised, requiring four extra people for Fridays and two extra on Sundays. Skating and building rules will be enforced. The kitchen is in full operation and extra help is needed there too, since that is a very popular spot.

A charge of 25¢ is now made for observing to help eliminate some of the congestion on the balcony.

The skating committee and manager Fred Ramsdell have worked out some new rules.

- Skates are to be put on in balcony area only. No skates allowed outside that area. No skates in rest rooms.
- Adults <u>only</u> will be allowed on the floor to help younger skaters during the children's sessions.
- When finished skating, tie skates together and return them to skate room.
- Everyone is required to heed the whistle when used by the Skate Monitors.
- Transportation arrangements should be completed when children are dropped off because the telephone system has been changed for outgoing calls.
- Children under 10 must have an older person with them who is responsible for them at the Center.
- Groups may rent the facility for private parties at the regular admission rate with a minimum of \$25.00, subject to availability.

## Keynotes



We should be equally concerned about what kind of friends they have on TV. The programs our children watch should be chosen with the same discretion with which we choose a friend for them. A lively discussion followed Mr. Anderson's presentation. Levina Buckmaster, the program chairman, then shared some ideas of homemade toys that might help keep children happily entertained without having the TV set on.

On January 14, Sylvia Stivers, a nurse who works with the Council of Cooperative Nursery Schools, visited the Longbranch school. She came to screen the children individually for vision and hearing problems. Sylvia also visits each nursery school periodically to check for speech and developmental difficulties. This month the four year olds will take a field trip to Mary Bridge speech clinic for speech testing.




President Flewelling wishes to express his thanks to past president Bob Steele and his officers for the outstanding work they did this past year.

held in cooperation with the Tacoma-Pierce County Health Dept.

The Hospital Research and Educational Trust, an affiliate of the American Hospital Assoc., is conducting a project to demonstrate innovative approaches to the delivery of ambulatory care. The project was funded by

a \$2 million grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, Battle Creek, Michigan, in 1975. Ambulatory care is concerned with general, rather than specialized medical services provided to those other than hospital patients.

The Key Peninsula Health Clinic was selected from more than 400 groups throughout the United States which applied for this funding. The Trust will select at least twelve other sites which will establish these programs.

Project officers include Judy N. Wilson, President of the Clinic Board of Directors; Medical Officers Robert A. Scherz, M.D., and Roy Virak, M.D.; Project Director Jeanne Brodsack; Financial Officer Harvey Ennis.

#### NEW BUSINESS OPENS IN DOWNTOWN VAUGHN



PENINSULA CONSTRUCTION

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#### MULTI-SERVICE CENTER

The old Goldman Store at Wauna, a historical landmark, is now the location of the Peninsula Multi-Service Center. This is a combination of several agencies.

There is a Washington State Employment Service Office which helps peninsula residents with job placement and job development (helping people to overcome problems that keep them from getting jobs, such as transportation, etc.). Sandy Hamilton and Paul Tyeter are the staff people for this agency. Their hours are \$:00 to 5:00, Monday through Friday.

It is also the home of the Pierce County Community Action Agency. This is a referral service for economically disadvantaged persons. They also provide emergency services such as food, clothing and transpor-tation for those in need. This program is headed up by staff person Barbara Hawthorne. She was with the agency when it was REO (Rural Economic Opportunity Organization). The Community Action Agency is under an admin-istering board of the Pierce County Commissioners, which is made up of one third business men, one third appointees, and one third low income representatives. It is funded with federal, state and county money.

Another service is provided by Outreach Worker Beulah Lilley with the WIC program, (Women, Infants and Children), headquar-tered at Mary Bridge Hospital. She comes to the peninsula by appointment, so check for definite times. She circulates in a community as needed, in homes of pregnant and nursing mothers and infants up to four years old, based on nutritional needs.

There is a close connection between the Multi-Service Center and the Longbranch Clinic and

Jeanne Brodsack, its director. There is a Food Stamp inter-

viewer two days a month on the second week of the month. A lawyer from Legal Aid comes from 9:00 to 12:00 on Thursdays, but persons needing this service should call for a definite appointment.

The Pierce County Youth Experience Program is also administered out of this office. It is for economically disadvantaged high school students who go to school four hours a day and are placed in a job for two hours a day. In summer they have a full time employment program for them. They also have referrals for Job Corps for those out of school.

Mrs. Hawthorne wants to express her thanks to the com-munity for their great response to the Christmas projects.

When the new truck went into service it was made possible for the 1970 1000 gallon gasoline powered pump, which had been stationed at Key Center, to be transferred to Station 3, (Home). Then the 1958 Ford 500 gallon pumper went to Station 5 (Rocky Bay), allowing a 1954 GMC pumper to go into reserve.
