The meeting was called to order by President Dave Freeman. The minutes of the June meeting were corrected to read Shari O'Quinn suggested the self-guided garden tour, and they were approved as corrected. There was no Treasurer's report in her absence.

BINGO: Irene told the board of a second machine that could be purchased for \$800, which would add versatility to the games that can be offered to players. The machine could be paid for in small monthly payments, and the Bingo funds could handle this. It was msc to purchase the machine for \$80 with monthly payments of \$66. The motion was amended that after a three month trial period, we re-evaluate the situatiion to see if we want to keep the machine. The amendment also passed.

SKATING: There will be skating every other Friday for the rest of the summer, starting July 14th. If a skate night needs to be rescheduled, notice will be given.

MANAGER'S REPORT: Paint and primer are needed for the railing of the fish pond and around the windows of the Whitmore Room. The windows of the Whitmore Room also need to be reglazed. A work party will be held at 6:30 pm on July 21st to work on the windows. Wiring near the pumphouse needs to be covered, and the concrete posts to protect the furnace need to be set. The community service workers are doing lots of odd jobs to get ready for Pioneer Day.

FLAVOR OF FALL: Claudia has enlisted the help of Vicki Henschel for the auction. Donations are still needed for this event.

PIONEER DAY: Tim Kezele and Laura Mosely have 22 booths rented. There will be children's activities and baby sitting available. A 40-piece band will be in the parade. Anyone interested in helping with this event may attend the committee meetings each Tuesday at 7 pm in the Historical Museum. Volunteers are needed to work in the beer garden. A big thank you to Tim for repairing the Centers' picnic tables.

NEW BUSINESS: A letter seeking a grant has been presented to Key Bank to obtain some of their obsolete computer equipment. We are looking into applying for a grant to replace the windows in the Whitmore Room. Vicki Henshel has volunteered to help with the grant writing.

Dave Freeman will inspect the house to be auctioned. He will visit the property on July 22nd and take pictures, assess what the house would be worth, what it could be "sold" for and what the Center could realize from its sale.

Camp Easter Seals has offered grant money to help us bring our restrooms up to standards for disabled patrons.

Shari O'Quinn reported she will have an activity center at Pioneer Day for small children to introduce our Indoor Park. All proceeds from this will go toward the purchase of equipment for the Park. Indoor Park starts the first Tuesday in October.

Ladies' Night will be on August 12th. Mike Salatino has tickets.

The Ciderfest is scheduled for October 14th in downtown Key Center from 10 am to 3 pm. There will be a polka fest that evening at the Civic Center, and the Lions plan to have a dinner before the dance. Dave and Shari will get a committee together to research having a booth to sell hotdogs, etc.

Tim and Claudia volunteered to start working on the garden tour to be next June. Tickets and maps will be sold and refreshments will be at the Center. Possibly some historical aspects can be incorporated into the tour.

Other ideas were: Having programs getting senior citizens and children together; movie nights; board game nights, and possibly a Holiday Home Tour.

The Vaughn Post Office is the place where residents meet to talk and get their mail. The quaint little building is the news center for the community, as well as a convenient place to mail letters and packages. Run efficiently by Postmaster Joanne Clark, with help from her new postmaster relief, Elise Cantwell and rural carrier Sandy Crawford, it is the epitome of small, rural postal stations all across America.

Postmaster Joanne has been working for the postal service for 11 years, beginning at Burley as a parttime clerk working on assignment in various post offices, and as an exam specialist in Tacoma.

She didn't really know the area or the people when she came here, but her husband played slow-pitch baseball at Volunteer Park for years. Over the years she says she learned a lot from longtime residents and maps. "I learned to read maps," Joanne said "because there are no signs at the intersections. We are the greeting center of Vaughn. Where am 1? And how do I get somewhere else? are the most asked questions! I have enjoyed my time at Vaughn and my customers feel like friends."

Elise Cantwell started work here on April 15, 1995 as Postmaster relief. She works Saturday and Monday, and fills in when needed. She heard about the opening through afamily member who works at the Port Orchard Post Office.

"I enjoy working in a small community." Elise says, "You have a chance to get to know everyone." Elise is working towards a career in the Postal Service.

Sandy Crawford has worked as a





rural carrier for the Post Office for many years, and three years ago became our full-time rural carrier. She enjoys her work and the small community. She provides postal service, too.

Postal hours are Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 and 12:30 p.m. - 4:30 p.m. and Saturday, 9:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. and closed Sunday, now that the automatic lock works right! Joanne didn't know that the timed lock wasn't working, and everyone thought the Post Office was open on Sunday!

Competing loggers race to the top of a pole and slice off the top and direct it to a target on the ground - without touching it with their hands. Besides working with power saws, there will also be single and double handsaw bucking contests. Events will feature lady loggers as well as senior log-

Old Timer's Day is the annual fun day presented free to all who attend, and is sponsored by Key Peninsula Community Services, the local Food Bank and Senior Center. It also doubles as a major fund raiser for the year to raise money to continue the programs of the Food Bank. 

Small Businesses by Bob Eberle Need To Know

Complying with federal and state regulations concerning chemicals in the workplace can be a real burden to a business struggling in today's market place.

Many small businesses make two big mistakes: First they believe the regulations do not apply to them because they are too small. In fact, OSHA's Hazard Communication Standard applies to any business that uses hazardous chemicals and has at least one employee. Also, EPA type Dangerous Waste Regulations regulate any business that generates 220 lbs (apx 25 gal) of hazardous waste in any month and sometimes as little as 2.2 lbs (appx. 1 quart) a month. Even those businesses under the 220 lbs waste limit are not "unregulated". They are "Conditionally Exempt", which means there are certain conditions they must continually meet in order to remain exempt. Secondly, many businesses believe that because they met requirements of the Hazard Communication Standard several years ago, they have everything "under control". Unfortu-nately, when programs are not regularly reviewed and updated to

track with regulatory changes, those companies who believe they are in compliance are often shocked to find they are at the wrong end of an environmental inspection.

Inspectors will cite businesses not only for practices that do not comply with the regulations but also for lack of documentation such as training records and for missing required paper work.

The plain fact is that the regulators consider the big operators to be pretty much in compliance by now. Like tumbleweeds rolling downhill, more regulatory time is now available to take a closer look at smaller businesses.

The prudent approach for all businesses is to analyze their programs and update them as soon as possible. Contracting for outside help with this process can often be more cost effective and provide greater confidence than trying to do it all themselves. The cost of compliance is generally a lot less than the cost of being tagged for non-compliance.

It seems that sometimes the imports to Washington cause more than their share of problems. I'm not talking about Hondas and Toyotas, but the biological invaders that take over their ecological niche, like scotchbroom, blackberries, slug, and tegenaia agrestis, better known as the common aggressive house spider. We're lucky in the Puget Sound region not to have poi-

sonous snakes, and we have also escaped the most common injurious spiders, the black widow and the brown recluse. The common aggressive house spider (also known as the hobo spider), is our most venomous, and it was first reported in Washington in 1936, presumably imported through one of the ports. The hobo spider is 1/2 to 3/4 inches long, a nondescript brown in color, with a herringbone stripe on its abdomen. It is found inside and near houses in any season, except winter, with most bites reported during late summer.

Almost 60 species of spiders have been reported to cause some symptoms when humans have been bitten, but the hobo bite is significantly more serious than most. The

bite itself may be painless, but soon an area of redness forms, often blistering, and then a central ulcer forms under the blister. If this area is large enough, the skin may not heal, in some cases requiring a skin graft. One half of those bitten also develop general symptoms such as lethargy, headaches, nausea, and weakness. The treatment is symptomatic, keep the wound clean and the patient comfortable. If the bite doesn't seem to be healing prop-erly, then its time to see a doctor.

Although early August is not quite back to school time, it's definitely back to school physical time. Every year our Tuesday Well Child Clinics are full at the end of the month, so beat the rush and bring you student in early.






