City Council Chambers, 4:00 P. M. Tuesday, April 23, 1968

Mr. Stan Bixel, Director of Personnel, explained that this ordinance includes everal amendments to the Compensation Plan of the City. He outlined each change for the Council's information.

Mr. Cvitanich asked Mr. Bixel when the salary survey was completed from 1955 brough 1968, what was the percentage that was recommended for supervisory personnel as opposed to rank and file employees.

Mr. Bixel stated he could not off hand give that information but would look into the matter and report as soon as possible.

Mr. Cvitanich asked that the Council keep in mind at the budget hearings that the rank and file employees with percentage increases in salary were falling far behind the supervisory salaries. He suggested that the Council discuss the matter of across the board increases for next year instead of percentage increases.

Mayor Rasmussen requested that Mr. Rowlands, City Manager, give the utmost onsideration to filling the position of Assistant to the City Manager, with a person from the City of Tacoma and perhaps, a person from the minority race.

Mayor Restriction emplified that he had held a meeting with many citizens of community on Monday of last week and again at the study session on Monday of a week. Many constructive suggestions were made at these meetings in relation the fact there was some facility against this ordinance. In all probability we title for this ordinance will be considered as it was suggested it should be laid, the configurey control measure rather than the present riot control. Furthermore, a of the citizens at these meetings felt this ordinance was directed at them I they were assured that it was not directed at any particular segment of the amounity, as it was meent as a protective measure for everyone in the City.

He further stated, in the discussion of the open-housing ordinance, many confluctive suggestions were made. It was impossible for the City Attorney's staff draft an ordinance in such a short time which would include the suggestions that made. Some compressives have been reached and, perhaps, it will be entirely saible that a housing ordinance will be drafted that will be acceptable. It was no felt that these two important measures should appear on the same agenda and passed at the same time.

Mr. Zatkovich stated this ordinance will help everyone and he did not think should be considered with the open-nousing ordinance.

Or Hermann explained he felt that the existing law and police enforcements e such that the ordinance was not necessary.

Dr Herrnann then moved a substitute motion, to table the ordinance. Seconded for Maroland,

Mayor Resmussen explained that he had received communications from a number copie who asked to sheak to this ordinance and he would call for their remarks this time.

Mins. William B. Early of 3118 No. 30th, representing the Council of Clurches, aid the war one of the volunteers for the Tacoma Citizens' Task Force and felt a fair housing ordinance should be passed. She presented a petition to the Council with 3,489 signatures in favor of a strong housing ordinance with an eigency places.

Mr. LeRcy Annis, 2906 No. 25th, spoke as an irdividual and a member of the sican Civil Liberties Union. He noted that one of the great principals of civil lartly is that every person should be treated as an individual on the basis of own works. He suggested some changes in the proposed ordinance.

Mrs. Esrey Wolfrom, 1301 Tacoma Ave., representing the National Association rotal Workers, Mt. Rainier Chapter, spoke in favor of a strong and fair housing thance which incoporates an emergency clause.

Mayor Rasmussen read a communication from Johr H. Anderson, President of the oma Select Board, requesting that the Council eract legislation providing for thousing in the City of Tacoma and that such legislation include an emergency asse.

Mrs. Variaberg of 414 No. C. St., stated she had been asked to read a ther from Mrs. Kenneth C. Heiman, President of the Lowell Elementary School which favored the passage of an open housing ordinance with an emergency case and putitive measures. The communication further urged that the Tacoma can Rights Commission be used as a review board.

Mr. L. H. Pedersen, 1715 East 70th, Secretary-Treasurer of the Pierce County retal Lebor Council, supported the ordinance which must include an emergency asure.

Mayor Resmussen stated it was his hope that an ordinance could be passed that if d be acceptable to the community on a basis of trust so a referendum would not submitted.

Mr. Cvitenich felt if the Churches and people of communities many years ago assumed their rightful responsibilities, an ordinance of this type would not live been proposed.

Mr. Johnson asked that Mr. McCormick, City Attorney, explain the emergency clause in the ordinance that is being discussed.

Mr. McCormick stated, under the City Charter there are provisions that provide an initiative and a referendum. Also under the charter, certain ordinances not subject to referendum. Normally ordinances require two readings and do not one effective until ten days after publication, which would allow time to gather natures for a referendum. Also under the charter, there are provisions for the stage of an emergency ordinance which becomes effective immediately upon publication, consequently there would not be an opportunity to gather signatures for a ferendum.

Mr. Earl Mamlock, President of the Tacoma Board of Realtors, called for an all

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suppossing local law against housing discrimination as soon as possible. He d the realters have subscribed to a code of practices against discrimination lousing for some three years, and their Board believes that a local ordinance uld become affective immediately.

Mayor Resmussen asked Mr. Mamlock to participate in the negotiations relative to paring an ordinance for the Council's action next week

Mrs. A. E. Karstad, President of the Tacoma Council of the PTA, spoke on behalf

The Park 1. S. Brazill, 1723 So. K, favored the open-housing ordinance with an mency elevae, as he felt it would help control the injustices his race has been proceed too for the last one-hundred years.

Mr Fred Carlbom, 1913 No. Mason, was it favor of the proposed ordinance and agested that the City Council consult with the City of Seattle, Fircrest, Gig or and the Pierce County Commissioners, to make this an all inclusive opensing measure.

Mr. Allen Vandeberg of 414 No. C. St., Laura Davis, 2002 So. Thompson, the J Barry Williams, 1732 No. Steele St., also urged the Council to pass the sposed ordinance.

Mr. Fred T. Haley, 3018 No. Puget Sound Ave., favored the open-housing dinance with an emergency clause. He suggested that thought be given to the ation in the Federal law dealing with the enforcement provisions.

Mr. Hugo Hartnack of 324 No. 4th, Mrs. Betty Jane Heigel, 8009 So. Yakima, J. Slayter, 1910 No. Proccor, Mr. Ernie Roberts, 1332 Jackson St. and several γ citizens spoke against the open-housing ordinance.

After some discussion Mayor Rasmussen moved that Ordinance No. 18565 be suponed for one week, until April 30, 1968. Seconded by Mr. Cvitanich. Voice taken. Motion carried,

Mrs. Banfield reiterated her objection to the insertion of additional pages he model Ciries application after the Council had reviewed the application pointed out several figures that she felt were discrepancies.

Mr. Fred Carlbom asked that the City Manager make a report in writing on tiling as requested a few weeks ago.

Mayor Rasmusson stated, the City Manager has the matter under investigation 348 the report will be forthcoming.
