Mr. Schueter stated the main portion of the project should be finished this winter which would be changing the contour of the area. The lawn and tree

Mr. Haley said in view of the failure of Initiative 226 he thought this vould be one of the projects that the city would have to forego. He felt there will be a number of projects that would have to be curtailed and thought his was a good place to begin.

Mr. Rowlands said that 50 percent of the federal matching funds have already been received by the city for this project and several other

beautification projects and local funds have been set aside.

Mr. Haley said it may be, that the matching funds will have to be t . : ned back.

Mr. Rowlands remarked that the Council would probably have to pass up potential future matching funds because of the lack of local funds,

Mr. Rowlands said he would have a list of projects which are in the reliminary stage for Monday's study session for the Council to review and decide which ones to eliminate.

Mrs. Price asked what affect would this have on the 6th Ave, and the

Jarrows Drive program.

Mr. Schuster explained, the contract on the Marrows Bridge was only over the engineer's estimate, this also included participating funds from the State Highway Dept. He added, this is a much larger project than the one under discussion. The money has already been set aside for the city's participation for the Narrows Bridge project.

Mayor Tollefson asked that a list of proposed projects contemplated for next year and the balance of this year for which the city will receive

federal participation be prepared for Council's information.

Mr. Rowlands said he will have such a report prepared.

## HEMS FILED IN THE OFFICE OF THE CITY CLERKS

Report from the Municipal Court for the month of Oct. 1965 & 1966.

#### COMMENTS:

Mr. Rowlands commented even though Initiative 225 was voted down, Tacoma's street needs for the year 1967 to 1975 have not changed one iota. The Toloth has to be cut" to fit the pattern and alternatives will have to be suggested.

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Mr. Bott asked Mr. McCormick, City Attorney, if any research has been done relative to the passage of the Blue Law and how it will affect the city as far as the city ordinances are concerned.

Mr. McCormick stated he had not checked into the matter as yet, but tell there would not be too many in conflict. However, he added, the city cannot pass anything that would supercede the State Law so the ordinances would be automatically invalid if they conflicted with the act.

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Mr. Cvitanich reported that some contractor had been dumping debris on Ruston Way and when the tide comes in the debris is seen floating all the way from Ruston Way to Browns' Point. He thought something should be done regarding the matter.

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Mr. Rowlands stated he would check with Mr. Schuster, Public Works Director.

Mr. Cvitanich mentioned, if the city does not have the money to participate in a regional air pollution program, he felt the Council should make some start toward ending the pollution problem locally.

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Mrs. Price said she is convinced that the major push should be on a regional basis. She reported that at the air pollution conference that she attended last week, it was brought out that an Ohio company has developed equipment which could remove the odor from the local kraft mills and also from the Tacoma Smelter.

Mr. Rowlands said, the city has budgeted \$28,000 for a program next year and said that David Stevens, City Coordinator, has been discussing the matter with County officials in the hope that they might participate. If the County could contribute a few thousand dollars, the joint program would qualify for three-fourths federal matching money. The city alone would qualify for a two-thirds grant.

Mrs. Price asked about the possibility of a contribution from the Port of Tacoma.

Mayor Tollefson stated that Port Commissioner, A. E. Blair, had edvised him that the port has no jurisdiction over air pollution. He added, verhaps, the Port could possibly work out contractural agreements with endustries to limit pollution, but it is basically not a policing authority.

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Mr. Haley stated that persons have charged that the City's removal of the old copper shingles atop the old City Hall tower has made the tower abject to damage from freezing, water, and asked if this were true,

59-295 Mr. Schuster, said it is true that water can get into the structure then treeze and thaw and cause damage. However, the roof leaked before and the cower has always been open on all four sides just below the roof. He felt the rever was not any more prone to damage now than it was before. He added, the the clock mechanism is protected by a sub-roof,

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Mr. Finnigan asked that Mr. Schuster attend a meeting of the Civic Arts Commission to answer questions relative to the building. He felt most of the members are convinced that the Council and City staff are doing verything possible to make demolition of the building inescapable.

Mayor Tollefson stated he would have Mr. Schuster join Mr. Finnigan

and Mr. Haley at their next Civic Arts Commission meeting.

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Mayor Tollefson mentioned that he attended a conference of thirty National organizations in Florida last week. Two days were taken up reporting to the conference regarding city problems. He said he was surprised to und that so many people at this high level knew so little about city business. They are all concerned with their own business but not the overall business of cities.

He felt the press had covered the needs of the cities very well. In thirty years there will be another 100,000,000 people residing in cities. All of the cities in the United States are extremely concerned about what is to be done about garbage, sewage disposal, movement of automobiles, air pollution, water pollution, etc. It is a tremendous task, one that we will never win, but we cannot let it collapse and fall down upon us.

This, of course, is what the nation's cities are attempting to do at the national level. He noted Congress has seen this quite clearly but they also have their limitation of funds.

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Mayor Tollefson asked that the Planning Commission again sit down and check what areas they plan on obtaining to have for open-space, and if possible, to see what they can do about the other areas that are still in private ownership.

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Mr. Rowlands asked that the Council members have their reservations
