Monday, October 5, 1964 City Council Chambers, 7:00 P. M.

# THIS IS THE DATE SET BY STATE LAW FOR THE HEARING ON THE BUDGET FOR 1965

Mayor Tollefson greeted the audience and thanked them for showing 57-392 an interest in the operating plan for 1965. He said the Council would welcome any questions or suggestions anyone would like to make relative to the budget.

Mr. Rowlands explained, it is the normal procedure at the first hearing to outline the various items for the 1965 budget. He added, the goals for 1965 are as follows:

## Item No. 1 - Strengthening the City's Financial Position.

Mr. Rowlands said he hoped that some consideration will be given to the City's financial needs through the Legislature next year, as approximately 6 cents of every tax dollar remains in the Cities. He felt that the Cities have a justifiable need for further consideration.

## Item No. 2 - Meeting the Personnel and Manpower Challenge.

He said the importance of recruiting, training and retaining competent employees cannot be over-emphasized, since it is only through the effective utilization of the City's manpower resources that more work, in most situations, can be accomplished with the same number of people.

# Item No. 3 - Re-activation of an Effective Equipment Replacement Fund.

It would be desirable to be able to have the monies available for equipment replacement when it is needed.

## Item No. 4 - Solving the Transit Crises in 1965

The Transit budget is \$188,000 out of balance. A suggestion has been made by some of the Council members of the possibility of obtaining some type of enabling legislation that will help the Cities.

#### Item No. 5 - Expanding Tacoma's Safety Activities

If there are any additional funds, a recommendation should be made for additional patrolmen. Mr. Rowlands, added that crime nationwide has risen and the trend appears to be gaining momentum.

#### Item No. 6 . Continue the Airport Improvement Program.

Additional money is needed for the installation of an instrument landing system, which would make the airport an all-weather facility. This will cost approximately \$1,000,000, half of which will be matching funds from the Federal Government.

## Item No. 7 - Seeking the development of a quality City.

Ideas are being presented by Universities and organizations such as Allied Arts and other associations working with the City, to keep abreast with the time whereby creating a proper environment in which people will be willing to live and work.

## Item No. 8 - Meeting Tacoma's Legislative Needs

Legislators will be urged to consider the financial needs of the Cities. In the State of California, Cities receive approximately \$20.00 per person from the sales tax, whereas the Cities in Washington do not receive one cent; also they have a more receptive property tax for the Cities.

Mr. Rowlands asked Mr. Gaisford, Director of Finance, to present the estimated revenues for 1965.

Mr. Gaisford said he would speak on revenues for General Government Purposes, which excludes the Utilities Dept. He added, the total amount is \$12,203,029, which is 2.6% increase over the year 1964. Ordinarily revenue increases by 3.5% per year; the reason the 3.5% was not realised in 1965 was because the City had an unexpended balance in surplus which amounts to approximately 1% of the total revenue.

He said the property tax is \$4,271,045, a 5.9% increase over 1964 and is for the General Fund, Firemen's Pension Fund and for the payment of principal and interest of the general obligation bonds that are outstanding.

Mr. Rowlands said, this briefly summarizes the budget. He said he would be happy to answer any questions.

Mayor Tollefson asked Mr. Rowlands how they were going to take care

of the Transit System.

Mr. Rowlands replied that they should consider the Transit System as a Utility, as it is a necessity in a City of this size. Therefore, he thought the Transit System should be supported on a stand-by basis by everyone living in the City. He thought that some type of enabling legislation should be obtained for local subsidy. In the event this does not materialize, then the alternative would be to drastically cut services.

Mr. Finnigan asked for Mr. Rowland's opinion on the increase of the Library's request for funds.

Mr. Rowlands said the Library Board under State Law must request certain funds which are reviewed by the City Council who then makes the determination. They have requested a 4 1/2% increase for the Library employees under the jurisdication of the Library Board. They wanted to make sure in the event other City employees received an increase that the Library employees wage increase was also budgeted.

Dr. Minton requested that the City Council budget funds to demolish the old City Hall building on Pacific Ave. and convert the vacant lot into a parking area or turn it over to the Metropolitan Park Board for a park.

Mayor Tollefson said the City Council has not made any decision concerning the old City Hall, however, he would be advised when it was decided.

Mr. Cvitanich left the meeting at 8:45 P. M.

Following a discussion by the City Council and members of the audience concerning various subjects, the hearing on the Budget was continued until Tuesday which will be heard after the Council conducts their meeting which convenes at 4:00 P. M.
