COUNCIL CHAMBER, 7:30 P. M.

Monday, July 22, 1957.

Council met in regular session. Present on roll call 6; Battin, Bratrud, Humiston, Jensen, Stojack, and Mayor Anderson; Mr. Tollefson taking his seat at 7:33 P. M. Absent 2; Goering, Perdue.

It was moved by Mr. Stojack, seconded by Mr. Jensen, that the minutes of the previous meeting, copies of which had been mailed by the Clerk to each Council member, be approved and the reading thereof dispensed with. Motion carried. Ayes 6; Nays 0. Absent 2; Goering, Perdue.

Mr. Peter D. Pelegruti, District Manager of the Automobile Club of Washington, introduced Mr.Clinton S. Reynolds who spoke before Council. Mr.Reynolds stated that he represented the Pedestrian Protection Committee, and wished to present an award to Tacome He said that 1956 was a big year for Pedestrian Protection, and that there were 44 cities in the group who entered in the Class of 100,000 to 200,000 Category, as well as 45 out of the 48 States of the Union. The contest, he said was based on the following factors,

- (1) Accident Records
- (2) Legal Information (3) Engineering
- (4) Organization
- (5) School Safety
- (6) Public Information

He also stated if a city receives a 100% rating on any one of these categories it auto-

matically earns a plaque.

Mr. Reynolds explained that Tacoma has earned this award and he now wishes to present the plaque to Mayor Anderson, and congratulated the City on its fine record. He then said he would like to make another award to Mr. Robert Hager, who was presente and recently retired as Director of Physical Education for the Tacoma Public Schools and had been in charge of the School Boy Patrol since its inception in Tacoma. This plaque extends congratulations on his many years of service with the School Boy Patrol.

Mayor Anderson congratulated Mr. Hager and stated that the City was indebted to him for his years of untiring service, and thanked Mr.Reynolds for his presentation of

the plaque to Tacoma.

Mr. Hager thanked Mr. Reynolds and Mayor Anderson. He said he was with the Sch District at the time the School Boy Patrol was organized. He thanked the City Clerk, May office and the Police Department for their assistance during the years he worked with the Patrol. He explained that, at the inception of the Patrol only 125 boys were used, and 1400 are wearing the School Boy Patrol Badge, and that these boys have had a splendid reinasmuch as there have been no deaths at school crossings.

Mr.Rowlands stated he wished to point out several items in "Tacoma's Workable gran for Urban Renewal" which might have been overlooked.

He explained that on page 22 of the report that additional personnel, will be wild in the Health, Building, Planning and Manager's office to work on the program, and may be needed early next year. 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★ Mayor Anderson asked Mr. Rowlands for an explanation of an article which appeared the Tacoma News-Tribune on July 16th regarding the \$360.00 charge to Tacoma for alleged X istance at a fire within the City Limits.

Mr.Rowlands explained that a definite misunderstanding had occurred with the knowled Fire Department. He said the Tacoma Fire Department answered a call in the South a rea where there were no fire hydrants and through some misunderstanding the Lakewood be Department came to assist, but the Tacoma Fire Department could have taken care of it the use of the City Tank Truck.

Mr. Rowlands said he had written to the lakewood Fire Chief advising him that had not called for the Lakewood Tank Truck, and that the Cities have a Code for hering assistance from other Fire Departments. He said that he will submit to Council etailed report on the matter.

Mr. Rowlands also explained that Tacoma has a Tank Truck at the 27th and Tacoma will be used for brush fires later

WELTS BY THE CITY MANAGER:

**Mr. Rowlands advised that he had submitted a copy of M C-149 regarding "Minor sizes in Plans for the County-City Building". He said that the changes listed in the size of a minor nature and, if made, will be charged against the City and against the County.

Dr. Humiston reported to Council on the interest rates on Retirement Bonds 323 stated that, in his opinion, 4% on L. I. D. Bonds is not high enough to interest outside Purchasers. He said there would be a tremendous advantage by having the L. I. D. ands purchased by a City Department. If it were possible to use the L. I. D. Guaranty and to finance this, the Retirement Board could purchase long term Government Securities, and the interest rate is low unless they are held to maturity, he said. If the Securities were not held to maturity there would be a loss of \$81,437.01, which was shown in a report a L I Guaranty Fund Portfolio, submitted by the Director of Finance.

Mayor Anderson advised that this matter would have to be considered by the ard, and a report made to Council.

Mayor Anderson reported that the Arundel-Dixon Co. is negotiating with the ty Attorneys regarding a claim for damages which has been filed concerning the Cowlitz No. 2000 Project. He said that it is very important that some member of Council sit in with a group and asked if the members of the Utility Committee, or other Council members would these meetings.

Mr. McCormick advised that one of the City Engineers and an engineer employed a Arundel-Dixon Co., are going to check the books to determine how much has been spent to the on the Cowlitz Project.

Mr. Henry A. Cole, Major Projects Manager from the Utilities Division, said that Richard Dixon and Mr. Evans, Executive Vice President of the Dixon Co., will go over the figures which should be available in the event of the cancellation of the contract. Advised there is \$21,000 per month standby charges by the contractor with the understanding that this charge would only be for a few months. Nothing has developed to date as far

as these standby charges, contract cancellations or modifications are concerned.

Mr. Cole.was asked who was present at these meetings during the discussions with Arundel-Dixon representatives. He replied that Mr. Pflugmacher of the Light Division and himself were in attendance at the first meeting and that he was the only City representative who attended the last meeting.

Marshall McCormick, City Attorney, advised that he would like to see some representative from the City go over these figures with a committee from Council, as wel

as having the figures checked by an expert in the field.

Mr. McCormick explained that negotiations with the contractors have been held on several points: (1) the amount of damages suffered by the contractor to date; (2) the situation if the contract is cancelled immediately; (3) the situation if the order is gi to proceed immediately; (4) the situation if further standby time is required.

Mr. Stojack stated that, in his opinion, no committee should be appointed but it should be the responsibility of the whole Council to attend as many meetings as possi Several Council members were of the opinion a committee should be appointed to

attend these meetings.

Mayor Anderson concluded the discussion by requesting members of the present Utility Committee to serve until a new committee is appointed by next week's Council mee

Mr. Tollefson stated that he had received a call from a longshoreman concernithe replacement of City-owned docks and warehouses. He said that the docks and warehouse in Tacoma are in very poor condition, and if they were in good shape, there would be no trouble in attracting shipping to Tacoma. Mr. Tollefson asked Mr. Rowlands to ascertain whether or not the Priy-owned docks and warehouses can be replaced by the Urban Renewal Mr. Rowlands stated that he would check and report back to Council in a week or two.

Mr. Jensen stated he had a pleasant duty to perform. He advised that he was in San Francisco recently and that Mayor George Christopher presented him with a key to the City with the request that he present it to Mayor. Anderson upon his return to Tacoma.

Mayor Anderson stated he would gladly accept the key from the Mayor of San Francisco and thanked Mr. Jensen for presenting it to him.
