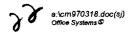

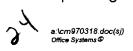

COMMENTS AND COMMITTEE REPORTS OF CITY COUNCIL

Council Member Evans reported that last Thursday the Puget Sound Regional Council met on its annual Vision 20/20 Banquet, an awards banquet. He stated that the City of Tacoma received one of the five honor awards for its multi-family housing tax incentive program, which attracted applications amounting to 300 new units and \$14 million in investments in urban areas during its first year. Council Member Evans further stated that Tacoma also received one of the four blue ribbon awards for the Tacoma Dome Area Plan, an award that honors the City, Pierce Transit and the Dome District Development Group for jointly creating a comprehensive plan for that area. He stated that Tacoma was the only City to receive two awards.

Deputy Mayor Baarsma commented that the first dam went online in 1912 on the Nisqually River, and it was at that time that public power was first provided. He stated that the same nay saying arguments about government entering into the private marketplace were used back in 1910, 1911, and 1912. Deputy Mayor Baarsma stated he would like to provide TCI written questions regarding its position on the telecommunications issue to allow Ms. Wyatt a chance to respond.

Council Member De Forrest requested the City Attorney provide a written legal opinion on how the City can sell things and execute everything that's in the bond Ordinance prior to it becoming effective. Council Member De Forrest next reported on the Eastside Neighborhood Council meeting held last night. The topics were public improvements for the bond issue and also on the relocation of the Smoke Shop.

Council Member Silas stated that the Council was remiss in not allowing residents from the Eastside to be participants in the decision making process regarding the relocation of the Running Wolf Smoke Shop. She also stated that the decision has not yet been made as to where the smoke shop will be located.

Council Member Evans stated that he understands the concerns of the Eastside community and agrees that the relocation issue should have been handled differently, but emphasized that the matter was discussed with the Tribal leaders on at least three occasions, and that staff handled a very delicate situation with the very best judgment given the information they had at the time.

Mayor Ebersole reported on his trip to Spain and stated that the museum and government officials in Spain were very impressed that the Catalan Masters Show in Tacoma drew more people per day than the same show did in Atlanta, Quebec, St. Petersburg, or San Antonio. He also stated that the Spanish officials committed to sending a second Catalan Masters Show to Tacoma in 1998. Mayor Ebersole commented on the fact that the City of Barcelona owns the Pablo Picasso Museum and that the government is very involved in the arts in that part of the world.

On proper motion, the meeting was adjourned at 9:29 p.m.
