### **REPORTS BY CITY MANAGER**

City Manager Ray E. Corpuz Jr. acknowledged that Allen Correll, Executive Director of the Human Rights and Human Services Department, received a Tacoma-Pierce County Bar Association Liberty Bell award, which goes to an individual who is an outstanding non-lawyer, who has demonstrated commitment to the community regarding civil rights and civil liberty.

City Manager Corpuz requested authorization to pay for moving expenses for the City's Human Resources Director, Philip Knudsen, in the amount of \$7,300, which will cover moving expenses from Portland, Oregon to Tacoma, Washington.

Council Member Miller moved to pay moving expenses for Human Resources Director Philip Knudsen, in the amount of \$7,300, for his move from Portland, Oregon to Tacoma, Washington. Seconded by Council Member Crowley. Voice vote was taken and carried, with Council Member De Forrest voting in opposition. The motion was declared adopted.

### COMMENTS AND COMMITTEE REPORTS OF CITY COUNCIL

Council Member Silas thanked Mayor Ebersole, Council Member Baarsma, City Manager Corpuz, Deputy City Manager Walton, Police Chief Hairston and the community leaders who met earlier this week to discuss communication problems between the City of Tacoma and her constituents. Council Member Silas wanted her constituents to know that the City of Tacoma is moving forward on resolving that issue.

Council Member Silas expressed her disappointment regarding the decision of the Civil Service Board to move forward on the residency issue without any discussion with the City Council. Council Member Silas then requested clarification as to the difference between a blanket residency waiver and a repeal of the City's Charter provision 6.3.

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Council Member Miller moved to excuse Mayor Ebersole from tonight's meeting. Seconded by Council Member Crowley. Voice vote was taken and carried. The motion was declared adopted.

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Council Member Miller moved to cancel the City Council meetings and study sessions of June 1, July 6, September 7, November 23, December 21 and 28, 1999. Seconded by Council Member Crowley. Voice vote was taken and carried. The motion was declared adopted.

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Council Member Miller stated that it is his understanding that the City Council are within their rights under the Charter to set Council Rules that require a greater than five vote majority on issues. He stated that he is looking forward to an opinion by the Legal Department regarding that issue.

Council Member Miller stated that City Council Members received a letter regarding cities who are signing on to the global warming letter, and making a commitment to take actions that reduce pollution. He noted that one of the improvements that has achieved the greatest success in lowering emissions within major metropolitan cities is the sequencing of traffic signals. He requested that the City Council look at the midbiennium budget, to discuss and identify some resources that can be used to hire someone who can do sequencing on our traffic lights and try to improve the flow of traffic within the City.

Council Member McGavick stated that the Arts Commission is very interested and excited to bring forward to the City Council their accomplishments and then discuss some of their challenges. She stated that the Arts Commission has researched different forms of funding for public art and plan on presenting those ideas to the City Council at the study session on June 8, 1999.

Council Member Baarsma stated that on earth day he joined with others in the North End and city staff from Tacoma CARES, and helped clear some property on North 10<sup>th</sup> and Washington Streets. He stated that he received a letter from the North End Neighborhood Council requesting that the City explore ways in which that property can be utilized.

Council Member De Forrest echoed Council Member Silas' comments on the residency issue. He stated that he would like to keep the discussions going in order to come to some kind of conclusion on this issue.

Council Member De Forrest stated that in the City Charter it states that every ordinance and resolution shall record the ayes and nays. He stated that when he has voted nay in the minutes it always states that Council Member De Forrest voted in opposition and that the motion carries. He stated that when he tried to amend the minutes tonight it was an effort to keep the City Council minutes consistent.

Deputy Mayor Kirby requested clarification as to whether or not the City Council minutes are required to record a Council Member voting in opposition on items that are voted on by a voice vote.

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On proper motion, the meeting was adjourned at 7:34 p.m.
