REPORTS BY THE CITY MANAGER

City Manager Ray E. Corpuz, Jr. invited the public to two public meetings to share their ideas on the bridge of glass, the pedestrian bridge which will be a connection between the Historic District and the Thea Foss Waterway. He stated that the hearings will be held Thursday, April 25, 1996, at the Main Branch Library, at 12:30 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. Mr. Corpuz stated that representatives from the design team will be there to take the public through the project and its design history. He stated that they would accept comments at that time and would also accept written comments through Bill Iyall of the Public Works Department.

COMMENTS AND COMMITTEE REPORTS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Council Member Baarsma urged the Council Members to continue to monitor the issues discussed at the meeting with the Public Utility Board. He stated these issues include the deregulation of the Industry, whether or not to move forward with the pipeline project, and the management assessment of the Public Utility. He stated that there seemed to be a disagreement over who was directing the study. Council Member Baarsma then stated that as we enter the challenge of deregulation, it serves all of our interests that the Public Utility be as "lean and mean" as possible. He also stated that the City Manager, as our spokesperson, should be directly involved in making sure that the management assessment is conducted in a way that we would like to see it conducted.

Council Member Evans noticed a billboard on the freeway adjacent to the Tacoma Dome that does not conform to Washington State law, but does conform to Tribal law. He stated that it contains a big ad for the Tacoma Dome and further stated that this City should not be fostering those who advertise on it and should certainly not be one of the advertisers on that billboard or any other billboard that does not conform to our state law.

Deputy Mayor Silas commended and thanked the Daffodil Committee for a beautiful and outstanding Daffodil Parade on Saturday.

Council Member Miller also commented on the outstanding job of the Daffodil Committee. He also thanked the D.A.R.E. car operators who annually provide vehicles and drivers to drive the City Council through the parade and gave special thanks to Sergeant Barber who made this a special parade for his daughter, Michelle.

Council Member De Forrest stated that the day of the Daffodil Parade was very enjoyable.

Council Member Kirby also commented on the Daffodil Parade, particularly on the antique car in which Deputy Mayor Silas was riding.

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Council Member McGavick stated that Saturday was a gorgeous day for the Daffodil Parade.
